Farm Operator Is Safe From Canadian Police

TORONTO (CP) — John D. Laun, former operator of Pigglywinks Farms at Sunderland, Ont., is safe in West Germany from an Ontario Provincial Police warrant charging him with fraud in excess of \$200,000, it was learned here.

OPP Inspector Archie Eady, in charge of the investigation, said Canada has no extradition treaty with West Germany and Laun is safe while he is there.

Laun is believed to be living in Stuttgart. He left Canada in 1962 and Pigglywink went bankrupt shortly afterwards.

Police said more than 1,000 investors were involved in the Pigglywink project. Farmers could buy pigs and the farm would raise them until they were old enough to be sold to butchers.

All equipment at the bankrupt farm was sold at auction in 1962, including 1,435 sows and 2,433 piglets at a price of \$100,000.

Inspector Eady said Laun's movements in Germany are being closely observed and police would act immediately he left the country.

Sunderland is 60 miles northeast of here.

Dief Considers Outlook Hopeful

VANCOUVER (CP)—Opposition Leader John Diefenbaker said here the state of East-West relations appears more hopeful than at any time since 1945.

He said an important tool both sides could use to follow up "this lull, this detente of the last few months" would be increased trade.

And he told a combined meeting of service clubs that Canada's job should be to exert an expansionist influence within the Commonwealth paralleling the Kennedy round of tariff negotiations.

Mr. Diefenbaker said this task would involve expansion and development of trade "within the Commonwealth without the Commonwealth being inward looking."

A second area for Canadian leadership would be establishment of a Commonwealth loan and development corporation offering financial assistance by loan or grant to newer nations.

SEES HIGHER OUTPUT

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's iron ore production will reach 45,000,000 tons a year by 1970, a senior mines department official predicts. Output last year was 27,000,000 tons. The forecast is included in a statement prepared by Jean-Paul Drouin, assistant deputy minister of the federal mines department, for this week's annual joint meeting of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy and the American Institute of Mining Engineers, being held at Duluth, Minn.

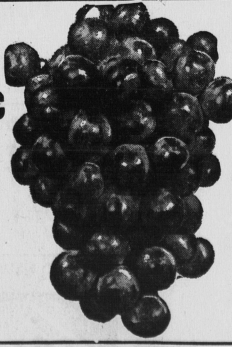
