HOW THE GRAND BANK OF NEWFOUNDLAND WAS FORMED.

What a marvelous influence upon civilization and human progress the humble but nutritious codfish has had. He has been a mine of wealth to a vast population. It seems that good mother nature, for seeing the needs of humanity, has made special preparations for a good supply of this very necessary article of food for body and brain; she floated her icebergs, which were filled with the sandy bottom of the Northern seas, down to the Gulf Stream, where they melted and deposited their debris, forming the Grand Bank of Newfoundland.
