Again Scourged!

A Terrific Fire at St. John's, Nfld.

Principal Part of the City in Ruins,

And the Fire Fiend Still at Work.

Public Buildings, Churches, Newspaper Offices,

And Private Houses Already Destroyed.

The Whole City at the Mercy of the Flames.

HALIFAX, July 9.

St. John's, Nfld., is being scourged by a fire which began yesterday afternoon, and at latest advices was still raging. The fire department is helpless, and the city is left to its fate.

The first large building to become a prey to the fiery element was the new Methodist College and boarding hall, recently erected at a cost of \$40,000. From here the flames leaped to the magnificent Masonic Temple, which was erected at a cost of \$50,000.

The flames next licked up the Gower St. Methodist Brick Church. Then they skipped across the street to the superb Cathedral of the English Church. This church was designed by Sir Gilbert Scott, and was conceded to be the finest piece of Gothic architecture on the continent. It has been a half a century in building, and was not yet completed, though a quarter of a million dollars had been spent on it. The Orange hall and the palace of Bishop Jones were also cremated.

Continuing its swath the next victim of its prey was the Supreme Court House and police headquarters, and the magnificent Athenaeum Building, containing the Government offices, law offices, and the Government Savings Bank.

Proceeding along Duckworth Street the Union Bank building, the Commerce Bank, the brick and stone Presbyterian Church, and the Telegram newspaper office were quickly destroyed.

Then the flames took complete possession of the great business establishments and fish warehouses on Water Street, soon extending to the wharves, from which shipping had to haul out into the harbor for safety.

But long before this, and while the devouring element was rushing with irresistible fury towards the water front, it was also spreading easterly from its original starting point, and before the people were hardly aware of it that majestic pile of free stone, with its twin towers, the Catholic Cathedral, was ablaze. This Cathedral was one of the largest and most magnificent places of worship in the New World. With the Cathedral were also destroyed the place of Bishop Power, containing invaluable treasures of art, St. Patrick's Hall and the schools of the Christian Brothers, and there was little hope of saving the Convent and College of St. Donaventure.

THE ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

Result up to Date

LONDON, July 9.

The members returned so far are: Conservatives, 166; Liberals, 132; Liberal Unionists, 24; McCarthyites, 15; Parnellites, 4; Independent Laborists, 3 out of 344—the known results being more than one-half the whole House. The Unionists are united. They have 190 against a united opposition of 154. The Liberals, therefore, would require to capture a number of conservative county districts in order to obtain a working majority. Even sanguine Gladstonians hardly reckon on this. Excepting Mr. Ritchie, all the cabinet ministers, have been re-elected.

Prorogation this Afternoon.

Dominion Parliament will prorogue this afternoon at three o'clock, with the usual ceremonies.
