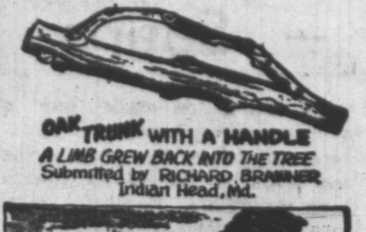

CONTRACT BRIDGE

North dealer Neither side vulnerable

NORTH

♠ A K Q 2

The bidding: North East South W E 1♣ Pass 1♦ Pass 2♥ Pass 2NT Pass

Opening lead—jack of hearts. The greatest asset in bridge is the ability to avoid error. What makes the game difficult is that the opportunity for error is endlessly present, and the pitfalls that exist do not blatantly assert their presence but, instead, frequently lurk in the background.

South was in three notrump. It looked like an easy hand to make. He won the heart lead in dummy, played a club to the ace and another one back to the king. When West showed out South was in trouble.

He crossed to his hand with a club and led a diamond to the ten, losing to the queen. East returned a spade. The defenders eventually took three spades and

two diamonds to inflict a one-trick set.

South should have made the hand; in fact, he should have made four notrump. It all goes back to a basic principle of dummy play: When a contract looks easy to make, it's a good time to ask yourself what can go wrong.

The application of this principle would have told South that the only way he could go down was if the clubs broke badly. He had eight top tricks to start with.

If the outstanding clubs were divided 2-2, the contract was a certainty. But if they were divided 4-1, there was danger of defeat, and this possibility had to be catered to.

What declarer should have done at trick two was lead the king of clubs from dummy instead of a club to the ace. When both opponents followed, the contract would have become certain to make.

A low club is then led from dummy. If East shows out, South allows West to win, thus assuring himself of four club tricks and the contract.

If East plays low to the second club lead, South plays the eight, again assuring the contract whether the eight wins or not.

And if East plays the ten or jack on the second club lead, declarer wins with the queen and makes ten tricks whether West follows or not.

It's just a question of preparing against bad breaks.
