

## Black Hawks Down Bruins; Toronto, Rangers Draw

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks moved into a first place tie in the National Hockey League Wednesday night by beating the crippled Boston Bruins 4-2.

Scoring star Bobby Hull of the Hawks celebrated his return to action after missing four games because of an injured knee by assisting on three of the Chicago markers.

The victory, only the fifth at home for the Hawks against five defeats and a tie, moved them into deadlock for the top spot with idle Montreal Canadiens.

Boston was forced to play without injured defencemen Leo Boivin, Ted Green and Al Langlois. In their places were rookie Barry Ashbee, minor leaguer Dallas Smith, and Ed Westfall, who was moved back from right wing in the emergency.

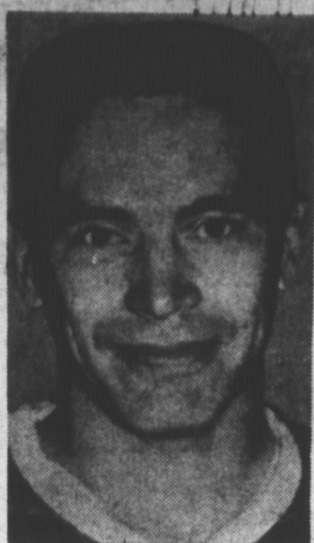
Rookie goalie Bernie Parent kept the game from becoming a rout with some spectacular netminding, despite the fact he suffered an injury to one of the fingers on his right hand in the first period while smothering a shot from close in by Hull.

### FIRE 43 SHOTS

The Hawks fired a total of 43 shots at the youngster, who was particularly rough on breakaways by Eric Nesterenko, Ken Wharram, and Bill Hay.

The Bruins got off to a lead early in the first period when Murray Oliver took a pass from behind the net by Johnny Bucyk and beat Chicago netminder Glenn Hall with a five-footer. Wharram evened the count at 18:52 by taking advantage of a misplay by Smith to skate in alone and drive a 15-footer past Parent's right pad into the corner of the cage.

Doug Mohns and Doug Jarrett put the Hawks on top 3-1 in the second period before Bucyk's pass in front of the Hawks cage bounced off Chicago defenceman Pat Stapleton's skate and into the goal. Chicago Maki

concluded the Chicago scoring in the final period.

### NEW YORK 2 TORONTO 2

NEW YORK (AP) — Third-period goals by George Armstrong and Eddie Shack earned Toronto Maple Leafs a 2-2 National Hockey League tie with New York Rangers Wednesday night.

The tie extended the Rangers' winless streak to four games, during which they have show-

ered opposition goalies with 158 shots but managed only six goals.

New York carried a 2-0 lead into the third period before Armstrong beat Ed Giacomin at 2:43 on passes from Frank Mahovlich and Dave Keon.

Shack tied it with his fifth goal six minutes later.

**SCORES FIRST GOAL**  
Jean Ratelle potted New York's first goal at 7:01 of the opening period on a pass from Doug Robinson. Robinson had broken up a Toronto rush at the red line and shovelled the puck to Ratelle who beat Johnny Bower on a wrist shot from 25 feet out.

Just 68 seconds later, Earl Ingarfield made it 2-0, finishing off a combination play with Bob Nevin and Donnie Marshall. Nevin took the puck at the left boards and passed to Marshall just inside Toronto's blue line. The veteran left-winger fed Ingarfield at Bower's left and

Earl faked once and then fired it home.

The Rangers completely dominated the first period, firing 19 shots at Bower while Toronto managed just six at Giacomin. The Rangers kept the pressure on the 41-year-old netminder the rest of the way as both teams spent most of their time in Toronto ice.

## Colleges Considering New 'Super League'

EDMONTON (CP) — The Journal says 10 Canadian University football teams have formed a "super league" to be in operation by 1967.

The newspaper says the OTV network will televise one game each week during the eight-week schedule and a post-season bowl game and "pay for all costs over and above regular costs."

The Journal says details were worked out at a meeting in Toronto Friday.

