Islanders Edged 4-3 By Ramblers

AMHERST, N. S. (CP) — Amherst Ramblers humbled league-leading Charlottetown Islanders for the second time in a row Tuesday as they grabbed a first period lead and hung on to win 4-3 in a regular game of the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League.

Third place Ramblers had an edge in the play in all three sessions and Islanders goalie Jim Shirley was outstanding, especially in the third period when he stopped 13 Amherst drives, most of them from close in.

Two unanswered goals in the first period gave Amherst its victory margin.

Hank Therrien and Jack Schmidt tallied in the opener with Fern Bernaquez matching Hughie Campbell's second period goal. Bob Gray moved the Islanders to within one goal at 1:53 in the third but Shermie White noticed what proved to be the winner at 6:23. Steve Brklacich's "unassisted" goal at 8:52 was the final one of the game.

Buck Whitlock Still Leads Atlantic Coast Scoring Race

MONCTON (Special) — Roy (Buck) Whitlock of Charlottetown Islanders shot three goals and came up with four assists last week to boost his Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League scoring total to 65 points, five more than runner-up Bob Gray of the Islanders.

Figures released Tuesday night by league secretary Bob Chandler reveal that Whitlock now has 24 goals and 41 assists, while team-mate Gray has 28 goals, tops in the league and 32 assists for an even 60 points. Charlottetown's Ray Leduc is third with 57 points.

Only newcomer to the ACSHL list this week is Fredericton's Bill McDonagh, tied for seventh with two others. McDonagh has 12 goals and 28 assists for 40 points.

Rookies Get Attention From Baseball Scouts

NEW YORK (AP)—The bright young rookies of the class of '55 already are stealing the headlines in the Caribbean winter baseball leagues.

Men like New York Yankees' Elston Howard, St. Louis Cards' Ken Boyer and Bill Virdon, Pittsburgh's Bob Clemente and Brooklyn's Chico Fernandez have been attracting raves from the scouting brigade.

Howard, most valuable player in the International League with pennant-winning Toronto where he hit .331 last season, went to San Juan of the Puerto Rican league as a catcher. He was changed over from an outfielder last spring at St. Petersburg, Fla., although he did play the outfield occasionally for the Maple Leafs.

In Puerto Rico, Howard again is back in the field, playing right field, and batting around .340 at latest reports according to the Yank office.

Five Indians Sign Contract For 1955

CLEVELAND (AP)—Five Cleveland Indians are in the wigwag for 1955, big chief Hank Greenberg announced Tuesday. Outfielder Al Smith is the latest to ink his contract.

Smith had a good 1954 season, batting .281 and leading the club in walks with 88. He was tied for sixth in the league in runs-scored with 101.

Alouettes Lose Two Players

MONTRÉAL (CP)—Vic Obeck, vice-president of Montreal Alouettes, said Tuesday that neither Jim Stator nor Tex Coulter, tackles with Alouettes last season, will be back with the Big Four team in 1955.

Obeck said he "knew about" Coulter's signing with New York Giants and that Alouettes hadn't counted on him returning here anyway. Stator, husky lineman from North Carolina, is also not figured on, said Obeck.

One of last year's regulars who will be back is Hal Patterson, the two-way player who suffered a fractured ankle late in the season and missed the Big Four playoffs and the Grey Cup game.

Giants Drawing Men From Argos

TORONTO (CP)—New York Giants of the National Football League are after three more Toronto Argonaut players, bringing to six the number of Canadians on the Big Four invited to try out for the United States team.

Halfback Bill McFarlane, centre Elgin Hirst and linebacker Ken Foster, three first-year men with Argos last season, said Monday they received feelers from the Giants this week. Earlier, New York had asked back Johnny Fedosoff, Jack McGee and tackle Don Shaw to try for a spot.

McFarlane, Argos' stop college draft choice who led the Big Four in pass interceptions last season, said he was offered \$7,000. None of the three was inclined to rush to New York. They indicated they wouldn't do much about the offers.

Boucher Gets Green Light To Bloster N. Y. Rangers

NEW YORK (CP)—General manager Frank Boucher of the New York Rangers said Tuesday he has been authorized to spend "any amount of money" for players to bolster the National Hockey League team.

Boucher told a New York hockey writers luncheon that president John Reed Kilpatrick of Madison Square Garden had authorized the expenditure.

The Rangers are in fifth place in the six-team league, and have won only one of their last 20 games. Boucher did not elaborate on the plan to bring top-notch players into the Ranger fold, but he did predict that within 10 days the New York squad will begin to improve.

Earlier, Kilpatrick had said in an interview there are players he is particularly interested in acquiring, but declined to give details on the grounds it might compromise his bargaining position.

"We have been doing and will continue to do everything physically possible to strengthen our team," Kilpatrick told the luncheon. "Our moves and plans naturally cannot be discussed."

The president of the arena where the Rangers play their home games announced that henceforth all Sunday games will begin at 7 p.m., 1 1/2 hours earlier than has been the practice. The Rangers experimented with the earlier time last Sunday and drew the largest crowd of the season, 13,607 against Montreal Canadiens.
