The chairman of the North London Railway told the stockholders that 10,543 passes had been detected defrauding the company of fares.

The failure is reported of J. V. Ayers & Son, of Chicago, a prominent iron firm; liabilities are placed between one and two millions.

The date of Gladstone's return remains uncertain; his health continues to improve; political events may start him northward any day.

The German police have got possession of some Hartman communications of the Nihilists, giving instructions on the subject of coronation.

Lord Dufferin is resting from his labors in Egypt, pending the action of the English Government upon his projected plan for Egyptian reform in Sudan. Its reconquest threatens to become a political necessity.

Wm. G. Medlicott, founder of the Medlicott Manufacturing Company in Springfield, Mass., died on Saturday evening last, at Long Meadow, aged 67 years. He was well known to manufacturers of knit goods.

Mr. Morley's election in Newcastle-on-Tyne would be safe but for the appearance of the labor candidate, who is bidding for the Irish vote and swallowing Home Rule pledges. He may possibly withdraw votes enough from Morley to elect the Conservative candidate.

The United States Iron and Tin-plate Works, at Danmiller station, Pennsylvania, were burned early this morning, together with the adjoining building and a portion of the trestle of the Pittsburg, McKeesport & Younghiogheny Railroad. Loss \$100,000. Three hundred men are thrown out of employment.

The N. Y. World's London cable says the Affirmation Bill is regarded as a great mistake by many friends of the Government. The religious element is everywhere strongly opposed to the idea of special legislation in favor of Bradlaugh. Conservatives have made up their minds to oppose the bill, tooth and nail.

The Municipality of Rome has placed a memorial tablet in the house which Prof Samuel F. B. Morse inhabited while there in 1830. Syndic has informed the American Minister that the unveiling of the tablet will be deferred until the wishes of the American colony in regard to the ceremony are made known.

The political alliance between Parnell and Lord Randolph Churchill is apparently closer than ever. Lord Randolph led off with an attack on Mr. Trevelyan and the Irish policy in general, sneering at the Government methods of execution. F. H. O'Donnell commenced the performance by accusing Mr. Trevelyan of bartering his principles for office.

The Freeman's Journal has given an ominous intimation that Mr. Trevelyan will receive, in future, the same treatment as Mr. Forster formerly did. This means that Parnellites, despairing of cajoling, are determined to harass the Chief Secretary by the same ingenious brutalities which were directed against his predecessor.

A WONDERFUL WINTER PASSAGE.—The steamer "Alaska," of the Union Line, Captain Murray, which sailed from New York at 4.15 p. m., Feb. 3, arrived at Queenstown at 8 p. m. of the 10th, thus making the passage in six days, twenty-three hours and twenty-five minutes actual time.—New York Paper.

The Bank of England has reduced its rate of discount from 4 to 3 1/2 per cent., which is that of the Bank of France. In the close of January the Bank of England rate was reduced from 5 to 4 per cent. The Banks of England, France and Germany are gaining specie, and the last named Bank still charges 4 per cent.

Coal has been discovered at Lutz Mountain about 100 miles from Moncton. The Trans-Canada says it resembles Sydney coal in appearance, but is very light in weight. The specimen shows us is almost as light as Albermarle. It breaks easily, and when broken shows a bright, shining fracture. In a coal stove it burns very much like ordinary bituminous coal. It is said to burn up quickly and leave but little ash.

TEMPERANCE LECTURE.—On Monday evening Mr. R. M. Barrett gave a lecture on "Temperance," at the Methodist Church, Little York. For more than an hour the lecturer instructed and entertained a good sized audience. The various phases of the temperance question were brought before the people, and they were urged to do their duty. Afterwards addresses were delivered by Rev. G. Steel and Messrs. G. Crockett and A. Brown. Robert Lawson, Esq. ably presided.

It is reported that Lieut. General Lord Alexander Russell, who passed through Halifax during the Trent affair in command of his Battalion, the Rifle Brigade, and was captured from Halifax to Quebec during the winter of 1811, will succeed General Sir Patrick McDougall, in command of the Forces of British North America. His term expires on the 24th of May, and will then proceed to England accompanied by A. D. C.'s, and secretary. Lord Russell is at present in England.

JAMES JAMIESON'S Court in Chicago was not so encouraging a place for young people contemplating visit on the 10th inst. There were forty-one divorce cases on call. It was the largest day's work in putting asunder those whom God had joined together that was ever held before any one Judge in Cook County. Eight cases were continued, and in thirty-three the divorce actually refused. So much marital misery was never before contemplated in so small a room, yet there was not one man who shed a tear, and she was much the prettier and most interesting of the crowd.

The Salmon River Mine in Nova Scotia is doing wonderfully well. A lot of bars aggregating 700 oz. was brought thence to town recently as the result it is said one month's work from one pit. It is not surprising when such "bonanzas" is discovered that a dispute as to ownership should arise. This is by large the richest mine ever discovered in Nova Scotia. The set of claimants who are now in possession have shrewdly bought up all the old original claim—which they could do—was Crown land—and have also staked it off into mining claims. The result is that no one can approach the property on which the mining operations are proceeding without incurring liability for trespass.—Halifax New Era.

A STORMY PASSAGE.—The steamer "Mississippi," of the Dominion Line, from Liverpool, G. B., arrived on Saturday afternoon last, after a tempestuous voyage of sixteen days. During the entire passage she encountered head winds, with tremendous high seas, which swept decks, carried off a complete set of sails, and damaged boats. On the sixth day out, about five o'clock, a. m., during terrific weather, the boatswain, named Hayes, went on deck, but no sooner had he got there when the wind blew him overboard, and he was drowned. No one was on the deck at the time, and consequently he was not seen, nor did any one of the crew know of the accident until about ten minutes after it occurred. While the steamer was sailing out of Liverpool harbor, during a dense fog, she ran against a pier and damaged her bow so badly that she was compelled to return for repairs. She brought out over fifteen hundred tons of freight to land at this port to be forwarded over the Intercolonial.—H. Herald.

The unusual circumstance of a marriage ceremony performed at the hour appointed for a funeral—in the same house and by one clergyman—occurred at Wilton, Conn., on the 14th inst., changing to thoughts of sadness what otherwise would have been fraught with joy. The death of ex-Town Clerk and ex-Representative W. D. Gregory took place on Sunday previous. He had been in failing health during more than two years. The marriage of his eldest daughter, Miss Anna M. Gregory, to Mr. George N. Pike, of Southport, Conn., was to have taken place Thursday, February 22, and cards of invitation had been issued. Often during his illness Mr. Gregory had requested that no postponement of the wedding arrangements be permitted should his demise occur before Washington's birthday. Most of those bidden to the wedding had come, some of them from distant States, a week in advance of what they had hoped would be a happy event, to that sadder one—the funeral—and these felt that inasmuch as it was the wish of the deceased the ceremony should be taken that day. Accordingly beside the open casket containing the dead, the living were made one, Rev. Frank Thompson, of the Congregational Church, a brother of Laus Thompson, the sculptor, officiating. With a benediction the bride and groom, in sombre attire, took seats with their mourning relatives, and the pastor began the religious exercises for the burial of the dead, closing with remarks touchingly eloquent, suggested by his brevity and uncertainty, given emphasis thereto by the picture he drew of nuptials and obsequies at one and the same time.

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
