## Frank Eddolls Being Sent To Cincinnati Club

CINCINNATI, Jan. 7 (AP) — General manager Alex Sinclair of Cincinnati Mohawks of the American Hockey League, announced tonight that Frank Eddolls, veteran defenceman from Lachine, Ont., is being sent here by New York Rangers.

Eddolls, who played five years in the National League, is due to join the lumbering Mohawks in Buffalo Wednesday night. He started the season with the Rangers and then was sent to Saskatoon of the Pacific Coast League as a playing coach. He recently was called back by the Rangers.

Sinclair also said that Jean Plante, 20-year-old amateur defenceman, is being returned by the Mohawks to New York Rovers of the Eastern Amateur League. Plante played three games here on a tryout basis.

## Eddie Stanky No "Alibi Manager" Tells Newsmen

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 7 (AP) — Eddie Stanky, new skipper of St. Louis Cardinals, says he will not be an "alibi manager." In a week-end interview at his home in Mobile, Ala., home with Tom Slick, sports columnist of the Knoxville News-Sentinel, the baseball player declared:

"I'm not going to be an alibi manager. If I have something to say to a player, I'll call him in and say it. I'll never talk about him behind his back."

"I don't believe in this 'no comment' business, either. Newspaper men have a job to do and I'll talk baseball with anybody." The 34-year-old Stanky, obtained by St. Louis in a recent trade with New York Giants, said he already had begun getting in shape for the 1952. He said he was only four or five pounds overweight.

Stanky said he intends to play second base "as long as I can get on base (his specialty) 250 times a season. I intend to play as long as I can."

To the obvious question about what he plans to do with Red Schoendienst, the Cardinals' star second-sacker, Stanky replied:

"I'll have to tell you the same thing I told the newspaper men in St. Louis. I'm not going to pop-off until I get a closer look at our men. Schoendienst is the best second baseman in the National League. We might trade him if we could get enough for him. He might play somewhere else. I can't play third—the old whip is gone."

"I'm going to our St. Petersburg camp with an open mind. Billy Johnson played great ball for the Cards last season at third base. And Solly Hemus, at short, was the most improved man in the league."

Stanky expressed surprise at Joe DiMaggio's retirement as centerfield with the New York Yankees.

"I know I'll never step down like that," Eddie declared. "I'll never quit, they'll have to rip the uniform off me."

## Islanders Lead Fades; St. Mary's Make Breaks Pay For 4-2 Victory

Centreman Dewar Thompson, on a one-man rush in the dying seconds of the second period fired a close-in shot past Hal Gordon to send the Halifax Saints ahead for the first time in the game and as the Saints came from behind to defeat the Islanders 4-2 at the Forum last night.

The goal climaxed an uphill struggle for the clever playing Saints who were outplayed by the Islanders but who took advantage of the breaks that came their way in a game that produced good hockey and plenty of action.

Oddly enough it was a Halifax injury which made possible the Saints' winning goal. Don "Whipper" O'Hearn, the Saints' netminder suffered a shoulder injury at the 19:15 mark of the middle stanza and the teams retired to the dressing room.

Ten minutes later they returned to finish the second period and then commence the third session immediately. Following a face-off in the Saints end Thompson blocked a shot and broke out with only one man to beat. He went around the lone defenceman and backhanded a short shot off Gordon's pads.

**Goals Injured**

O'Hearn received a sprained shoulder in a scramble around his net. He returned to play in the third period and will remain with the team. Doug Lewis suffered a shoulder separation and will fly to Halifax today.

The Islanders raced into a 2-0 lead in the first twenty minutes.

Coach Wilf Fields of the Saints was well satisfied with the showing of his team. He noted, however that the Islanders were playing without Marshall and Bellinger and that they were considerably weakened as a result. The man on the Islanders as far as Fields is concerned is "Bucko" Trainor. He's the best puck carrier in the league, commented the Halifax mentor and has to be watched all the time.

Goalkeeper "Whipper" O'Hearn, who suffered a slightly sprained shoulder last night, will accompany the team to Saint John today and play against the Beavers tonight. Forward Doug Lewis, who may have a shoulder separation, will return to Halifax today. Lewis injured his shoulder in the first period but played for another twenty minutes before retiring from the game. Bob Drainville, who received a six stitch gash at Sydney last Friday night had the cut re-opened in the scrap with Conny Bonhomme.

