**Georgetown Home And School Assoc.**

The regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Home and School Association was held in the Council Chambers on Thursday, March 2, at 8.15 P. M. with about twenty-five members present. The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. Myrtle Babineau and after the singing of "O Canada" the minutes of the preceding meeting were read and adopted.

Following the reading of the minutes, some discussion took place on the progress being made to secure a suitable supply of drinking water for the school. The secretary reported that permission had been obtained from Canadian National Railways to tap a small line off the Griffins Pump System, which they hold on lease from the Town. Mr. A. A. Gilmore, School Supervisor, suggested that the Association requisition the services of Mr. W. K. Sharp, Provincial Sanitation Engineer, for any technical advice required.

Mrs. F. J. DeLory suggested that a report be made on this project. The following committee was appointed to confer with the Mayor and Town Council in order to secure permission to pipe off a small line from the Griffins Pump System. Committee — J. B. Souley, E. Llewellyn, J. A. B. MacConnell, Mr. J. A. Gilmore, Mr. J. A. Boyce, seconded by Rev. S. J. MacConnell that discussion on this subject be adjourned until next meeting—Motion carried.

Mrs. Myrtle Babineau reported for the Committee which had been appointed to investigate the possibilities of raising funds for the Association by a public entertainment. The report brought forth was that at the present time such a program was not advisable.

The guest speaker for the evening, Mr. A. A. Gilmore, was then introduced by the president, Mr. Gilmore's remarks dealt with school attendance and Family Allowance. He emphasized the importance and necessity of regular attendance in order for the teachers to carry out properly, the course of studies Mr. Gilmore outlined the legal requirements and briefly stated the laws governing the payment of Family Allowances.

He also read an extract from a report, tabled by the late H. H. Shaw, which indicated that in 1943, the percentage of school attendance in Prince Edward Island was 70.3 per cent. Since the advent of Family Allowances, however, this has been increased to 82.5 per cent in 1949.

In conclusion, Mr. Gilmore recommended to those present, a publication entitled, "You and your Family", issued by the Department of National Health and Welfare. Following these remarks, the speaker answered various questions regarding school activities. At this point, a brief intermission was called, during which the ladies served sandwiches and tea. 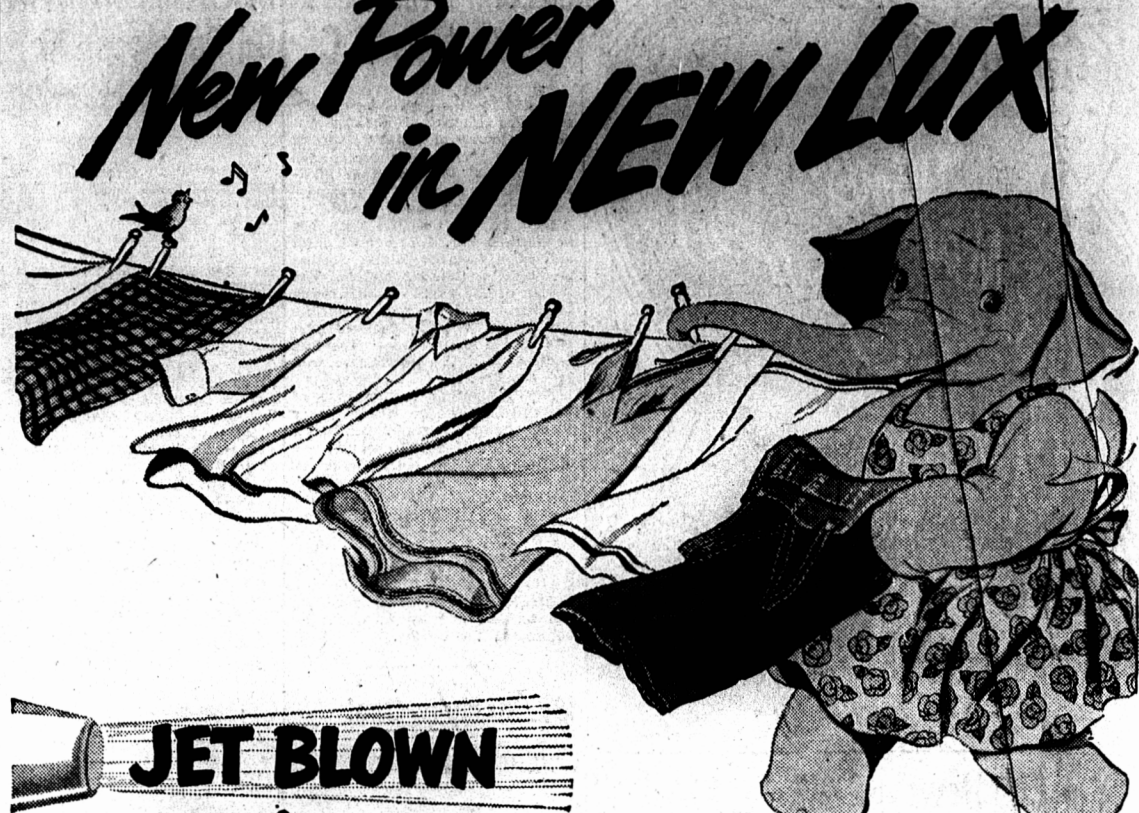
