## THE NEWS OF THE DAY.

Carefully Collected by "The Ex-  
aminer's" Reporters.

Boston has 9,781 gas lamps and 401  
electric lights.

Verdi has been at work on his opera for  
five years, and it is not yet done.

King Charles, of Roumania, has con-  
sented to mediate between the Czar and  
Prince Alexander of Bulgaria.

There are signs of cholera in Germany,  
and the authorities are taking strong mea-  
sures to prevent the spread of the disease.

Toronto papers are already recording  
deaths from drowning by early bathers in  
Lake Ontario. Two have been already  
reported this year.

It is reported in St. John Salvation  
Army circles that Rev. W. W. Brewer will  
shortly retire from the Methodist Church  
and join the army.

Her Majesty's birthday is to be kept in  
London on Saturday, May 22, and the  
usual official banquets will take place on  
the evening of that day.

The Dominion Government has decided  
to reduce the St. Lawrence canal tolls and  
Montreal harbor dues this season to the  
same rates as were charged last year.

The Quebec regatta committee have  
chosen Geo. Hosmer, of Boston, to meet  
Hanslan for a three mile scull race on Lake  
St. Joseph on 24th June for a purse of  
\$1,500.

A young widow has been arrested in  
Montreal on the charge of having poisoned  
her husband and only son to secure posses-  
sion of some property. Sufficient poison to  
cause death has been found in the intestines  
of both the victims.

Abraham Hurlbut, of East River, Yar-  
mouth county, N. S., was arrested there on  
the 17th inst. for threatening to shoot  
Richard White. Hurlbut is the man who  
is suspected of having murdered Trefoy  
over a year ago, and whose remains have  
not yet been discovered.

There is quite a flutter of excitement in  
Dublin society over the approaching Vice-  
regal Garden Party, at which the ladies are  
to appear in the costume of peasants of  
different countries, and both their dresses  
and the gentlemen's clothes are to be made  
entirely of Irish material.

Young man, it is a good thing to keep on  
the right side of your dollar. It makes a  
great difference in your comfort and pros-  
perity, says the *Springfield Union*, whether  
you spend 95 per cent. or 100 per cent. of  
it, but it is a positive insult to the dollar to  
spend 95 per cent. of it.

It is rumored that Sir John Macdonald  
will, after the House is prorogued, take a  
trip to British Columbia. Sir Adolphe  
Caron and Sir F. Middleton will also visit  
the Pacific Province. Mr. Thomas White  
some time ago stated that he purposed  
visiting the Western province.

What might have proved a most disas-  
trous fire occurred at Bridgewater, N. S.,  
on the 26th. About noon, while the family  
was at Church, the house of Solomon  
Bushman, situated on the outskirts of the  
town, took fire from within and was  
burned, together with most of the contents.  
No insurance.

In a letter dated Broadview (N. W. T.),  
15th April, received in Montreal yesterday,  
the writer says: "We finished sowing our  
grain to-day, and had a fine shower of rain,  
which has done great good. Wheat, which  
has only been sowed four or five days, is  
growing splendidly, and is beginning to  
show itself already."

The total value of exports from the  
United States during the 12 months ended  
March 31, 1886, were \$665,956,920, and dur-  
ing the preceding 12 months, \$743,791,013,  
decrease of \$77,834,093. The value of im-  
ports for the 12 months ended March 31,  
1886, were \$614,778,670, and for the pre-  
ceding 12 months \$596,202,655, an increase  
of \$18,576,015.

Mrs. McKinnis, who resides at New  
Canada, near Westcomagh, C. B., is now  
105 years and a few months old. Last week  
she walked to a son's house, distant one  
and three quarter miles, and back. Her  
mental faculties are bright as ever, her  
sight is good, and she moves and walks  
about the house sprightly. So says the  
*Moncton Transcript*.

John Folkins, of Studholm, King's Co.,  
N. B., was very agreeably surprised on  
Wednesday morning last. On entering his  
'byre' he discovered that during the night  
his stock of horned cattle had been aug-  
mented by four calves; to his herd of sheep  
twelve lambs had been added, in the pig sty  
he found ten pigs, and a lively young colt  
was dancing around its dam, none of which  
had ever been seen before.

The Right Hon. Sir Thomas Erskine  
May, K. C. B., who recently resigned his  
post as clerk of the House of Commons, is  
feeling much better. The long hours en-  
tailed by the late sittings of the House  
were too much for a man of over seventy;  
but since he has followed Sir A. Clarke's  
advice of "country life and early to bed,"  
he says he feels like a new man. Sir Er-  
skine May is a very popular gentleman,  
and he will very likely be offered a peerage,  
but as he has no son it is doubtful if he  
will accept the honor.

