

CANADA.

With great satisfaction do we learn, from Kingston, that the Governor General has received a communication from the Home Government, of a most important nature, as far as the interests of the province are concerned, and one which our whole population will be delighted to hear. It contains a proposition to the effect, that if our Parliament will repeal all duties on British manufactures, and impose a reasonable duty on all foreign importations, the products of Canada shall be allowed to enter the ports of Great Britain duty free. For this happy result we are, to a considerable extent, indebted to the exertions, in England, of Mr. W. H. Merritt.—Ningara Chronicle.

QUEBEC, Sept. 12.—Yesterday we were enabled to furnish our readers with the Governor General's speech at the opening of the second session of the first Parliament of United Canada. His Excellency most appropriately alludes, in the introductory part of his speech, to the chequered events which have transpired in relation to the mother country and to this dependency of the Empire since the last session; he then passes on to state that Her Majesty's Government have ratified the promise made by their predecessors to guarantee the loan contemplated by this Province; informs the Legislature of the impracticability of carrying into effect the arrangements proposed last year for the assistance of deserving emigrants; but that in redemption of the pledge made upon the subject, a grant of money had been obtained from the Imperial Parliament, in aid of destitute emigrants upon their arrival in this country. With reference to the concluding part of this paragraph, however, namely,—that no serious destitution has prevailed among the large number of emigrants who have arrived directly from the mother country, or through the neighbouring states, during the present season,—we humbly conceive that a careful investigation of facts connected therewith would tend very materially to invalidate the assertion. The condition of the public revenue, through the instrumentality of increased duties upon imports, is stated to be highly satisfactory, and the financial and commercial interests of the province, we are told, will be essentially promoted by the operation of the Tariff Bill lately agreed to by the Imperial Legislature. That they have not been promoted by the late alterations in the duties on the staple commodity of the country, may easily be ascertained by visiting our wharves and mercantile counting-houses. But any allusion to this or to the Address of the Legislature at its last session upon this subject, is carefully avoided. His Excellency then proceeds to review the operation of the great measures passed last session, and intimates that modifications and amendments will be proposed with respect to "certain of them," among which are enumerated the District Council and Education Bills, measures which, it is admitted by all parties, are exceedingly defective and inoperative. The re-organization of the militia is then spoken of, in connection with alleviating unnecessary pressure upon the people. In conclusion, His Excellency assures the Legislature of his cordial co-operation and support in perfecting these and other measures, which have for their object the advancement of the welfare of the province, and winds up by announcing that we have at length recovered from a state of severe trial and danger, and that a bright dawn now opens upon our prospects. We are inclined to think, that in the utterance of this sentiment by His Excellency, "the wish has been father to the thought," but nevertheless trust that under his administration a consummation so desirable will be arrived at.—Nelson's Gazette.

In another column of this day's paper will be found a letter signed PHILIPPIA, originally published in the London Emigration Gazette, and to which we beg leave to call the attention of our readers. The subject of this communication cannot fail to prove interesting to the inhabitants of this Island especially, and to those of the Sister Colonies in general. We need make no further comment, at present, as the article will speak for itself.

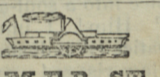
