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## NEW DEMOCRATS SPEAK

The New Democrats program proposes to protect and maintain the family farm by helping to establish a system of producer controlled marketing organizations across Canada. What does the program of the Liberals and Tories propose to do about marketing? Well first of all neither of them have published a detailed program or platform based on decisions made by their party conventions. Their leaders are making promises on local circumstances and opportunities when they are speaking — but no overall program yet. It's supposed to be free enterprise without Government intervention in any kind. But in '57 Last week the Federal Minister of Agriculture told western wheat growers "You grow the wheat — we sell it!" then Mr. Pearson promised the same farmers a minimum guaranteed price, if elected, of \$2.00 per bushel. And in the same speech they called the New Democrats "socialists". How possible do you think people are?

The Prime Minister and his local candidates just before the last election promised Island farmers "parity prices which would guarantee at least their cost of production plus a fair operating profit." See Guardian's lead half May 13th. Have we more reason to believe them, now?

POTATOES The local "farmer" Liberal Candidate in his TV speech last Wednesday night emphasized how the Liberal Government sold potatoes to Britain since 1947 and that a Government official in Maine arranged a sale of potatoes to Europe just recently. But he conveniently forgot to explain how it was possible to accept and announce such orders with the confidence that they could be filled.

It is for the same reason that Mr. Hamilton could negotiate a deal with China for about \$100 million worth of new trade marking organizations and costed their product on a volume basis sufficient to tender on, and accept large orders. Maine can accept large contracts and needs a market of 100 million to fill them. They have their very strong potato growers organization today too. But our potato producers have no, they did though at the time of the British Columbia order — the P. E. I. Potato Growers Ass'n. This organization was then strong enough to handle the order. But since it has been disbanded, mainly by people who are not in control of the Liberal Party on the Island — the same people that so openly and violently opposed the setting up of a potato marketing plan.