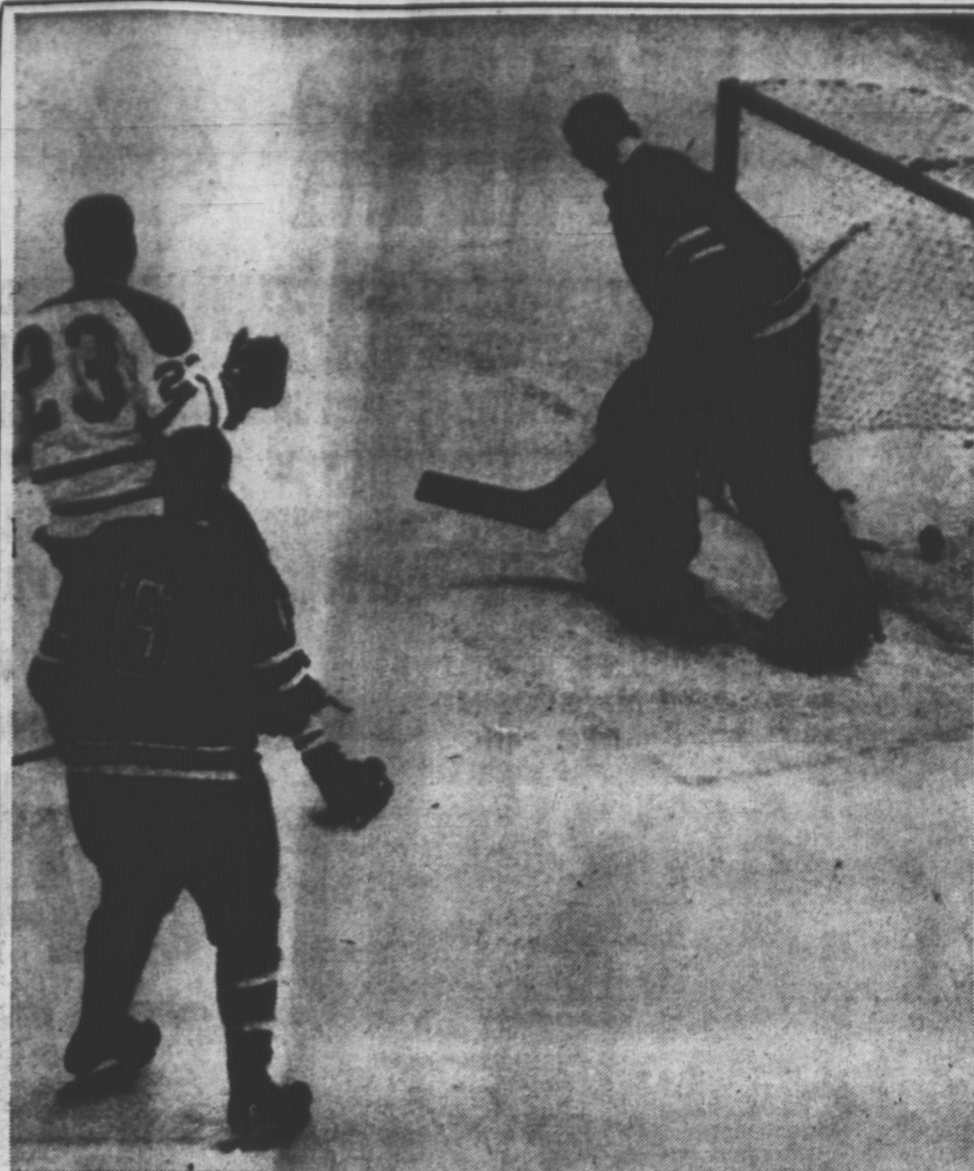
In Toronto, officials declined comment, but it was understood a statement would be issued today. The Journal says five teams will make up an eastern divi-

sion and five a western group. Division winners would meet in a national bowl game.

Listed as western members are the universities of British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Manitoba and the Calgary and Edmonton campuses of the University of Alberta.

Named as eastern members are the universities of Toronto and Western Ontario; Queen's University, Kingston; McGill University, Montreal, and St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N.S.

"Each of the 10 teams will play six games against opposition from its own division, plus two interlocking games," the newspaper says.

