Tricks that are Vain.

Mr. Premier Peters imagines he can escape the consequences of his corrupt interference with the affairs of the Land Office by the tricky work of Mr. Balderston's letter, and the equally tricky comments of the Government organ upon it, he will have a somewhat rude awakening one of these days.

Compared the credit entries in the Township Ledgers for the whole of the year 1891 with the entries in the Cash Book, and afterwards examined the Cash Book for unchecked items.

Messrs. Carvell and Arnaud say that they—

Compared the entries on the debit side of the Cash Books with the credit entries in the Township Ledgers and examined the Cash Books and ledger entries for unchecked items.

It will be observed that while Mr. Balderston slavishly follows the form of Messrs. Carvell and Arnaud's report in all other respects, he leaves out the words we have placed in italics. Why were these words, "and ledger entries" omitted? Simply because Mr. Peters did not want any inquiry into the many hundreds of credit entries in the ledgers, for which no corresponding entries were made in the Cash Book, and which, as a matter of course, remained unchecked when the comparison was completed.

But although Mr. Balderston does not say that he examined the ledgers for unchecked items, or, in other words, for entries not having corresponding entries in the cash book, yet it was impossible that he should be ignorant of their existence or of the fact that they represented many thousands of dollars.

Who will be the next to be dragged into the mire through Mr. Peters' arbitrary and tricky conduct? Already the Legislative Councilors have been grossly deceived into voting away their own seats by their assurances regarding the two-thirds vote clause; the Commissioner of Public Lands has got himself into deep trouble by permitting the unscrupulous Premier to dictate in the business of that department; and the Provincial auditor has sacrificed his usefulness by signing his name to an ambiguous, misleading and erroneous report.

Direct Taxation in Quebec.

In full view of heavy direct taxation as a direct result of the Government's ruinous policy of giving away our Land Office assets, imposing a debenture debt upon the country and continuing to heap up deficits, the measures to be adopted for the direct taxation of the people of Quebec, as a result of the rule in that province, have for the people of Prince Edward Island a special significance. The resolutions now before the legislature of Quebec provide for an annual tax on all manufactures of \$50 if the capital employed is under \$50,000; \$100 on a capital upon to \$100,000 and \$150 if over that sum.

The Redistribution Bill.

This bill is being amended as it passes through committee. The Government are acting in a moderate and reasonable way. When a mistake is pointed out, the point is considered and corrected. The just and conciliatory conduct of the Government contrasts favorably with the obstructive tactics of the Opposition.

Although nine of the persons engaged in the lynching of the negro at Port Jervis were fully identified, the coroner's jury brought in a verdict that the negro came to his death by a person or persons unknown. This is not to be wondered at. A South Carolina Governor, the Hon. Mr. Tillman, made the solemn and public avowal that, in his official position, he would assault a white woman. Justice is not so administered in British countries.

Notes and Comments.

Referring to Dr. Douglas' attack upon Sir John Thompson the Chignecto Post, of Sackville, N. B., says: "This is a Methodist University town, and yet after careful enquiry we have not found one single person, in the university or out, who approves or justifies the intolerance and injustice displayed by the reverend doctor."

The Empire: Mr. Laurier has been eloquently protesting against the Quebec redistribution as a very wicked thing, but his supporter, Mr. Gauthier, having been unseated, the Association declines to stand, and Mr. Jeannette, Conservative, is allowed to go in by acclamation. This is a gain for the Government right in the face of the Opposition clamor.

W. H. Howland, president of the prison reform association, of Toronto, interviewed Sir John Thompson a few days ago and advocated the establishment by the Dominion of a reformatory for young men, and also the institution of a system of probationary sentences. Sir John expressed himself gratified to receive representations from the association. The suggestion is a good one. A reformatory is needed—at least in this part of Canada.

We are glad to have Mr. Victor C. O'Brien's letter, correcting the mistakes of THE EXAMINER concerning Cornell University. The statistics we quoted were from a standard authority and the latest to hand at the time. But the additions and improvements to Cornell have been made so rapidly that they greatly misrepresented the present strength and sphere of the University over which Dr. Schurman presides.

The importance attached to the forthcoming congress of the Chamber of Commerce of the British Empire may be judged by the fact that Mr. Erasmus Wiman is very anxious to be one of the representatives. This gentleman applied to be appointed by the Board of Trade of Toronto, and when his application was refused turned his attention to Bradford. The hon. of Unrestricted Reciprocity alias Annexation would like to try to influence the council of a convention assembled to devise means for drawing closer the commercial interests of the British Empire. His desire will not, probably, be gratified.

The Montreal Gazette reports that "the Dominion Alliance for the suppression of the liquor traffic has issued an appeal for money to enable it to present its case before the Royal Commission now sitting in Montreal. Those who believe that prohibitions are wise and practicable have now the opportunity of showing by their works the fact that is in them. It will have to be a very strong case that will persuade Parliament to pass a prohibition law. There never has been in the House of Commons a majority which regarded prohibition as a practicable policy. The question when brought up has been met by a side issue or avoided through a meaningless amendment. If the bulk of the evidence gathered by the commission goes to support the idea that prohibition does not prohibit, and that to enact a prohibitory act would only repeat in the nation the story of the Scott Act in some parts of it, Parliament will have a good reason for refusing to consider a law that would be commercially as well as socially revolutionary. The Alliance circular does not put the case too strongly."

The Lobster Fishery.

OTTAWA, June 19.