George McLagan, one of the best defencemen on the ice, received a gash on the head in the first period which required three stitches. McLagan was cut by Morrow's stick after Johnny was checked by Dutchak. The injury was unintentional. Morrow, who was marked by the Islanders, played a good game and came close to scoring on a couple of occasions. The smartest of the Saints forwards, however, was aging Pete Leswick. The balding veteran was always dangerous and he made possible the Saints tying goal with a perfect pass to slap-shot Morley MacKenzie.

The City Hockey League, after an absence of one year, started on the road back into existence Sunday afternoon in a crowded office on Sussex Street. Sitting at the desk and directing the meeting was George Francis, the President of the Abegweit Association and a man better known in baseball than in hockey circles. The job at hand was a familiar one to him, however, and when the meeting had concluded two hours later a new hockey league had been organized and about 70 young men were provided with an opportunity to play regular hockey.

The turn-out for the meeting was most gratifying to those who were doing the organizational work and provided evidence that the league should be a success. An intermediate team to represent the City will be selected by coach Jack Kane and his hockey committee in the coming weeks with the regular league running until sometime in March. Much of the credit for the formation of the league must go to Brigadier Bill Reid, who could probably be rated round for round as the most energetic individual active in provincial athletic circles. The Physical Fitness Department in conjunction with the Abegweit Association now have provided everyone in the City capable of playing hockey an opportunity to do so and must be congratulated for their work.

If the Moncton Hawks remain in the Maritime Major Hockey League they will be playing without the services of defenceman Tom Rockey, who for three weeks. Rockey, whose father is an undertaker in Winnipeg, is supposed to return home to look after his father's business. His dad is ill and Rockey, who is a registered mortician, will take over during the illness.

Moncton coach Johnny Horeck believes that the M.M.H.L. will fizzle out if the Hawks fold.

## Campanella Changes Mind About Operation

BROOKLYN, Jan. 7 (AP) — Roy Campanella, Brooklyn's outstanding catcher, changed his mind today and decided not to undergo an operation for the removal of bone chips in his left elbow.

The National League's most valuable player for 1951 had his elbow X-rayed last week and the results showed four bone chips. Campanella was all set to enter hospital today and have the operation performed by Dr. Herbert Fette tomorrow.

But Campanella told Lee Scott of the Dodgers' publicity staff: "I had a good year last season and I feel I've been without it since the operation. After all, it's not my throwing arm."

Scott said he noted that the elbow might bother Roy during the season, possibly causing the Dodgers to go along without him for several weeks.

Campanella held firm and said "No operation."

Horeck, however, has high hopes that the Hawks will remain in business and that they will hold down fourth place in the league. "We have a good team here and we won't lose too many games in Moncton," commented Horeck. He is pleased with the work of Marcel Clements and noted with satisfaction that his team is intact. # New Committee To Foot Bills For Millionaires

SYDNEY, N. S., Jan. 7 (CP) — A citizens' committee tonight took over financial responsibility for Sydney Millionaires, cellar team in the six-squad Maritime Major Hockey League.

The committee assumed debts of about \$6,200—\$5,000 of it in salaries and \$1,200 in income tax—but the Sydney Hockey Club still remains as the policy-making body.

The citizens' committee will be concerned only with financial matters. If there is a debt at the end of the season the committee will underwrite it; if there is a profit it will be turned over to the club.

Club shareholders, at tonight's third meeting within 10 days, agreed to remain responsible for \$8,500 in other debts. Of this \$4,000 remains from last year, \$2,500 is owed one of the directors and another \$2,000 is for transport and travelling expenses.

The new group—the third such body formed to keep the high-priced M.M.H.L. in operation—took over its duties with tonight's game, won by Sydney 2-0, and also assumed responsibility for today's play.

Today's shareholders meeting also discussed ways of wiping out the debt of the club and strengthening the team to catch a playoff berth.

Millionaires will try to land at least three new players—an entire front line.

Fans at tonight's game were told over the public address system that "Sydney Millionaires will be there as long as the Maritime Major League operates." Members of the committee are: Russell Urquhart, Doug MacDonal, R. J. (Dick) Logue, C. M. Arson, Gordon Elman, H. J. McCann Jr., Mervale Vail, Ernie Smith, Don Buckley and E. A. Manson.
