

UIC Manager Discusses Roles

George Cheverie, manager of the Charlottetown office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, yesterday discussed some of the extra roles recently undertaken in this office.

For example, the Charlottetown office of the UIC, recently made an agricultural survey in the Province, dealing with a complete cross-section of the farmers, large and small. This survey was made to provide a more up-to-date picture of the employment of agricultural workers, their rates of pay, periods of employment etc.

Almost every person in the Province has been in touch, directly or indirectly, with the UIC recently as the Commission handled the registration for the Canada Pension Plan, Issuing of Social Insurance numbers, and the checking to prevent duplications which could be costly to an employee, has been no small task.

Two City Men Attend Meeting

C.W. Moffatt, general manager of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, and W.R. Brennan will join other members of the International Committee on the Corridor Road through the northern part of the state of Maine today. The meeting will take place in Bangor, Maine.

The Committee consists of 10 members from Maine, five from Quebec and five from the Maritimes.

The proposed corridor road, to be built through northern Maine, would cut the distance between the Maritimes and Montreal by some 200 miles. It would shorten travelling distance from Charlottetown to Montreal by five hours. The road would begin in New Brunswick a short distance west of Fredericton and end in Quebec east of Sherbrooke.

Maine officials have an interest in the road as it would serve to open up northern Maine for recreational and industrial facilities.

This is about the sixth meeting held by the Committee and Mr. Moffatt reports that interest is constantly growing. He said the idea of the road was conceived by Mr. Brennan many years ago.

The committee plans to submit a proposal to the Maine Legislature to conduct a survey on the feasibility of the road. This will be one item discussed at the meeting.

Mr. Moffatt and Mr. Brennan will return to the city Sunday.

Souris School Classes Cut

Classes in Souris Regional High School Wednesday were cancelled due to power difficulties.

The building was without both heat and light yesterday. Maritime Electric Company workmen restored the power which was believed to have been cut off in an underground circuit leading into the building.

Knud Jorgensen, Fredericton, and Horace E. Coles, city, were each fined \$5 and costs or two days for failing to stop at a stop sign.

A city resident was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for illegal possession of liquor.

House Opening To Be Seen Live

The first live television coverage of the opening of a session of the Prince Edward Island Legislative Assembly will take place Feb. 24 when the Island legislature opens. The coverage will include the reading of the Throne Speech by Lieut. Gov. W.J. MacDonald and the presentation of the message to the Assembly.

The program will be carried on CFCY-TV. The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation will provide a mobile television camera and video tape unit. Syd Kennedy, regional director of the CBC's Atlantic area, said yesterday that he had had a request from Premier Walter R. Shaw to provide the facilities necessary for the television production.

Mr. Kennedy explained the entire ceremony would only be seen on CFCY-TV, but the CBC would be using video tape highlights of the mace presentation for use on a national program called Maritime Gazette.

It is understood the mace, believed to be valued at some \$5,000, is being presented to the Legislative Assembly by the Canadian Branch of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

No Directive Given Crew Of Bonaventure

OTTAWA (CP)—Associate Defence Minister Cadieux said no directive was given the crew of the aircraft carrier Bonaventure before the tender call for the ship's refit that she would be going to a St. Lawrence River port.

Mr. Cadieux added in a Commons reply to Thomas M Bell (PC—Saint John-Albert) it was common knowledge in the fleet the Bonaventure could be repaired in only three yards—Montreal, Lauzon, Que, or Saint John, N.B.

As a result, a survey was made in each of these areas on housing, schooling and transportation facilities for crew members and their families.

Davie Shipbuilding Ltd. of Lauzon has entered the bid for the year-long refit of the ship.

DR. MARK MCGUIGAN Will Address Ass'n Dinner

Dr. Mark MacGuigan will be the guest speaker this weekend at the mid-winter meeting of the New Brunswick Bar Association in Saint John. The subject of his address will be "Civil Liberties and the Canadian Constitution."
