

Yanks Defeat Los Angeles; Write Sox Top Detroit 4-1

Roger Maris rapped a home run after a disputed walk in the sixth that carried the pennant-winning New York Yankees to a 9-4 decision over the Los Angeles Angels Wednesday.

All the victors on the Yankees remained third in the tight American League race.

In Detroit, the Chicago White Sox, held to two hits through the first six innings, erupted for four hits and two runs in the seventh and went on to defeat the Tigers 4-1.

The victory kept the Sox in second place and moved them just half a game behind Baltimore.

Denny Venka stroked a three-run homer for the National League Milwaukee Braves in a 5-2 victory over St. Louis and dealt the cardinal pennant hopes a jolting blow.

The licking dropped the Red Birds six games behind the league-leading Philadelphia Phillies.

ROOKIE GETS RINS
A pair of home runs by rookie Tony Contiglaro paced the Boston Red Sox to a 10-0 victory over the Kansas City Athletics in the American League.

The four-run first and catcher John Edwards timely hitting carried the Cincinnati Reds to a 5-3 National League victory over the Chicago Cubs.

Maris' homer, his 1,000th major league hit, came after a lead-off walk to Bobby Richardson, issued by New York Yankee Gatewood. Angel manager Bill Rigney argued umpire Joe Paparella's call on the fourth ball and was promptly thrown out of the game, an automatic action by the league for disputing a ball-or-strike call.

The Yanks went down in the eighth on George Brunet until the fourth, when they scored three times. Los Angeles drew even with three runs in the fifth, but Maris' blow in the sixth clinched it for New York and a four-run rally in the eighth made it a breeze.

BOUTON WAS WINNER
Hard-throwing Tom Bouton was the winning pitcher, with strong relief help from the new 24-year-old bullpen star, Pedro Ramos. Ramos came on in the seventh with one out, one run and two outs and struck out the rest of the way. It was his fifth appearance since being acquired from Cleveland 10 days ago.

Chicago erupted for two runs in the seventh before the Tigers could get a man out and added single runs in the eighth and ninth.

Bill Skowron led off the seventh with a single and went to third on Pete Ward's double. Skowron scored in a wild pitch and Ward came in on Jim Landis' single. Al Wells singled, but Camilo Carrero bounced to Don Wert, who threw to the plate to get Landis.

Loeb, who had shut out the White Sox for 25 innings going into the seventh, finally got out of it by striking out Jim Peters and getting Don Buford to fly to right.

The White Sox scored in the eighth when Robinson singled, went to second on a wild pitch and scored when Loeb threw away Mike Hershberger's sacrifice bunt.

Menke's 18th home run came in the second inning with Eddie Mathews and Gene Oliver on base. Mathews had walked and Oliver had singled to set the stage for Menke's game-winning blow.

WAS OFF TAYLOR
The blast by Menke came off Ron Taylor, a relief specialist who was pressed into action for his second start of the pitching campaign. The long blow fell into the left field benches.

Braves starter, Denny Lemaster, meanwhile, held the Cardinals in check until the sixth when St. Louis scored both its runs.

Until the eighth, Lemaster had allowed the Redbirds only five hits. Then the Cardinals cut loose on him.

Cur Flood lashed a double to left centre, and Lou Brock followed with another two-bagger to score Flood. Menke fumbled Ken Boyer's grounder before Hal White's sacrifice fly scored Brock.

Dick Stuart and Bob Tillman also homered in Gene Oliver's attack as the teams closed out their season series with Boston on top 12-4.

THIRD HOME RUN
Stuart's home run, his 88th, put him in the lead for the American League runs batted in title with 108, one more than Minnesota's Harmon Killebrew. Tillman's blast, his 15th, produced three runs in a four-run sixth inning that tied with No. 10 for pitcher Bill Monbouquette.

Yacht Race Is Postponed
NEWPORT, R.I. (AP)—Wednesday's second yacht race in the best-of-seven series to determine the holder of the America's Cup was postponed 24 hours because of the lack of wind.

Both the Constellation, the United States' defender which won the first race Tuesday, and Sovereign, the British challenger, had stood at the starting line for more than an hour waiting for the wind to freshen when the race was put off.

Both contestants said they would be ready to race today, wind permitting. At the time of the scheduled start at 11 a.m. EDT, the wind was four miles an hour. At 12:30 p.m., it had dropped to one mile.

Jim Maloney had the Cubs in check until Ron Santo's two-run homer in the sixth. The blow established one club record and tied another.

Santo's season runs-batted-in total swelled to 103, topping Andy Pate's previous high of 101 for a Cub third baseman.

Santo now has 27 home runs, matching an ancient mark for Cub third basemen set by Ed Williamson in 1934.

Obviously hitting, Maloney was replaced by Sandy Ellis after the seventh but was credited with his 14th victory against 10 defeats.

Olympic Games Held In Canada?

MONTREAL (CP)—No one can count on the International Olympic Committee awarding Canada the 1972 winter games when it meets in 1967. It will be Banff's third bid before this all-

powerful body that has the say about winter and summer games.

The IOC decisions are most peculiarly arrived at. Sydney Davies told directors of the Canadian Olympic

Association Saturday when it discussed the merits of applications by Banff and Garibaldi Park in British Columbia. They eventually endorsed the Alberta site by unanimous vote.

Davies, Canada's member on the IOC since 1947, should know what he is talking about. Last year, for instance, the IOC went against all expert forecasts when it awarded the 1968 Summer Olympics to dark-horse Mexico City over the highly-favored United States and France.

ODDS TURNED
Up to that time Banff, which had bid for the 1968 winter games, was given an 85-to-15

chance to win out over five other sites from the U.S. and Europe. The odds tumbled because most observers felt European countries would back away from the expensive proposition of sending teams to North America twice in one year.

Canada lost out, just as it had done in 1959 when Banff made a token application to stage the 1964 games.

Now Banff is faced with the same situation. The U.S. is considered a definite threat for the 1972 summer games and if it wins when the IOC meets three years from now, Banff's chances will drop.

"Don't even mention the possibility of the U.S. getting the summer Olympics," Ed Deane of Calgary, head of the Calgary Olympic Development Association, said after Saturday's meeting. "We don't want to think about the Americans getting those Olympics."

TURN DOWN B.C. BID
The Banff application was endorsed after directors voted against deferment of a decision for one year. Garibaldi spokesmen had asked the COA to withhold its decision until April, 1966.


