

# Canadian Joins Research Team In Australia

MELBOURNE (CP)—A Canadian doctor has joined an Australian research team which may be on the verge of a major break-through in the fight against multiple sclerosis.

Dr. Gilles Lemaireux's working on a 12-month University of Montreal research fellowship with the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute here, attempting to determine the disease's cause.

Lemaireux said here he had come to the institute because of its reputation for work on autoimmune diseases.

His research into multiple sclerosis, which attacks a person's central nervous system, will involve trying to establish if it belongs to this category.

Lemaireux said autoimmune diseases were caused by "haywire" defence mechanisms in the body which attacked its own tissues he was supposed to defend.

# KILLER WHALE'S SALE RUNS INTO U.S. RED TAPE

By BRUCE LEVETT VANCOUVER (CP)—Take one killer whale floating placidly in its pen and mix thoroughly with government departments and what do you get?

Thoroughly mixed-up government departments.

The killer whale Namu, purchased from two Canadian fishermen for \$3,000 by a Seattle aquarium, is under low in its pen heading for the Washington city.

Just what inspections, duties or other formalities must be observed before you can take a live whale across an international border?

Says Avery Peterson, consul-general for the United States:

"The whale is a very benevolent beast and, I understand, takes excellent care of its young. However, I don't believe it would come under the Immigration and Naturalization Act."

"There is little in the regulations about bringing live whales across borders. There are regulations governing the import of certain types and species of fish—such as poisonous fish or fish capable of inflicting injury on other fish."

"But nobody has asked me this before. We have never been confronted with the problem."

"I'm going to have to read the fine print at the bottom of the regulations."

Canadian authorities washed their hands of the problem. "They're free to export so far as we're concerned," said Maurice Houghton, fisheries officer. "We have export regulations covering salmon, but..."

A spokesman for the Canadian customs and excise department said "we wouldn't require the whale to be documented."

Mr. Hutchinson said the problem of jurisdiction might be a state one.

"The state of Washington has a sales tax. I don't know whether the owners would be subject to that."

# Sussex Will Get Processing Plant

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—G. E. Barbour Company, Ltd. will build a \$1,500,000 food processing plant at Sussex, company president R. B. Brennan announced here.

In a statement, Mr. Brennan said construction of the plant, scheduled to go into production in January of next year, will begin immediately.

Mr. Brennan said "a portion" of the company's present production at its Saint John plant will be transferred to Sussex. Retained here will be "the processing and manufacturing of food products that were advantageous to produce there" and the company's wholesale grocery division and head office.

Parliament has been told.

Power Minister Frederick Lee announced that early next month he would invite applications for further production licences in the search for oil on the continental shelf around Britain.

The search for oil and natural gas from the seabed began last year after the government granted licences to 22 major international oil groups to prospect and drill for oil beneath about 26,000 square miles of the North Sea.

New applications will now be considered for further prospecting blocks in the North Sea and a strip extending to the boundaries of Norwegian, Danish and Dutch parts of the continental shelf land covered by not more than 100 fathoms (600 feet) of sea.

No oil strike has yet been made.

North: ♠K3, ♥Q73, ♦K96, ♣KQ106

West: ♠Q965, ♥AJS, ♦108, ♣A72

East: ♠J1072, ♥1064, ♦QJ73, ♣855

South: ♠AS, ♥K853, ♦A543, ♣983

The bidding:

North East South West

1♣ Pass 1♥ Pass

2♠ Pass 2NT Pass

3NT

Opening lead—five of spades. It is sometimes difficult to determine par on a given hand because variables may exist which bear heavily on the outcome.

Take this case where South becomes declarer at three notrump and West leads a spade. Right at this point South should regret the contract, since he can count only eight

# Investigation Suggested On Expo Project

MONTREAL (CP)—Mayor Paul O. Trepanier of Granby, Quebec, has suggested that a royal commission be set up to investigate the administration of Habitat 67, the modern urban housing project planned for the 1967 Montreal world's fair.

The pyramid-like structure, made of precast concrete housing units lifted into position by a giant crane, is to be built on the Montreal waterfront as part of Expo 67.

Mr. Trepanier, an architect and past president of the Architects' Association of Quebec, said he has received a letter from the project originator, architect Moshe Safdie, threatening legal action if Mr. Trepanier continues his criticism.

Mr. Trepanier spoke before the St. George Kiwanis Club of Montreal.

He said he is "resolved to denounce a project so senseless" and invited the administrators to institute legal proceedings against him.

He said the plans indicate a "shocking structure" which, if built, could be angrily protested by "the poor people of Montreal who are living in slums."

# Canada, Zambia Sign Agreement

LUSAKA (Reuters)—Canada and Zambia (formerly Northern Rhodesia) have signed an agreement on conditions under which Canadian technical assistance experts will serve here.

The agreement signed by Foreign Minister Simon Kapwepwe and Ian Smyth, a Canadian government official, may be the prelude to further Canadian assistance, Smyth said.

Paying tribute to Canada's aid record, Kapwepwe said:

"We have been told by other African countries that the Canadians have been very good friends with no other motives than to try to help, and that has attracted us very much."

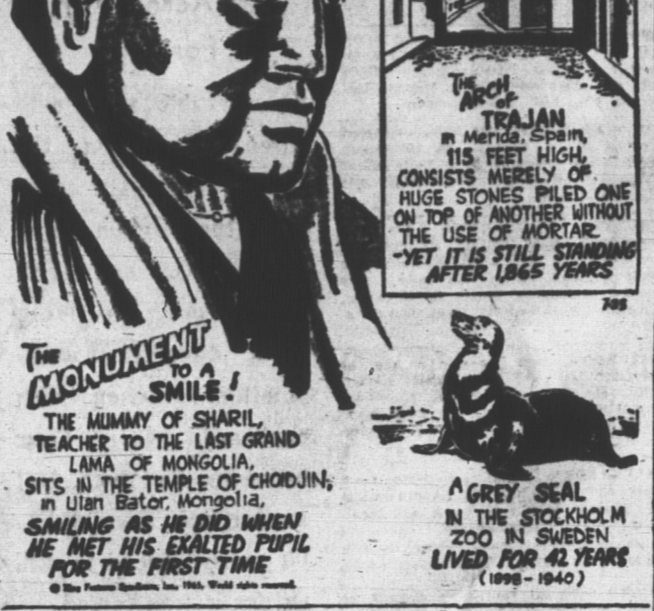
Smyth said Canadian teachers would arrive in September and that the government was processing other Zambian requests for technical aid.
