Councillor Louis Johnston presented to the Charlottetown City Council, at the regular monthly meeting last night, a series of proposals aimed at improving the administration set-up within the city corporation.

Councillor Johnston's recommendations are to be studied by the council as a committee, and brought to another regular meeting for discussion, probably next month. He also made several recommendations regarding purchasing in the city.

LOCAL BRIEFS

VIOLATION

OFFICER ARRIVES
On Sunday night Major-General W.A.B. Anderson, OBE, CBE, arrived in Charlottetown in connection with his former duties as Chief of Reserves. He is the newly appointed Chief of Mobile Command, Canadian Forces.

Dundee lost another of its oldest residents last week with the death of John Daveau who was 90 years of age. Mr. Daveau was a lobster factory foreman for many years and then followed the tinker trade until his retirement twenty years ago.

ANNUAL MEET
The Charlottetown Board of Trade will hold its annual meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel on Thursday.

The luncheon meeting gets underway with a reception followed by luncheon at 12.30 p.m. The guest speaker at the luncheon will be Major General H.R. Keefler, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

The president's report and the election of officers for the coming year will be other aspects of the meeting.

POOL OPENS
On Saturday the Kiwanis Wading Pool in Victoria Park was officially opened for the summer season. It will be supervised by the Red Cross Water Safety Division and will be open each morning to provide a supervised swimming area for children. The pool is located next to a city playground which equipped with the pool provide complete recreation area for the youngsters. Fran Whitlock a Red Cross safety instructor, will supervise the swimming classes in the pool.


MARKED INCREASE
According to figures released yesterday by Northumberland Ferries Ltd. in Charlottetown, a substantial increase in traffic was noted during May-June on Wood Island-Caribou ferry crossings.
During May and June of this year, 39,586 passengers crossed at Wood Islands compared with 32,462 last year for an increase of 7,124. The number of autos crossing last year was 10,975 and this year that figure jumped to 15,581, up 2,206 from a year ago. 3,115 trucks crossed in 1966 as compared with 2,581 in 1965 for an increase of 534.

The suggestions, although, they were not made public, deal with the committee set-up within the council. Speaking briefly on his proposals, Councillor Johnston noted that he felt that there were now so many committees within the council, that it was making the set-up cumbersome; and that a re-organization of these committees could serve to improve the system. He added that he also felt that minutes of each council committee meeting should be kept, and copies distributed to the other members of the council, in an effort to improve communication. There were suggestions of other matters of administration.

On purchasing, Councillor Johnston said that he felt each department head should make the purchases necessary for his own department, since, he added, much of the time of the city comptroller is now spent making these purchases. He also advocated a more extensive use of the tender system with two or more prices obtained for articles under \$100, written quotations for items between \$100 and \$500 and public tenders for anything over \$500.

Last evening's meeting was chaired by Mayor Walter Cox. Mayor Cox was absent from the June meeting attending the annual convention of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities in Vancouver, B.C. Commenting on that meeting, Mayor Cox said last night that both he and Councillor Nicholson had found the meeting most informative. He told the councillors that a complete report on the proceeding was available for their study.

Mayor Cox also noted that he and Councillor John Nicholson, chairman of the finance committee, who also attended the meeting, had done considerable lobbying in an attempt to have the 1968 convention come to Charlottetown. He said that he felt his efforts had been fairly successful and that chances ap-

peared good for having the meeting here. Commenting further on the matter Mayor Cox said that with a convention of that size there would certainly be many problems regarding accommodation and feeding to be ironed out, but he said it would certainly be a major boost to the economy of the city. In Vancouver, he said, it was estimated that delegates attending the convention left over \$500,000 in that city in five days.

Dealing with other matters, Mayor Cox noted that he was endeavouring to set up a meeting with officials of Central Creameries Ltd. and Maritime Electric Ltd. to discuss the problem of air pollution in the east end of the city.

T.D. DeBlais was re-appointed to the Charlottetown City School Board for another five-year term. Councillor Arthur Wright presented the bills.

There was a considerable amount of discussion among council members regarding an old house on King Street, which was recently torn down. It was brought to the attention of council that the debris had not been cleared away and it was decided to give the owner 24 hours notice and then proceed with legal action, if steps had not been taken.

Charles Moffatt presenting the Board of Trade's report to council, noted that Eastern Province Airlines had re-considered an earlier decision to cancel one of their scheduled Sunday flights. He said that with action on the part of the federal department of transport with regard to smaller airlines services, that is expected for fall, improved air transportation could possibly be expected.

Mr. Moffatt also brought to the attention of council some problems concerning mail deliveries. He said that many business firms had experienced in the past week, problems with having mail returned marked "incorrectly addressed." He said that these were in areas near Charlottetown and from now on must be marked with the rural route numbers. He added that this mail will now go for the four cent rate that is in effect in Charlottetown. Directives from the post office regarding these new regulations will be going out, he added.

The prime minister and other political leaders paid tribute to the memory of Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton who died Monday.
Finance Minister Sharp said the provinces have agreed to co-ordinate their administration of the student loans plan.
Transport Minister Pickersgill said there would be no increase in St. Lawrence Seaway tolls during the 1966 shipping season.
The Canada Assistance Plan sparked a vigorous, 95 minute debate in the Senate, before the bill was sent to committee for detailed study.
The government announced a change in the date ending the summer recess which is expected to begin this week. New target date: Oct. 3.
The Commons heard a strong mixture of support and criticism of the United States' policies on Viet Nam.
The Commons sits at 2:30 p.m. EDT to consider a resolution on medical care insurance. The Senate meets at 3 p.m.

BORDEN — Mayor Gilbert Bell presided at the regular monthly meeting of the Borden Town Council Monday night. Councillors Reginald MacAleer, Everett McKenna, William McEvoy and Bernard Fleming were present.

An order was passed that bills amounting to \$506 be paid. The police report was read by Councillor MacAleer. Constable J. Plomp was commended for his work.

An application was received from a Borden resident for a building permit to construct a drive-in restaurant on the property known as the Muttart lot. Estimated cost of this project is \$25,000.

Mayor Bell announced that he would accept an invitation from the Federal Minister of Public Works to attend a technical briefing in connection with the construction of the Northumberland Strait Causeway. The briefing will be held in Charlottetown on Thursday, July 14, and the Federal Minister, Hon. George McElraith will attend.
