Approximately 300 were present for the annual event sponsored by the committee and so capably aided by women from every society in the city as well as the Board of Trade and all service clubs.

New large-size photographs of Queen Elizabeth II and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, were unveiled yesterday in a special ceremony at the Experimental Farm. The pictures were presented by the I.O.E. and were specially framed by Messrs. Douglas MacLeod and Albert MacEwen, of the Farm staff, using yellow birch grown on the Upton Farm. They are now hanging in the Conference Room.

Present for the occasion was the full staff of approximately 45 employees when the cord covering the photos was pulled aside by Miss Mary Murnaghan.

The preliminary hearing of Roy Walter Fall, Carl Prowse and Carl Fall, charged with having broken into the wholesale store of J.C. Montgomery and Co., Queen Street, on the night of November 27 and having stolen therefrom cigarettes to the value of \$1,200, was opened in the Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday morning, before Magistrate Gilbert A. Sometime next April, the Central Creameries Company Limited of Charlottetown will open a new unit of its already extensive plant. It will be known as the Concentrated Milk Products Division and as the name implies, will produce concentrated milks in a variety of forms for wide spread uses.

The charge of manslaughter against John MacDonald, Kilmuir, was dismissed by Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald at Georgetown yesterday. The charge arose out of an accident near Heatherdale in which Basil Beaton was fatally injured. Mr. MacDonald was afterward charged with driving without due care and attention and fined \$75 and costs.

Messrs. Fred C. Ramsay, Montrose and Prosper A. Arsenault, Howland, were nominated at a largely attended Liberal convention at the Princess Pat Theatre, Alberton, yesterday afternoon to represent the First District of Prince in the next provincial election. The convention was presided over by Mr. Percy Adams, president of the West Prince Liberal Association. Mr. Heber Craig, Poplar Grove acted as secretary.

A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last evening at 5:15 to meet a delegation from the Summerside Athletic Association. This committee requested permission to have a fence, eight feet high, erected around the baseball diamond. The reason put forth for this by the committee is that under the present set up the public has access to ball games or any other athletic activity and are not contributing sufficiently to help

defray expenses. It was contended by the committee that if such a fence were erected, that the proceeds would be sufficient then to put sport at the Queen Elizabeth Park on a paying basis.

A fire broke out about 2:30 yesterday afternoon in O'Leary at Wright Way Upholstery building owned by Mr. George Clements formerly of Duvar now living in O'Leary.

The blaze started from an oil stove used for heating the building, which exploded causing considerable damage to the interior of the building and to some materials used for upholstery work. The O'Leary Fire Department was called to the scene and quickly extinguished the blaze. It is not known if damage was covered by insurance.

The meeting was called to consider a brief on the matter presented by the City School Board. However, the season is so busy for members of the Council that they suggested the adjournment. It was also felt by Mayor J. D. Stewart and City Councillor Roy Gaudin that the School Board should be asked to go deeper into the matter of costs.

The S.A.A.A. held a special meeting at the Summerside Town Hall last night with the president, W. Chester MacDonald, in the chair. Bob Clark, vice president, acted as secretary in the absence of Jimmie Hogan who is confined to his home through illness.

Two chairmanships were filled, James Hogan being appointed chairman of hockey, and Lieut. D. Murray, of basketball. Gord Kelly was appointed chairman of a new group called the Mayor's Rink Fund committee, the purpose of which is to consider ways and means of assisting in the current drive for a new rink in Summerside.

In the November issue of the Canadian Jersey Breeder, the cow Hampshire Clara, bred and owned by John Clark, New Wiltshire, is listed as having completed a record of 159 lbs. milk containing 513 lbs. fat, with an average test of 6.29, in 365 days as a junior three-year-old, and the cow Hampstead Cassie, also bred and owned by Mr. Clark, has completed a record of 7800 lbs. milk containing 456 lbs. fat, with an average test of 5.89, in 305 days, as a junior three year old, missing a silver medal certificate by only a few pounds. These cows were sired by Brave Flora's Oscar, a bull bred by Edison B. Mutch and now in service in the United States.

Mrs. Teresa Reid yesterday celebrated her 99th birthday with an afternoon tea and a large number of visitors. She was born at Cornwall, P. E. I. December 17, 1853, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Richard Leonard. She is the last survivor of her family as her five sisters and six brothers are all dead. She married the late Mr. J. Reid in 1876 and the couple lived in Hope River for 41 years until her husband died in 1917. She has been living at the Sacred Heart Home for six years.

Mr. Gordon Moore, Bachelor of Engineering, recently appointed to the engineering staff of the Canadian Foundation Company at the Atomic Plant, Chalk River, Ont.

Mr. Moore, who is a son of Mr. A. G. Moore and the late Mrs. Moore of Pownal, is a graduate of Prince of Wales College and McGill University. Last year he was President of McGill Inter-Varsity which has a membership of over two hundred.

Until his recent appointment to the Atomic Plant staff, Mr. Moore was assistant engineer at Uplands Airport for the Company in the construction of an all concrete cantilever hangar at Uplands Airport, Ottawa.

A staff more than double the normal one this week has literally been fighting its way through mountains of mail at the local Post Office. Each year the job of handling the hundreds of thousands of pieces of mail arriving and departing becomes greater. Last year hit an all-time record, but it is believed the total for this year may run from 10 to 15 per cent higher.

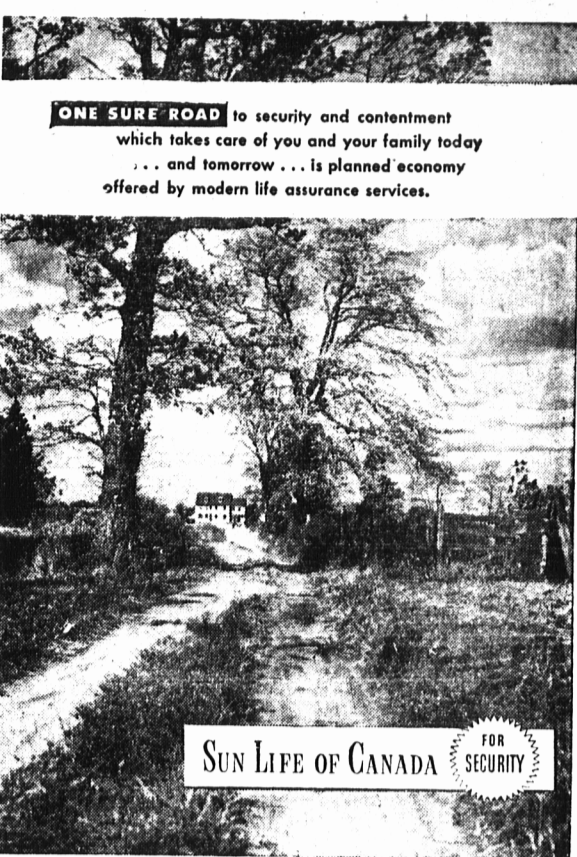