Public curiosity in the Crawford divorce  
case, which will be re-opened on the 4th  
prox. by the Queen's Proctor, has received  
an additional fillip. It has leaked out that  
the woman known as "Fanny," who it  
was reported some time ago, was on her  
way to Australia, is really in concealment  
in London and will be produced at the  
trial. It was believed at the time that it  
was in the instance of Sir Charles Dilke  
that the woman was got rid of, as her  
evidence was said to be very damaging,

and it is now stated that it is Sir Charles  
Dilke who is bringing the Anonyma for-  
ward.

A despatch to the *Halifax Chronicle*  
from Las Vegas, New Mexico, re-  
ports that the Rio Gallinas, which  
flows through that town, is greatly swollen  
by floods. The lower portion of the town  
is inundated, and several bridges and many  
dwellings have been swept away. The  
post office building has been completely  
destroyed, and the warehouse of the Con-  
tinental Oil Company has been wrecked  
beyond demolition. The round house and  
other buildings of the Santa Fe Railroad  
company, together with the property of  
several lumber companies, have been  
greatly damaged. The amount of the losses  
caused by the flood has not yet been ascer-  
tained.

The executive committee of the Irish  
National League of America has issued a  
circular to its members, congratulating  
them on the introduction in the English  
Parliament of Mr. Gladstone's home rule  
and land purchase bills, which, the circular  
says, "if passed with certain essential  
modifications pointed out by parliament,  
will, we believe, bring peace, happiness  
and contentment to our long-distracted and  
long-suffering country." The circular  
states that these measures are now  
scrupulously the most powerful and  
most assailable combinations, composed of  
men who from hereditary prejudices and  
class interests are the enemies of all human  
progress and popular rights, and says that  
every branch of the league should there-  
fore without a moment's delay, organize  
citizens' meetings, composed of the most re-  
presentative men of all shades of American  
politics and men of all nations, and by that  
means obtain in the form of resolutions  
such an expression of genuine American  
opinion as will strengthen the hands of  
Messrs. Gladstone and Parnell in the com-  
ing struggle. The members of the league  
should also use all their influence in their  
various states to induce the local  
legislatures and other representative bodies  
to follow the example of the legislatures of  
Ohio, New York, Connecticut and Rhode  
Island, and the parliament in Quebec, in  
passing appropriate resolutions and sending  
messages of encouragement across the  
water. The circular is signed by Patrick  
Egan, President; Chas. O'Reilly, Treasurer;  
and John P. Sutton, Secretary; and con-  
cludes with an earnest plea for honest and  
active work in securing the triumph which  
seems so near.

## The N. P.—How it Works East.

Your correspondent had occasion to visit  
a portion of the eastern part of the island,  
and, in associating with the people, could  
not help observing the many evidences of  
prosperity amongst them, notwithstanding  
the loud blustering of the irrepressible  
L. H. Davies, and the Grit M. P.'s gener-  
ally, that the island is on the verge of star-  
vation and bankruptcy. The farmers and  
mechanics of the east seem to be established  
upon a solid basis. The farmers are all  
supplied with the newest and most im-  
proved machinery. The mechanics, too,  
seem to be on a firm footing. Mr. Peter  
Rose, of North Lake, has lately added  
expensive machinery into his mill,  
which is now one of the finest  
and best equipped mills in the County.  
This year he has put in two new Turbine  
water wheels, each capable of supplying a  
force equal to twenty-three horse power.  
He has also added a new rotary carriage  
into his saw mill, and all the appliances  
connected with it, including a shingle mill  
of the most approved pattern, all manufac-  
tured by the Waterhouse Engine Works,  
Branford, Ont. Mr. Rose deserves the  
praise and patronage of the County for his  
enterprise. The veteran blacksmith, Mr.  
Patrick McInnis, is also driving a big trade.  
He has several assistants, and endeavors to  
satisfy his numerous customers. Mr. Mc-  
Innis never allows a bad job to leave his  
shop, and this to some extent is the  
secret of his increasing trade. The  
many lobster factories dotted around the  
coast at a distance of about five miles are  
all, without exception, preparing for work  
this season on a larger scale than  
ever, thus giving employment to hundreds  
of young men and girls, who would other-  
wise be necessitated to join the *Moncton  
Transcript's* exodus to the U. S.
