THE SMELT INDUSTRY.—The smelt business is booming again at Richibucto, and good hauls are being made. Over twenty cargoes were despatched from that station in January, not including shipments in smaller lots. The season closes on the 15th of this month.

INTERESTING LECTURE.—The lecture given before the students of the Business College last evening by A. B. Warburton, Esq., was well attended. The subject, "Facts in English History," was well and skillfully handled, and the audience present thoroughly appreciated the rich treat. At the close Mr. Warburton was tendered a hearty vote of thanks. Principal Miller presided during the evening.

FROM ST. JOHN'S.—There are over one thousand houses built and in course of erection in St. John's, N.B., east. The rates of insurance have gone up 10 per cent. since the late fire. This, on \$4,000,000 worth of insurance held by companies there, amounts to an annual drain on the city property \$30,000 more than previously.

HE DIDN'T ANSWER.—Carlyle Harris was before the court at New York on Tuesday for wife poisoning, and the Recorder says: "As soon as Harris had turned around to go to the pen the name of Dr. Robert W. Buchanan, of Halifax, who is under indictment for wife poisoning, was called out. Both prisoners set face to face. 'Hello, Doctor, has your day come too?' asked Harris. Buchanan simply smiled, but didn't answer.

"SCRAPS OF ISLAND HISTORY."—This was the subject of the lecture given in Wright's Hall last evening by R. H. McLeod, of St. Eleanor's. Mr. W. Harris presided. The lecture occupied about an hour in its delivery, and was listened to with attention. It abounded in figures showing the progress of the Province from the time of its discovery until 1881. At the close, short addresses dealing with the early history of the Province were made by the Rev. Frederick E. J. Lloyd and John P. Tanton, Esq., and a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer.

DEATH OF MRS. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

A Fireman's Grievance.

SIR,—A short time ago the Fire Commissioners of Wards Four and Five, viz., Crabbe, Hooper, and Hughes, undertook to ignore the wish of the Rollo Company to give them a captain that was some good at a fire. They, in their wisdom, appointed a man and seven men under him that did not know how to cringle or uncouple hose. At the fire on Sunday morning, the 5th, Michael Hennessy and Matthew Murphy took their hose to the fire, and Bert Large and a man by the name of Whittle laid the hose. Now I think it is time for the citizens to rise up and say who shall appoint firemen, Ward Five councillors or the engineers who have to run the men. If it had not been for the old Rollo, who acted as an independent hose company, the fire might have assumed greater headway than it did. I think it is not well to allow this city to be run by two or three men, in case of fire, who know nothing at all about it, and especially when it is to get some of their pets in power so as to monopolize some of the city money, when good men who risk their lives to put out fire do not get a cent from the city only what the government grants.

A FIREMAN.

The Wrong Men In.

SIR,—Great credit is given to the firemen for their work at the fire Sunday morning in the stores of T. L. Chappelle and Geo. Carter & Co. This is nothing but right. But I think the press might go a little further and say a few words in praise of the members of the late Rollo Hose Company, who have lately been disbanded, that went to work to help the Chiefs out in their hard task of stopping the fire, and but for their assistance it is no knowing what the consequence might have been. If you wish to ascertain the correctness of this statement you only have to ask any of the Chiefs and, Sir, if you refer to the report in the columns of your paper of the 6th inst., you will see where you say a fireman, Jos. Hennessy, got his wrist badly cut. Now, Mr. Editor, Jos. Hennessy is not a fireman, but one of those I refer to, he being one of the members of the late Rollo Company. I might ask, while on this subject, how it was that the new Rollo company took nearly one half hour to get to the fire after the other companies, and I hear it was the members of the other company that took the hose of the Rollo company there after they had their own hose laid and the water turned on. I think the Fire Board made a very grave mistake when they put out of the late Rollo company good men who have been tried, both at fires and on the track, and accepted a company of green men, (with the exception of one or two) who know nothing about working at a fire. I think the sooner the Fire Board gets the members of the late Rollo Hose Company to take charge again, if they will accept it now, the better for citizens in general.

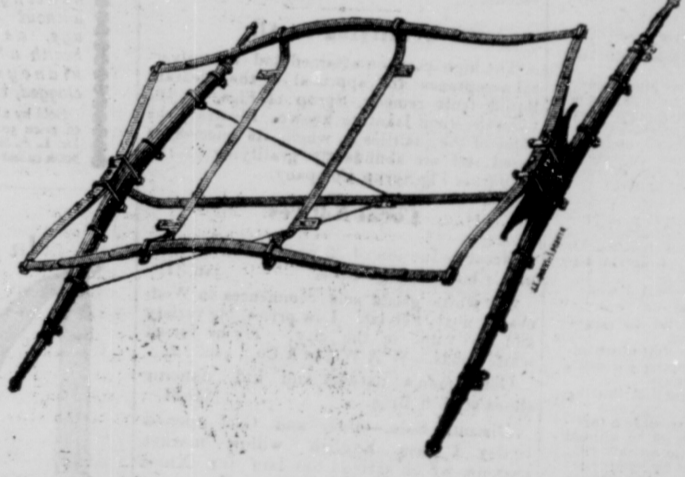
