Looking ahead, to Monday there probably will be many food oddsments stored in the refrigerator. We hope in refrigerating them, you stored together the foods that can be used in a making one dish. For a salad, say, there might be oddsments, of crisp greens, celery, cabbage

and radishes in a clear plastic bag. Oddsments of fresh or canned fruit, suitable to use in a fruit compote, could be combined in a glass jar.

When this is done even with all possible oddsments, the refrigerator will not be crammed, and preparing dinner will be easy and quick.
