### Royal Canadian Artillery Band Gives Delightful Performance

The distinguished American who informed the world that it was impossible to please all the people all the time, might have qualified this statement had he foreseen the reaction of last night's audience at Queen Charlotte High to the offerings of the Royal Canadian Artillery Band, under the direction of Lieut. Kenneth Elloway, A.R.C.M., psm.

Displaying a diverse and crowd-pleasing repertoire ranging from Glinka's overture, "Russian a d Ludmilla," and "Rakocsky," a Hungarian March by Berlioz, to Dixieland jazz and the "St Louis Blues," the band marched from triumph to triumph as the program progressed.

Among the many distinguished military and civilian personalities attending the function were the Hon. T.W.L. Frowse, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, the Hon. A.W. Matheson, Premier of P.E.I., and Brigadier G.G.K. Peake, D.S.O., Officer Commanding 2 Militia Group, sponsors of the concert.

The band was introduced to the audience by Captain J. Elmer Blanchard. Other officers of 2 Militia Group acted as ushers and attended to various administrative details. Members of the local Pro-

vest Company were on hand to assist the traffic detail of the city police.

Despite bad roads and ice floes which delayed their arrival by several hours the soldier-musicians staged their program with the precision of professional troupers. The first half of the entertainment was devoted largely to classical and semi-classical selections. Soloists featured in this section of the program were Band Sgt. C. Van Leeuwen, oboe, in "Songs My Mother Taught Me" by Dvorak; and Band Sgts. E. Reti and H. Bekker, clarinets, in "Clarinet Polka" by Nas and Tukker.

After the intermission the Band cut down to orchestra size and treated the audience to a number of selections played in the modern manner, including "Lullaby of Broadway," "Solitude," "Flamingo," and the St. Louis Blues March." Many of the individual artists were featured throughout. Ticking the fancy of the audience in particular were the trombone quartet accompanied by accordion, the drummer, and the Dixieland group. So insistent was the audience, the director was obliged to include several additional encores following the completion of the regular program.

### Witnesses Heard In Case Of Unlawful Possession

The hearing of evidence was completed yesterday in the case of the Queen vs. James Arthur Clinton in the Queen's County Court presided over by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, Clinton was arraigned yesterday morning on two counts of unlawful possession of stolen goods, namely a quantity of Perfection Brand canned milk at West Royalty in October of 1956 and also of a small quantity of Perfection Brand canned milk at his residence in Charlottetown, J. P. Nicholson is Crown prosecutor and Allison Gillis is appearing as counsel for the defense.

The Crown called nine witnesses to give evidence in the case in addition to the evidence of six witnesses given in the Dingwell case, which by agreement of counsel was accepted and entered in the Court records as part of the Clinton case.

Const. Eric Tedford of the R.C.M.P. told the court of his nightly vigil at the Clinton property in West Royalty from October 12th to 17th and of finding approximately 40 cases of the milk in question at this location on the 11th. He also stated that at no time did he see the accused near the property while he was there.

Const. William Macdonald of the R.C.M.P. also stated that he had not seen the accused at the Clinton property while he was on watch there on the 17th. He told of Reid coming to the property on the 17th and that he and Const. Cox placed him under arrest.

Hazel Hynes, 14 year old daughter of Doran Hynes who occupied the house on the Clinton property during October, said that she saw milk stored in the barn at that month. She further stated that she saw the accused accompanied by Reid at the property unloading something into the barn from the station wagon in which they were travelling. Subsequent to her discovery of the milk cases.

The fourth witness, Const. James Cox, told of seeing Clinton and Reid at the Clinton property in a 2-tone Oldsmobile car in the afternoon of the 14th. He said that the pair filled three potato sacks with straw from the barn around the property in general and then left.

Sgt. Donald Davis, member of the Hynes family, who lives on the Clinton property, said that he had seen Reid and Reid called at the Exhibition Grounds. Reid had mentioned that the purpose of the call was to see that nothing was placed in the station wagon at this time from the Women's Institute Building.
