LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

TEMPERANCE.—Victoria Division meeting tonight.

CITY COUNCIL.—Regular monthly meeting of the City Council this evening at 7:30 o'clock.

THE RECITAL.—The programme for Miss Findley's recital (Opera House Sept. 20th) is being prepared, and will be published in a few days.

BOSTON COMEDY CO.—The Boston Comedy Co., H. Price Wheeler manager, opens at the Masonic Opera House on the 21st, and will remain a week.

FOR HALIFAX.—The steamer Fastnet sailed for Halifax Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. She took a cargo of out-pork, lobsters, &c., and three passengers—Miss Clark, Miss Kelly, and O. Hookman.

THE ALBERDEEN.—The new Canadian Government steamer Alberdeen is at Halifax. She is the only vessel in the Canadian service that has electric illumination. Her speed is good, but not so large as the Newfield, nor as fast as the Stanley. Her speed is thirteen knots.

CHURCH PARADE.—Nos. 1 and 2 Companies, G. A., held a church parade yesterday, and marched to the Methodist Church, where an eloquent sermon was preached by the Rev. G. M. Campbell, from Timothy, VI, 12, "Fight the good fight, lay hold on eternal life."

STEAMER ROSAVISTA.—The steamer Rosavista, Capt. Fraser, arrived from Montreal this morning with a general cargo of merchandise and the following passengers for St. John's: Mrs. A. Proves, A. Bryden, Miss Bryden, Rev. Mr. Walsh, J. Mahoney, wife and daughter, Mrs. Walsh, J. Hanford and son, Mary Hansen, and J. Young. She sailed again at one o'clock today for Sydney and St. John's, taking 50 head sheep, 10 cattle, 2 horses, out-potatoes, &c.

POLICE COURT.—Seven Scott Act cases were up for hearing at the police court today. The court met at 9:30, and the attendance throughout the forenoon was very large. The case against Brigadier Trainor was again adjourned for one week for judgment. Charles Watling, Grafton Street, was convicted of two first offences against the Act and fined \$50 and costs of two months' imprisonment for each offence. In one case a sale of intoxicating beer was proven, and in the other a sale of whiskey.

THE CASE OF ANDREW DOYLE was adjourned to the 17th. The only witness in the case, a countryman, not appearing. The case of A. N. Large was dismissed, the witnesses swearing the beer purchased was non-intoxicating. That of Angus McDonald, for a second offence against the Act, was adjourned until Wednesday next. Court adjourned at 2 o'clock for an hour, when the case against Charles Collins will be heard.

Mr. W. W. Beer left this morning, for Yarmouth, N. S., where his mother is seriously ill.

The Pope is preparing an encyclical letter to the bishops and people of the United States. The letter will announce the absolute supremacy of the apostolic decree in church matters in the United States, with the simple right to appeal to the Pope.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. OTTAWA, Sept. 6.—The Trades and Labor Congress to-night decided to take no action re the admission of the Patrons of Industry into membership. To hundreds of circulars sent out assuring workers received from only ten unions in Canada, and this was deemed not conclusive. Seven of ten unions favored the admission of patrons.

Among the delegates from Quebec is H. L. Langvin, son of Sir Hector Langevin. He propounds a scheme for the military colonization of the Northwest by the enlistment in the congested industrial centres of the dominion. The committee to which it was referred struck out the military phase but endorsed the principle of substituting for the present system of encouraging foreign immigration a scheme for settling Canadians in the Northwest by loans to enable them to start farming.

MONTREAL, Sept. 7.—Dalton McCarthy being interviewed to-day states that he cannot predict any great defection from the government ranks in the maritime provinces.

St. PETERSBURG, Sept. 7.—Cholera is raging in the town and province of Nijni Novgorod in Russian Poland, there are 5,000 cases, and 2,500 deaths, from that disease, on an average per week.

WINDSOR, Man., Sept. 7.—At yesterday's session of the Northwest legislative assembly after a long discussion, the report of the education committee was adopted. The recommendations of the report were that Roman Catholics shall not be deprived of the right to establish separate schools, and that all public schools be opened with the simple recitation on by the teacher of the Lord's prayer.

DIED. At Souris West, on August 23rd, Elith F. Beloved wife of James McInnis, and youngest daughter of the late Edward Kichham, Eq., aged 25 years. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

WHERE HAS HE BEEN?

Sir,—The Guardian has today come out very forcibly against the Government agent the new vendership. Of course, in view of the strong opposition aroused, this was to be expected from the supposed organ of the temperance party. But where has the editor been this long while that he has not been directing attention to the notorious violations of the law now going on and to the consequent increase of drunkenness and crime? Is it not time for a good temperance rally in some of the churches or the Masonic Hall? The public have not heard of any "dewater" sermons from any of our ministers since the election. Surely they have not forgotten the subject.

QUERY.

FREE TRADE. Sir,—The Liberals of this Island have always been held out as Free Traders, and the extension of the number of venders to three is a step in the right direction. Mr. Peters is doing the proper thing in breaking in on the monopoly of the liquor venders and giving a free chance to everybody willing to pay the \$150. A very large number of the venders protection and monopoly can be found in the fact that no sooner had the Scott Act come in and the trade put in the hands of the druggists than the price of whiskey was advanced 25 per cent. by these gentlemen! I, therefore, go for more venders in the hope that free trade and competition will bring the prices down, so that a bottle of whiskey will be within the reach of every person.

FINE TRADE. Sir,—The Local Government are hard up for funds when they are turning the Scott Act into a License Law. They have already received \$457 for fees and if Mr. George March appointed fourth vendor, another \$150 will be added to the Local Treasury. Charlottetown is now being taxed pretty sweetly by Mr. Peters and his crew, and these fees should be paid over to the city. The law has to be carried out by the city police force and in all justice and fair play, the city should get the License fees or the Local Government should undertake the enforcement of the Act with all its consequences and claims. It has been very queer in view of the public declaration of Mr. Donald Farquharson that no license law would ever be passed by the Local House, that a government of which he is first lieutenant should turn a prohibitory temperance measure into a license law in order to raise money with which to carry on the business of the country. The fact that it is doing so raises a strong presumption that the charge preferred by Mr. Farquharson's political enemies, that he is not sound on the temperance question, is only too true.

SOME ADVICE. Sir,—You have but voiced the unanimous feeling of all Temperance workers in your editorial remarks of Saturday. Newspaper correspondents are very ready to find fault, but it would suit them far better to put their own shoulders to the wheel and give a shove in carrying out the law. It must not be forgotten that the Act was barely carried in Charlottetown, and the rum vellers cannot be closed out in a day. If the government appoint another vendor, I doubt if much more effort will be made to carry the Act into effect. It is hard enough to watch the three already appointed and to have another in the business will increase the difficulties, if not thwart all exertions to bring the law into effect. It is well known that the liquor party have many friends and sympathisers. This fact, coupled with the civil decision, has unfortunately cooled the ardor of many former supporters of the Act, besides alienating many others. Should another vendor be appointed other desertions will follow and the supporters of the Act materially decreased. Newspaper correspondents should bear all these things in mind and editors should not be too ready to furnish space for their contributions, but shut down on them as you recently did in the City Council controversy.