It has been represented to His Excellency that on account of the small size of the lobsters on a certain section of the coast of P. E. Island, the enforcement of the size limit of nine inches provided by the existing regulations, would effect a practical closure of the lobster canneries in that district. It has also been represented that an addition of fifteen days to the close season for lobsters on these coasts would be a fair equivalent for the suspension of the size limit, as the number of lobsters that would thus be saved during the present season would work an effectual means for the preservation of the lobsters as the enforcement of the size limit during the whole open season. The existing regulations therefore, has been suspended, so far as they relate to the lobster fishery in an easterly and northwesterly direction to East Point, thence in a westerly direction to the north side of North Cape, and to that portion only within these limits. No person shall fish to catch, kill, buy, sell or save in their possession any lobsters between July, 1892, and first January next.

Educational.

LUNenburg, June 19. The Methodist Conference met yesterday forenoon discussing educational matters. A campaign is to be started in all the circuits, culminating in the semi-centennial at Sackville next January, to raise an endowment fund of at least \$100,000. To-morrow an interesting discussion on the supererogatory fund is expected. There may be a lively time on the subject if the conference does not go far enough to suit the members added to the third party.

Blake Accepts.

TORONTO, June 19. It became known early yesterday that Hon. Edward Blake had signed his acceptance of the seat offered to the ex-labor leader by Mr. Justin M.Carthy and other Irish Nationalists in the imperial parliament at Westminster.

Found Drowned.

VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., June 19. Edward Boisvert, better known here as Edward Greenwood, a native of P. E. Island, harness maker, was found drowned to-day.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, June 17.—The Vienna correspondent of the News says: "While at Copenhagen the Czar expressed his intention to attend the wedding of the crown prince of Roumania to Princess Marie of Edinburgh. It is expected that the wedding will occur in England. One result, therefore, will be a meeting of the sovereigns of England, Russia, Germany and Roumania."

QUEBEC, June 17.—A gentleman who has just returned from St. Nazaire reports immense damage done by the late cyclone. Over one hundred and fifty buildings were demolished in that place, involving the loss of over twenty of the grand hotels. Three lives are known to be lost and eight people seriously injured, some of whom will die. The storm was the worst that ever visited that section of the country.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 17.—A despatch from Sedro, Wash., says James A. Nelson, foreman at Smith Camp, on the line of the Monte Cristo Railroad, was murdered by four Italian employes on Wednesday. Some of the other men at camp became so enraged at the brutal murder that they seized the Italians and lynched the four in quick order.

WINDSOR, June 27.—It is unofficially announced that the Manitoba general elections will take place in July.

BELFAST, June 17.—The Ulster Convention opened in this city to-day. Work was generally suspended. Shops and houses are decorated and mottoes displayed expressive of Ulster's determination never to submit to the rule of an Irish parliament. The streets are crowded. The Duke of Abercorn presided.

LONDON, June 17.—Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. Mr. Harvey, of Newfoundland, have had several conferences at the foreign office respecting Spanish trade relations with Canada and Newfoundland. The outlook is not very hopeful, but it is expected that a satisfactory arrangement will be arrived at.

BELFAST, June 17.—Resolutions were adopted at the meeting to-day regarding a determination to remain an integral portion of the United Kingdom; protesting against the establishment of an Irish parliament, declaring that such an establishment will inevitably result in disorder, violence and bloodshed, and announcing that the Ulsterites will take no part in the election or proceedings of such an parliament.

MARRATO, Milan, June 17.—The latest developments substantiate the grave death loss will amount to at least 30, and 17 bodies have been recovered thus far, with a large territory to be recovered.

LONDON, June 17.—Lord Rosebery speaking at Keiso, Scotland, yesterday, said when the details of the Home Rule measure were divulged it would be found to be as firmly settled as the Magna Charta. He declared it is a crime to hint at civil war to accomplish political ends.

LONDON, June 17.—The Chronicle, commenting on the interview between Gladstone and the deputation from the London Trades Council, declares that the leaders are dissatisfied with the result of the conference and have freely expressed the opinion that Balfour and Lord Salisbury would have treated the question in a more straightforward manner. "The sum of the position," the Chronicle adds, "is that Chamberlain alone among the political leaders is in favor of the eight-hour system."

Obituary.

Henry Found, the well-known tailor, died yesterday afternoon after a short illness. He was 78 years of age.—Halifax Chronicle.

Mr. Found did business in Charlottetown for many years, and will be well remembered by our older citizens as a tailor, a politician and an advocate at the bar. While he excelled as a knight of the needle he possessed a versatility of talents. Tailors are always politicians, and Henry Found and Dandy Walsh upheld the reputation of their craft in this respect in the ranks of the old Liberal party of Colchester and Whelan. Mr. Found was an able debater and was a leading figure in all political gatherings of those historic days. As an advocate he distinguished himself in the suit of Thomas vs. Found, an action of trover brought against him in our Supreme Court by the late John T. Thomas, to recover a \$5 treasury note found by his son among the sweepings of Thomas' shop. The late Judge Pope acted as counsel for Mr. Thomas and Mr. Found pleaded his own cause and triumphantly won a verdict.

Merchants Bank of P. E. Island.

SIR.—The directors of the Merchants Bank of P. E. Island propose to pay a dividend of four per cent. on 1st July next. Now, this date will be seven months from the date of payment of the last dividend, viz. 1st December, 1891. By carrying out this plan we will receive one-sixth less than we have hitherto received. The directors should pay us seven months' dividend at the rate of eight per cent. per annum.
