

DETAILS OF PLANS FOR THE ROYAL VISIT

Ch'town Area Orders And Instructions

Of interest to the general public as well as the Militia and other units participating in the Royal Visit to Charlottetown on Wednesday are the following detailed orders and instructions authorized by Lieut. Colonel C. C. Thompson, M. C., V. D., Officer Commanding the Charlottetown area:

No. 1—General

These instructions are being issued for the guidance of all the people of Prince Edward Island who wish to honour and pay respect to Their Majesties the King and Queen during their visit to the Province on June 14th. By observing the rules and regulations prescribed it is felt that there is ample opportunity for every man, woman and child in the Province, as well as our guests who may be visiting the Province, to see at some point on the Royal route Their Majesties, provided the following orders and instructions are carried out. It is also felt that those upon whom the duty and responsibility of enforcing these instructions will be in their positions at all times by exercising every possible civility.

No. 2—Authority

These orders and instructions are issued under and by virtue of an order from the D.O.C., M.D. No. 6, dated at Halifax, N.S., 10th May, 1939.

No. 3—Assembly Positions

Naval and Military Units as well as Fraternal Societies will assemble at their headquarters meeting place or rendezvous at 10.30 hrs. June 14th and will be on their positions allocated to them on the Royal Route at 11.00 hrs. and in the afternoon will be in their positions at 15.00 hrs. (3 p.m.) Appendix "B".

No. 4—Dress

"A" Naval: Officers: No. 5 uniforms. Other Ranks: No. 1 uniforms, side arms, gaiters and belts.

"B" Military:

Officers: Service dress—drill order-decorations. Medals and swords will be worn. Spurs will be worn by Field Officers only, unless spurs form part of the equipment of other ranks. Other Ranks: Service dress—drill order-decorations. Medals and swords will be worn. Spurs will be worn by Field Officers only, unless spurs form part of the equipment of other ranks. Those not supplied with belts will wear bandoliers. Spurs will be worn only by those units equipped with them. Medical units will conform.

Great-Coats or Cloaks: will be brought to Charlottetown by all ranks from points outside. Units in Charlottetown will arrange to have greatcoats or cloaks available if they are required. Unless special instructions are given to wear these greatcoats or cloaks they will be disposed of as follows: Units coming from points outside Charlottetown will deposit them in their trunks or buses. Units from Charlottetown will leave them in the Charlottetown Armory. Band of the P. E. I. Light Horse and the Prince Edward Island Highlanders will parade in full dress. All Military Officers on duty

who are invited to attend the Reception at Government House or who will be presented to Their Majesties at Government House will attend in uniform which they wore on duty, and it will not be necessary to change into blues or patrol jackets.

"C" Boy Scouts and Girl Guides will wear uniforms of their corps. No sashes or flags will be carried by either the Scouts or Girl Guides.

"D" Fraternal organizations will conform to the dress of their society as far as possible and full regalia may be worn where available.

No. 5—Duties

"A" Interval: Troops will line both sides of the street in single rank, at a distance to be determined by the marshals when the procession first, one pace from the ranks towards the centre of the road. All other officers will dress on the Company, etc., Commander.

"B" King's Colour: All units in procession will parade with the King's Colour. The Colour Party will be placed in the centre of the unit on the right side of the road. Colours will not be unrolled until troops are in position on the streets.

"C" Fix Bayonets: If arms are carried units will not fix bayonets until arrival in position on the line of route.

No. 6—Compliments

(a) When the motor car in which the King and Queen are riding reaches point 50 yards from each sub-unit, the sub-unit will be called to attention and rifles sloped; when it reaches 20 yards the command "ROYAL SALUTE—PRESENT ARMS" will be given. Colours will be lowered on the "PRESENT ARMS" and the band will play the National Anthem. Should the order "PRESENT ARMS" be given too early it will be left to the discretion of the Bandmaster to begin playing the National Anthem so that it is still being played while the Royal carriage or motor car is passing the band. In such cases and if necessary the National Anthem will be played twice, but not more often. Troops will remain at the PRESENT until the Royal carriage or motor car has passed and at the SLOPE until all cars in the procession have passed.