## Moncton Dumps Royals; Dorion Gets Six Markers

It was Phil Dorion night at the Forum last evening as far as the Moncton Hawks were concerned for this star member of their roster dented the twines six times and helped set up another marker as the Hawks laced the Royals 11-6 in an exhibition game. Charlotte-town's lack of games so far this season seemed to catch up with them in the third period as they were tied 6-6 with the Hawks as late as the 7:44 mark. However Moncton began to pull away in the latter stages of the game as they potted five unanswered goals.

The first period saw the play go from one end of the rink to the other and some steady checking. Stan Pearson, who later in the game was injured, opened the scoring on a scramble type goal at the 2:14 mark. Dorion started his one man assault on Donnie Frizzel as he clicked for a marker three minutes later and then Beaulieu got the Hawks ahead at the 10:42 mark. It was a lead Moncton was never to relinquish. Dave Lawlor ended a frantic scramble in front of the Moncton cage as he scooped the disc into the open net.

**SCRAMBLE SECOND**  
Hitting got a bit more frequent and it appeared as if the Hawks thrive on the heavy going as they took a 6-4 lead out of the stanza. Dorion scored a typical goal at the 28 second mark as he took a slapshot from the blue-line and steered it into the corner. Less than two minutes later he duplicated this feat. The Royals got one of these back as Angle Carroll hit with

a low shot from the left side of the net but Barrie came back with a shot that went under Frizzel's pad at the 8:08 mark. This was the first of a flurry of three goals in the last two minutes of the period. Dorion took a pass from Borque and blasted a slapshot past Frizzel to make the score 6-3 and then Alf Flanagan scored what was probably the nicest goal of the evening. Barrie received an interference penalty at the 19:58 mark and Carroll won the face-off deep in Hawk territory. Flanagan blasted a low shot into the cage.

The Royals came out with a vengeance in the third and two beautiful set up plays by Alf Flanagan got them tied up at 6-6. On the first Flanagan worked the puck from the corner to

right in front of the Hawk net and MacIntyre made no mistake with the rebound. Then four minutes later he dug the puck from the corner and put a perfect pass on the stick of MacLure who made no mistake with a wicked drive.

From then on it was all Moncton and their power play, which had served them so throughout the game fittingly gave them the winning tally. Hebert scored on a screen shot and the Royals were behind to stay. Gaskin tallied at the 12:15 point on a pass from Dorion. Dorion scored on a semi breakaway. A large contingent of SDU supporters journeyed across the rink midway through the period and installed themselves in the midst of the PWC fans and then the fun really began as far as fans were concerned.

## All Americans Are Announced

NEW YORK (AP) — Mike Garrett of Southern California and Don Anderson of Texas Tech, a repeater, are the halfbacks on the 1965 Associated Press All-America college football team named Wednesday.

Rounding out the offensive backfield are Steve Judy, the man who sparked Michigan State to No. 1 ranking, and Illinois fullback Jim Grabowski, first draft pick in the American Football League.

Notre Dame's Nick Rassas, Johnny Roland of Missouri and George Webster of Michigan State are the defensive backs selected on the 23-man squad which takes into account the two-division game.

The 23rd man is Charley Gogolak, the Hungarian-born, soccer style placekicker from Princeton who converted all 33 conversion tries and booted 16 field goals from as far away as 54 yards for 81 points.

The team was selected on the recommendations of the sportswriters and broadcasters who make up the eight regional boards. Performances in all games played through Nov. 27 were evaluated for the AP's 40th anniversary All-America team.

Jimmy Brown Needs One  
NEW YORK (AP) — Jim Brown needs only one more touchdown to the Lenny Moore's season record of 20 in the National Football League.

With three games to play the Cleveland Browns' fullback may break that record by so much that nobody will touch it. Brown already owns a host of the NFL records, including 124 career touchdowns and 12,077 yards in 115 games. He is within reach of another mark. Most touchdowns rushing in a season, 19, set by Jim Taylor of Green Bay in 1962. Brown scored 15 times by rushing and four on pass receptions in Cleveland's first 11 games. Brown is assured of an eighth rushing crown with a lead of 499 yards on his closest competitor, Timmy Brown of Philadelphia who has 810 yards. Brown also is the scoring leader with 114 points, followed by Tommy Davis, San Francisco's place kicker with 90.
