Liver Injections Pep Up New York Rangers

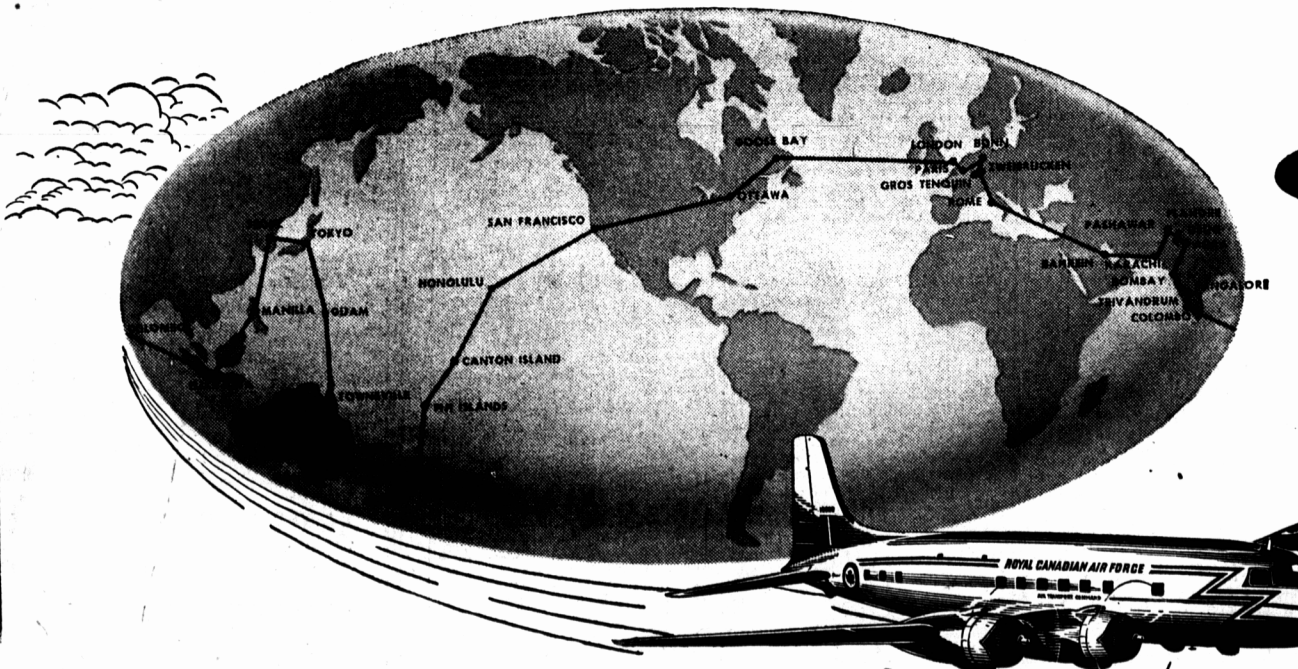