(b) In cases where the route of the procession is narrow it may be necessary to lower the Colours at an angle instead of to the front, as normally.

(c) The compliments detailed above will apply in cases where the Queen is not accompanied by the King.

(d) No action by troops is necessary on hearing the National Anthem broadcast.

No. 7—Photographers

Those in possession of cameras will be given every opportunity to take photographs, but under no circumstances will they break through the lines. They should bear in mind also that Their Majesties have also been submitted to a regular bombardment of photographers, and therefore those in possession of cameras are urged to use these sparingly.

No. 8—Bands

All bands for the Royal Visit will be under the direct control and orders of Col. U. G. Dawson, V.D.

"A" Bands: Bands will be formed up in two ranks—front rank level with the troops lining the route. There will be no objection to bands playing and marching up and down the route to entertain the crowds awaiting the arrival of the Royal Procession, provided bands are in their allotted position not less than fifteen minutes before the arrival of the Royal Procession. Sufficient space will be left in order that police cars and motorcycles are able to pass bands while marching, without delay.

"B" Keeping the line: While it is primarily the task of the police to control the crowds, it should be understood by all officers and soldiers lining the route that they must assist in keeping the route clear. In the event of a line being broken by the press of people, or through any other cause, it is the duty of the Active Militia to prevent egress through their ranks on the roadway and to assist the police in restoring the integrity of the line with the least possible delay. Persons who break through the line, however, will not be pursued by troops, but officers and soldiers will concentrate their efforts on preventing further breaches of the line. In carrying out these duties, troops will exercise every possible civility.

"C" Keeping the line: All units should stand three feet from the curb, as experience elsewhere dur-

No. 10—Canadian Legion

No. 11—Medical Arrangements

Medical arrangements during Their Majesties' visit to the Province are attached hereto as appendix "C".

No. 12—Trains

The movement of trains to and from Charlottetown on June 14th is attached hereto as appendix "D".

No. 13—Reserve

The R.C.N.V.R. and the Fire-

men will provide a mobile reserve to be called upon should at any time a break be made through the line, or upon any other occasion where assistance is required to protect the safety of Their Majesties. Phone 14.

No. 14—School Children

That portion of Great George Street extending from the south side of Richmond Street to the north side of Water Street is reserved exclusively for the occupation of all the school children from the City schools and country schools of the province. These children will be under the orders of their school teachers and other officials of the Department of Education. Their position will be immediately behind the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides. (Permission has also been granted to the wives and children of returned men to occupy position along this street in rear of the school children.)

No. 15—R.C.N.V.R.

The local detachment of the R.C.N.V.R. will guard the entrance to Government House, and along the Park Roadway to the fence on the west of Government House from 10.00 hrs. to 14.00 hrs. until such time as the Guard of Honour from the P.E.I. Highlanders take over from them in the afternoon.

No. 16—Guard

The P. E. I. Highlanders will supply a Royal Guard of Honour on the Marine Wharf with a Colour Party to be in position at 11.30 hrs.

No. 6 District Signals R.C.C.S. will supply a Guard of Honour in front of the Provincial Building and extending to the north side of Great George Street and to be in position at 11.30 hrs.

The band of the Prince Edward Island Light Horse will report at the Armouries at 10.30 hrs. to parade No. 6 Signals to their allotted position at the Provincial Building. As soon as the Royal Party reaches Government House, this band will report back to their unit.

No. 17—Salute

A Saluting Battery of two Officers and 25 other ranks from the 2nd Medium Battery and 2 Officers and 25 other ranks from the 8th Medium Battery will fire a Salute from the Park roadway upon the arrival and departure of Their Majesties. Lieut.-Col. J. S. Jenkins, D.S.O., V.D., R.C.A.M.C., will attend both batteries during the firing of the salute.

No. 18—Appointment

Col. U. G. Dawson, V.D. will act on staff and will coordinate fraternal organizations and bands with headquarters.

No. 19—Headquarters

Headquarters of the Charlottetown Area will be at the Ordnance Compound, Charlottetown from 12.00 hrs. 13th June 1939. Phone No. 270.

