### Three Months For Attempted Jail Break

George Leonard MacDonald, a resident of Summerside, was convicted as charged of the offense of attempted jail break from the common jail of Kings County at Georgetown on June 22nd, contrary to section 124(B) of the Criminal Code, before Judge J. Sylvère DesRoches at Georgetown yesterday, and sentenced to three months in the Kings County Jail with the time already served since June 19th to be included in the sentence.

The case was first heard by way of preliminary hearing before stipendiary magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet. The accused later elected trial before a judge, sitting without a jury. On August 27th, evidence was taken for the Crown from the jailer of the Kings County Jail, L.S. Bathilder, and the case adjourned to September 10th. Yesterday the evidence for the Crown was concluded with the evidence of Aubrey Moore who was an inmate in the jail at the time of the attempted break. The accused also gave evidence in his own defense.

Mr. Ian MacLeod, Crown prosecutor, represented the Crown, and Mr. Lester O'Donnell represented the accused.

suming job but if you can get a couple of cows with calf at the correct time the remuneration is great.

All these things will help — no matter how many times you breed an animal she will not conceive unless she is in season. We in the artificial insemination business are perturbed at the number of cows we are called to breed in a year which are not in season at the time.

### REPORT CALLS

For those who use artificial insemination — report your calls to your technician correctly. When you tell him when you noticed your cow, make sure you tell the correct time. Do not try second guessing him so that he will come early, because we have found that by breeding cows late in their heat period the results are much higher than breeding early. A cow stays in heat normally about 18 hours but she does not ovulate until around 14 hours after she goes off heat. It has been proven that by breeding from 18 to 24 hours after the start of estrus the chance of conception is increased by about 30 per cent above breeding during the first 8 hours of the heat period.

**Sources of Trouble** — If a man notices that he is having a considerable number of cows repeating and that their heat periods are quite regular, we would advise him to look for three things.

1. Look to his nutrition — See that the mineral feeding is correct, because it seems that animals that are lacking in mineral (mainly phosphorus) seem much harder to settle than those that are on a balanced ration.

We feel a mineral supplement should be fed and prefer these supplements to contain between 7 per cent to 8 per cent phosphorus. Iodine is another mineral which is very necessary as far as fertility is concerned.

### PROTEIN LEVELS

Try raising the protein level of your feed a bit, this may also help. We feel that one of the most important parts of feeding is the vitamin intake. Vitamin A is usually at a low level in stored feeds during the winter months and feeding an oil with a good vitamin A and D content will pay off in more ways than one.
