Battle With Ice Floes Reported

MONTREAL, Aug. 9.—(CP)—An 11-day battle with ice floes that threatened to engulf and crush the supply ship Regina Polaris was described by Capt. H. C. Bannerman today in a message received here from Churchill, Man.

The ship, now working from the Hudson Bay port after repairs, was the first into the bay this year. She sailed from Montreal a year ago on her annual voyage to Arctic outposts.

"We had a terrible trip up," Capt. Bannerman said. "We got caught in heavy ice at the entrance to Hudson Straits and could not get out of it. It took us 11 days to get through."

When the ship cleared the ice-field the engines broke down. After nine hours of frantic repairs, the crew managed to get them going.

Capt. Bannerman said his ship was in touch with the Government icebreaker N. B. McLean at all times on the trip.

"The passengers didn't worry and we never heard a complaint," he said.

U. S. Declares Russia Can Stop Korean War

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Aug. 9.—(AP)—The United States bluntly declared that Russia has the influence and power to call off the North Koreans from their invading war.

Warren R. Austin, chief U.S. delegate, told the United Nations Security Council during a bitter debate that Russia is obstructing the Council's will on the Korean question.

He said the Council sessions could be stalled all this month by the tactics of Jakob A. Malik, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister, who is president of the Council for August.

"This is the challenge we must meet," Austin said.

Countering Malik's charges that the U. S. is the aggressor in Korea, Austin asked among a list of probing questions and answers: "Who has the influence and the power to call off the invading North Korean army? The Soviet Union."

The U.S. delegate fired his broadside at Malik directly after Malik accused the U.S. of using "gangster" methods in trying to force decisions on the Council. Malik also put up a resolution proposing that the Council order the Americans to cease bomb attacks on Korea's people and towns.

Austin called for an adjournment to allow the Soviet delegation to obtain instructions from Moscow "which will enable the Security Council to function."

Malik responded that the Soviet delegation had all the instructions it needed, and suggested the U.S. wanted time to consult its "satellites."

The Council accepted Austin's recommendations without a vote and adjourned until 3 P. M. E. D. T. Thursday.