Three Ordes will be on duty from 08.00 hrs. 14th June to 18.00 hrs. 14th June. One Orderly to be provided with a bicycle and an R.C.M.P. pass.

One five-passenger car at least to be available at Headquarters with an experienced chauffeur to be at the disposal of the C.O. and his staff, with car sticker supplied by City Police.

No. 20—Intercommunication and Transportation

Intercommunication and trans-

portation arrangements will be notified direct to parties concerned. J. S. DesROCHES, Major, Staff Officer.

APPENDIX "B" Canadian Legion

Point of Assembly: Canadian Legion Home, No. 57 Grafton St. at 9:30 A.M. and 2:30 P.M. Dress:—Khaki, berets and medals.

Berets and Medals ribbon available at all Legion Branches. Berets are to be worn with Maple Leaf slightly above and in front of left ear with slack pulled back to right rear of head.

The Canadian Legion Home will be Headquarters for all out-of-town returned men's families. Reservation at Soldiers' Monument for overseas Nursing Sisters, mothers, fathers and widows of those who died on Active Service, also aged and incapacitated Veterans.

Space has been reserved for all Amputation cases in front of Provincial Building.

Space has been reserved for South African Veterans from front of South African Monument. Wives and children of Veterans from outside the City have been granted the privilege of occupying space on Great George Street immediately in rear of school children.

Admittance to all reserved areas by ticket only which may be procured from Legion Branch Secretaries.

Every ex-service man in the Province, if possible should be on parade on June 14th, when our Patron-in-Chief His Majesty King George VI and Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth honour us with their presence.

APPENDIX "C"

Col. H. D. Johnson, O. St. J. of J. V. D. will have charge of all arrangements made by the St. John Ambulance Association. Lt.-Col. J. J. Blake, V. D. will co-operate with Col. Johnson in co-ordinating the work as far as possible. O. VATTOAN CITY, June 14—(AP)—Pope Pius XII personally thanked 3,200 Spanish soldiers today for defending "the faith and civilization of Spain under General Franco.

The Pontiff received the veterans of the civil war, who came here to march before Premier Mussolini in his victory celebrations, along with Ramon Serrano Sumer, Franco's brother-in-law and interior minister, and General Gastone Gambara, commander of the Italians who fought in Spain. Expressing sympathy for the widows and orphans of the war, the Holy Father urged them to "unite their sorrows with those of Our Lady of Sorrows and offer them to God with Christian resignation for the peace of the world."

