TORONTO (CP)—A more effective Salk polio vaccine has been developed by the Connaught Medical Research Laboratories of the University of Toronto, a university spokesman has announced. Called trivalent purified polio vaccine, it provides greater protection against types 1 and 2 polio virus. Type 1 is usually the most virulent virus and the most common cause of epidemics of paralytic polio.
