For those four months the cumulative value of domestic exports to the United States was \$551,800,000, compared to \$455,800,000, while foreign exports increased to \$3,000,000 from \$6,200,000.

Imports from the United Kingdom declined in April to \$29,500,000, compared to \$30,100,000. Domestic exports to the United Kingdom, however, were down sharply to \$28,800,000 from \$63,000,000.

Allowing for a small amount of foreign exports, there was a debit balance of \$3,900,000 in the month with the United Kingdom, compared to a credit balance of \$38,400,000 a year earlier, and a small debit balance of \$2,400,000 in March this year.

Will Discuss Health Grants At Biennial Nurses' Convention

How public health grants made by the Federal to the Provincial authorities have stimulated the work of all health agencies will be reviewed at the biennial convention of the Canadian Nurses' Association to be held at Vancouver, June 26 to 30.

More than 1200 delegates from all parts of Canada will attend the five days' meetings in the University of British Columbia, of which three afternoon sessions are to be devoted to work conferences covering a wide range of activities.

The Ottawa announcement in 1948 that health grants would be made available to each province has stimulated the work of all health agencies, and made possible developments which were in the minds of many health workers as rather impossible dreams.

Public health nursing has shared in making some of these dreams come true, and reports received from provinces indicate great developments in establishing new services, in enlarging existing ones, and in experiments with special projects.

The report of the committee on health insurance to be presented by Miss Florence H. M. Emory, will support certain recommendations already made by the national executive arising out of the de-

clared policy of the Federal Government to use health grants to survey the need and then build up services and personnel through which a plan of health insurance could function effectively. These recommendations include appointment by Ottawa of a nurse whose function would be to coordinate the findings of the provincial surveys related to nursing.

Canadian Trade Figures For April Are Announced

OTTAWA, June 14—(CP)—Canada knocked down her trading deficit with the United States a bit more during April, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

For the second successive month, this country showed a small debit balance in trade with the United Kingdom.

In trade with all countries, there was an adverse balance in April for the fourth successive year.

Imports from the U. S. in April declined to \$162,200,000 from \$177,300,000 a year earlier while domestic exports to the U. S. increased to \$137,800,000 from \$110,700,000.

As a result of April transactions, the debit balance for the month fell to \$22,900,000 from \$85,100,000 in April last year.

For the four months ended April 30, the cumulative adverse balance fell to \$80,900,000, compared with \$197,900,000 a year ago.

For those four months the cumulative value of domestic exports to the United States was \$551,800,000, compared to \$455,800,000, while foreign exports increased to \$3,000,000 from \$6,200,000.

Tax Dodge May Save Yank Shippers Millions

SEATTLE, June 14—(AP)—A legal tax dodge that may save American shippers millions of dollars was reported yesterday.

It's a method of avoiding the three-per-cent United States federal freight tax by paying freight bills in Canada — with sanction of the Federal Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Railroad officials here said the plan already is in operation. The Seattle Times said the situation grew out of the practice of purchasing passenger tickets in Canada to avoid the 15-per-cent transportation tax levied by the Federal Government.

The Times said a Seattle traffic expert, not named, got the ruling from the Internal Revenue Bureau. The ruling is that if shippers send their own representatives to Canada, or if they have a bona fide representative in Canada, the freight

bills can be paid minus the tax. The Federal Bureau is reported to have turned down proposals to pay such bills by mail, or through Canadian banks.

One railroad official, declining use of his name, said at least three or four rail lines have started the practice. They are insisting on payment in United States funds, refusing Canadian money.
