Directors Under New Bank Set-up Increased To Six

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 8.—The number of Government-appointed directors of the Bank of Canada under the new set-up proposed by the King Government, was increased from four to six by a motion passed through the House of Commons tonight by Finance Minister Dunning.

The House accepted the amendment to the government bill empowering the treasury to buy control of the bank in public control any likelihood of public control falling. With only four directors it would have been possible for the governor and deputy-governor to cast their votes with the seven private directors and thwart the Government. To make sure of it, the amendment increased the number of public directors to six and gave each of them two votes.

Gerry McGeer, the monetary reformer from Vancouver-Burrard continued his attack on the bill tonight but he made his peace with his fellow-Liberals. "It does not mean I am a rebel," he assured the government, referring to his opposition to the half-private, half-public set-up.

LOCAL SHIPPERS LOSE \$10,000 IN WRECK—Four local shippers lost approximately \$700,000 worth of livestock the wreck of the S. S. Maritima off the coast of Newfoundland last weekend it was learned yesterday. Shippers from Charlottetown and vicinity are estimated to have lost in all about \$10,000 in the wreck. Practically no part of the cargo shipped from here was insured. It included at the time of the wreck 80 head of cattle and 700 pigs, as well as general. Part of the cargo had been landed at St. Pierre before the freighter grounded.

MERGER BILLS DISCUSSED IN COMMONS

Problem of Surplus Staff Resulting Through Gov't Legislation Raised.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 9.—A suggestion from Opposition Leader Bennett that it would be better to retire surplus staff on pay or annuities than to keep them in offices where their services were not needed, featured consideration today of the government's bill to amalgamate departments.

Discussing in committee of the whole the move to unite the former departments of mines, interior, immigration and colonization, Mr. Bennett said only the difficulty arising from adding to the ranks of the unemployed had deterred his own government from effecting a similar change.

The former Prime Minister approved the intention of Hon. T. A. Crerar, who will head the new department, to select independent of the Civil Service Commission, directors who will head the various branches.

Mr. Crerar moved an amendment changing the proposed name of the department to that of "mines and resources" deleting the words "and colonization" appearing on the draft.

The bill merging the departments of mines, interior, Indian affairs, and immigration and colonization in a new department of resources and mines received its third reading and the House then took up the companion measure to merge the department of railways and canals, the department of marine and civil aviation branch of the Department of National Defence in a new department of transport.

One deputy minister and seven departmental directors are proposed under the government amalgamation and there would be a considerable saving in staff, M. Crerar said.

Second Free Park Site Offered Provincial Govt.

Aspirants to the rifle team Prince Edward Island will enter in the Inter-Maritime rifle match to be held here June 18, will hold a second contest to select Island lineup today.

First competition to determine riflemen to be used by Prince Edward Island in competition with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick was held here last weekend and P. J. Landrigan and Sergeant Roy Coles emerged topmost with scores of 104 and 102 respectively. The third lineup test match will be held next Saturday.

Prince Edward Island has not been winner of the Inter-Maritime rifle match since 1927 and a strong attempt is to be made to take the Maritime Province rifle championship when competition is held here June 18.

Aberhart Reduces Interest On Treasury Bills

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 9.—Finance Minister Dunning was not prepared tonight to comment on the further complications that have arisen between the Federal and Alberta governments because of the Social Credit administration's interest reduction on four-percent treasury bills tendered the Dominion as security for relief loans.

Announcement was made by Premier Aberhart in Edmonton today that only 2-1/2 per cent would be paid on these bills, in keeping with the Alberta government's general reduction of interest payments on all public indebtedness.

This follows closely upon a further renewal for one year of loans totalling \$2,250,000 which matured at the end of May and early this month, and for which the customary four-per-cent treasury bills were accepted as security.

Alberta has outstanding in relief loans from the Dominion about \$25,000,000 which are renewed from year to year and for which four per cent treasury bills are held in the federal treasury as security. What action will be taken, if any, has not been indicated.

