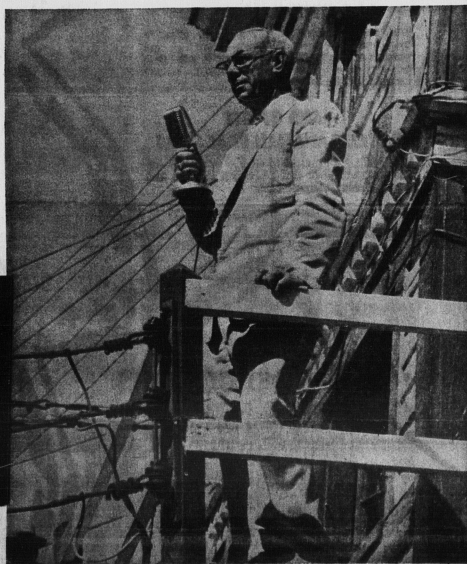




1963 PRESENTATION SCENE — BOB BROOK WINNER

High on the list of favorites for the big classic will be June Byrd, the queen of maritima pacers. June is the property of Greenbrier Farms, Charlotte and will be owned by the always-capable, James "Roach" MacGregor, Co. - favorite with June Byrd will be Edgewood Scott, owned by Ramsey, Howatt and Mayhew. This great pacer circled the Charlotte track a few weeks ago in the blistering time of 2:04.4. These two outstanding pacers will likely get the lion's share of the bettors' backing but don't forget that anything can happen in a horse race.

Arms acquired by Minutemen?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Since 1959, the U.S. Army has sold 839,267 rifles and other guns to National Rifle Association members and has spent at least \$12,000,000 for its program of supplying guns and ammunition to civilians.

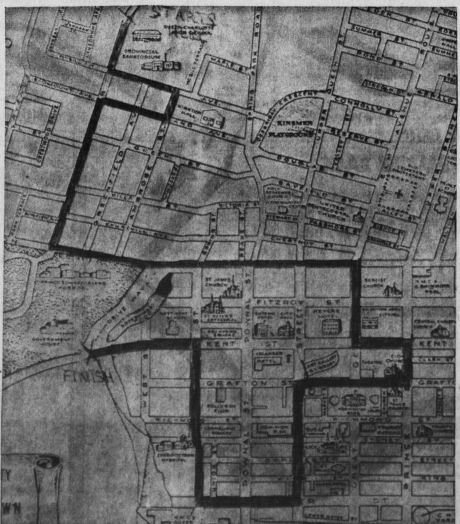
The army supplied these figures to Representative Henry B. Gonzalez (Dem. Tex.) who has accused the service of allowing the weapons and ammunition to fall into the hands of the Minutemen. The militant organization's members say they are training for what they expect to be guerrilla combat against a Communist takeover of the United States.

The army has said it is sure that "arms and ammunition do not fall into unscrupulous hands."

Gonzalez has replied that "the federal government has no way in the world of knowing who the 400,000 persons receiving free guns and ammunition are or what they are doing with their military aid."

Gonzalez made the army's figures public today.

The \$12,000,000 the army spent for supplying guns and ammunition to civilians over the last five years does not include the cost of selling guns at cut rates to members of the National Rifle Association. It is not clear how much money, if any, the latter program cost the army.