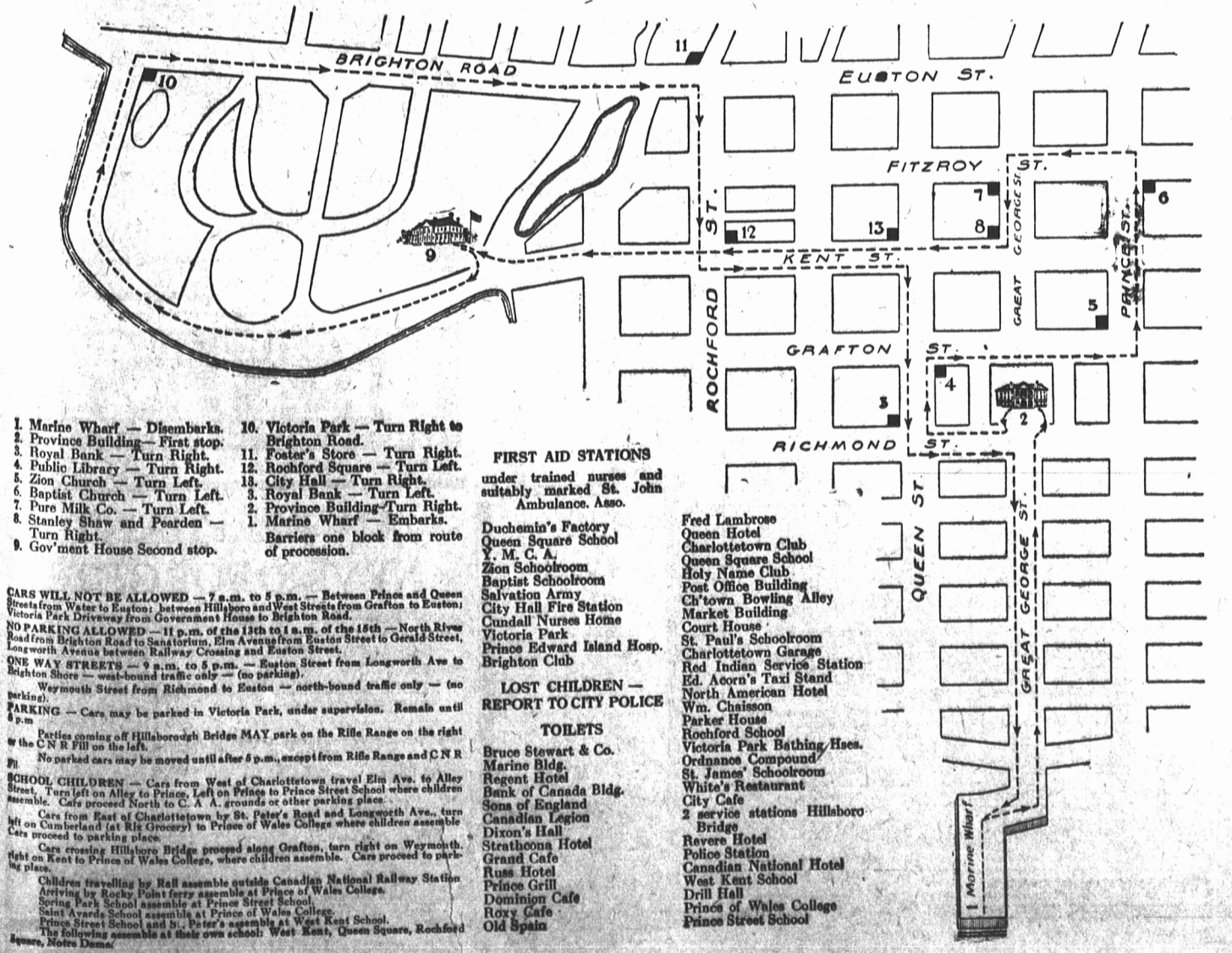

- LOST CHILDREN — REPORT TO CITY POLICE**
- SCHOOL CHILDREN**—Cars from West of Charlottetown travel Elin Ave. to Alley Street, Turn left on Alley to Prince, Left on Prince to Prince Street where children assemble. Cars proceed North to C. A. grounds or other parking place.
- Cars from East of Charlottetown, St. Peter's Road and Longworth Ave., turn left on Cumberland (at Rice Grocery) to Prince of Wales College where children assemble. Cars proceed to parking place.
- Cars proceeding to Hillsboro Bridge proceed along Grafton, turn right on Weymouth Street, turn left on Kent to Prince of Wales College, where children assemble. Cars proceed to parking place.
- Children travelling by Rail assemble outside Canadian National Railway Station (at West Kent) for assembly. Prince of Wales College, West Kent School, Queen Square, Rochford Square, Notre Dame.

CARS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED—7 a.m. to 5 p.m.—Between Prince and Queen Streets from Water to Euston; between Hillsboro and West Streets from Grafton to Euston; between Park Drive and Government House to Euston; between Fitzroy and Grafton Streets from Euston to Grafton Street.

NO PARKING—11 p.m. of the 13th to 1 a.m. of the 14th—North River Road from Brighton Road to Sanatorium, Elin Avenue from Euston Street to Gerald Street, Longworth Avenue between Railway Crossing and Euston Street.

ONE WAY STREETS—9 a.m. to 5 p.m.—Euston Street from Longworth Ave. to Brighton Street—westbound traffic only (no parking).

Weymouth Street from Richmond to Euston—north-bound traffic only—(no parking).

PARKING—Cars may be parked in Victoria Park, under supervision. Remains until 6 p.m.

Parties coming off Hillsborough Bridge MAY park on the Rifle Range on the right side of the C.N.R. fill on the left.

No parked cars may be moved until 6 p.m., except from Rifle Range and C.N.R. fill.