Brilliant Career of Island Doctor

MONTEREAL, June 8.—The brilliant medical career of Dr. David W. MacKenzie, clinical professor of urology in the faculty of medicine at McGill University and head of the department of urology at the Royal Victoria Hospital, is marked by a long chain of successes and honors.

Few of those tributes, however, can compare with the high honor conferred upon him a short time ago by the American Urological Association which, at its annual meeting in Boston, elected Dr. MacKenzie to the presidency.

Dr. MacKenzie graduated from the Prince of Wales College in Prince Edward Island, and after receiving an honorary degree from Dalhousie University, attended the Medical School of Cornell University in New York, from which he graduated with honors.

Subsequently he became attached to the Bellevue Hospital, New York, first as junior attending surgeon in general surgery and later in urology.

Dr. MacKenzie organized the first genito-urinary service in New York city hospital, and previous to accepting a position on the teaching staff of the Cornell Medical School, he was chief of this service.

From Cornell he came to Montreal as urologist-in-chief of the Royal Victoria Hospital and professor of urology at McGill University, in 1917.

In 1930 Dr. MacKenzie received what was then considered as the highest honor in his profession when he was elected president of the American Genito-Urinary Association when the annual meeting of the body was held in Indiana.

Special attention was drawn to the fact that he was the first Canadian to occupy that outstanding post.

His election was made largely on the strength of his brilliant contributions to Canadian, American, British and European literature on his special field of research and practice.

Won Valuable Medal

Last June a further honor came to Dr. MacKenzie when the American Medical Society presented him with the silver medal for research work which he has done at the local institution.

More than 700 hospitals throughout Canada and the United States participated in this competition and the medal was awarded to Dr. MacKenzie as equivalent to second prize, the gold medal going to the Mayo Institute.

Dr. MacKenzie is a past president of the Clinical Society of Genito-Urinary Surgeons and was largely instrumental in organizing the first meeting of the association which was held in Montreal some years ago.

He is a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, a member of the Societe Internationale d'Urologie, in addition to holding or having held many other important posts in the world of medicine.

RENEWAL OF OTTAWA PACTS TO BE SOUGHT

Advance Guard Of Trade Experts To London Will Be Followed By Ministers' Visits.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 9.—An advance guard of Canadian permanent trade experts will journey to England shortly, followed by several general ministers of the Crown, to review the trade agreement between Canada and the United Kingdom negotiated in Ottawa in 1932. Formal announcement of this intention was made today by the government.

No details of the government's plans were made public but it was stated the experts and ministers would go "in view of the desirability of reviewing the trade agreement." No mention was made of the other Empire agreements, all of which expire in the fall of 1937 unless renewed.

It has been generally known for some time that about six ministers would leave for the Old Country as soon as their parliamentary duties were over. Those who will go primarily on the trade mission are Trade Minister Euler, Finance Minister Dunning and Agriculture Minister Gardiner.

For the Vimy Ridge memorial ceremonies in July it is understood Defence Minister MacKenzie, Pensions Minister Power and Labor Minister Rogers will also go to England as soon as they are free.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King has kept his plans to himself but it is known he is considering a visit to London as soon as convenient. There is a feeling he will go late this summer although in view of the necessity of his going next May for the coronation, this year's visit may be postponed.

In most circles it is a foregone conclusion that a general Imperial Conference will be held in London immediately after the coronation next spring. Meanwhile the Canadian government intends to review the 1932 agreements and arrive at a basis of negotiation under which they will be revised.

Already Trade Minister Euler has given an intimation that negotiations for resumed trade with Russia are under consideration and the expectation is that while he is abroad he will further that move, possibly himself visiting Moscow.

Trade affairs with Germany are also expected to be studied during the visit of the ministers in Europe, and there is the possibility that presence in London of trade experts from other Empire countries will be seized upon as an opportunity for trade discussions.

Rev. R.K. McIntyre Receives Appointment
