'TREASURE OF THE GOLDEN CONDOR' AT CAPITOL THEATRE, SUMMERSIDE

—Exotic and menacing Guatemala forms the unique and exciting background for the new Twentieth Century-Fox adventure drama, "Treasure of the Golden Condor," now at the Capitol Theatre. Starring Cornel Wilde and Constance Smith and photographed in color by Technicolor, the film is the first to have been actually made on authentic location sites in the mysterious and colorful Central American country. Stars Wilde and Miss Smith, the Irish lass who has scored in a brace of Hollywood-originating product, went to Guatemala along with supporting player Finlay Currie, director Delmer Daves and a large technical crew to bring back some of the most arresting footage yet displayed on screens since the film industry embarked on its series of treks to far-away lands for true film backgrounds. It is these scenes which dominate "Treasure of the Golden Condor," which frames them with a suspenseful account of the discovery of a treasure map and the beginning of the hunt for hidden treasure that takes the leading trio half-way around the world. Romance is ably pictured by Wilde and Miss Smith, and character delineation is in Currie's large, capable hands, with Wilde sparking the action in a number of gripping and adventure-laden scenes, including one in which he wrestles with an all too real man-crushing boa constrictor.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. JAMES MCINNIS

At his home in Anglo-Tignish, on February 24, they passed peacefully away to his eternal reward, James McInnis at the advanced age of 89 years. He was the second of a family of eight born to the late Peter McInnis and Mary McCue. A brother, Joseph and a sister Mrs. Lina Shea are the sole survivors. Jim, as he was familiarly known, was a hard working, honest and efficient farmer, always on the alert, ready to adopt any improvement that might benefit and advance the status of the agricultural community in which he lived. In early life he married Elizabeth Doyle, from which happy union, was a family of six: Mary Olive (Sister St. Elizabeth of Portugal, Congregation of Notre Dame); Albert, a prosperous construction foreman in Toronto, Ont.; Ralph, on the homestead; Ethel (who died at the age of 3 1/2 years); Clara, (Sister St. Mary Clare, Congregation of Notre Dame); and Alvin (who died in babyhood.) The success of his children was always a cause of pride and joy to him, and he loved to talk about their achievements in winning scholastic honors and prizes.

An enthusiastic and devoted parishioner of St. Simon and St. Jude's parish, he would let nothing interfere with his attendance at Sunday Mass. He might be obliged to turn back because of snow banks, but just the same he always made the attempt to adore His God in Church. For many years he was a faithful member of the C.M.B.A., and A.O.H., societies and he never failed to take part in the annual parochial parade on St. Patrick's day.

A staunch Conservative he took an active part in politics, and his family, friends and neighbors were given the benefit of many a discussion on the success or failure of the Government to better the

conditions of the Province. The last nine years of his life were spent in partial inactivity but still he insisted on performing the ordinary "little chores" known to every householder. A week before his death he suffered a dislocation of the collar bone which confined him to bed. Every care which filial affection and medical skill could devise was given to the patient. The last rites of the church were administered by Reverend John A. MacDonald.

The funeral, which, in spite of bad roads, was largely attended, was held on February 27. A Solemn Requiem High Mass was chanted by Reverend John A. MacDonald, P.P., assisted by Rev. Emmanuel Richard as deacon and Rev. Denis Gallant as sub-deacon. Pallbearers were six nephews of the deceased: Messrs. Earle McInnis, Gregory McInnis, Max McInnis, Alonzo McInnis, David McInnis and Earle Brennan. The service at the grave was conducted by Reverend John A. MacDonald. The large number of Mass Cards, Spiritual Bouquets, Purgatorial enrolments and messages of sympathy received by the family testify to the high esteem in which the late Mr. McInnis was held. R. I. P.
