Historical Talk Features Week

ALBERTON — During Education Week C. R. Leard, secretary of Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade, gave an interesting historical talk to the elementary school pupils at Alberton. It was especially prepared for school-age children.

Mr. Leard said that same-place origins in P.E.I. could fascinate even the youngest. As an example, he stated that Tignish is a Micmac word meaning "broken paddle". The story goes that two Indians, crossing in their canoe, at what is now Judge's Point broke a paddle and used it as a rudder. The name of the place was "Tignish".

Mr. Leard also gave many other interesting accounts of how P.E.I. villages got their names. He stated that a few years ago a number of very old Indian relics were uncovered near the head of Kildare River and they are now in a London museum. From these relics and other traces of life present man may draw conclusions as to how the Indians lived.

In closing, Mr. Leard said "the story of the discovery of Prince Edward Island and the first visit of Cartier in 1494 is a part of our heritage and of absorbing interest to all of us. I know you'll want to read more about it every time you get a chance."

O'Leary Girl Selected For Red Cross Venture

Mrs. W. W. Reid, director of Junior Red Cross for Prince Edward Island has been informed by the National Headquarters of the Canadian Red Cross Society that Bonita Boates, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Randall Boates of O'Leary, and president of the O'Leary school Red Cross council, has been chosen as one of the twelve delegates from Canada to attend a Junior Red Cross International Study Visit in the United States from August 1st-31st.

According to information received by Mrs. Reid, the plan is that half the delegates will assemble in New York and half in San Francisco. They will then be divided into small groups of five to six delegates from the United States to participate in selected local Red Cross programs and services.

While travelling in the United States, the delegates will live in American homes where they will participate in home and community activities as well as in family groups. The entire group will later convene in one spot, probably Washington, for a formal study program.

Compensation Plan Regarded 'Too High'

Agriculture minister Andrew MacRae yesterday was deeply concerned with the resolution passed at a meeting in Alberton which asked that potato growers be compensated at the rate of \$50 per acre up to a 15-acre maximum. "The request appears to be too high for consideration", Mr. MacRae said.

The resolution stated that growers have met with a loss in the past season because of low prices and drought conditions, and pointed out that the federal government reimbursed Western farmers to cover crop losses.

"Federal compensation to Western farmers," said Mr. MacRae "was two dollars per acre, up to a maximum of \$20. The resolution from Alberton asks that compensation to a maximum of \$750 be paid. That is far too high."

Mr. MacRae said that he had received a copy of the resolution but does not know for what reason he does not know where to direct a reply. He said he may comment on the resolution on a question of privilege in the Legislature, if it is possible.

Dr. Bonnell closed the meeting for removing the grant to hospitals of one dollar per month per patient day which brought \$8,000 to the Montague hospital, and would have brought more to other hospitals.

HOSPITALS LOSE OUT

Dr. Bonnell charged that the interference with the hospitals is prejudicing the patients' requests for complete recovery because they are being pressed to keep costs of meals down to a maximum of \$1.05 cents.

He charged the ministers with lack of responsibility, he said that he does not seem to realize their responsibility for announcing policies and telling the public what they have in mind for the benefit of the province. Instead, he charged, they are pushing their efforts at prejudicing the opposition. "They are wasting it now for three years".

He chided ministers for asking questions of their constituents for things for their districts. That is not what is expected in a representative assembly in a debate like this, he said. "That sort of thing is unbecomingly unbecoming."

INFORMATION LACKING

Dr. Bonnell also criticized the ministers because they had not told the House early in the debate what their departments had done and what they are planning for the future.

He challenged the government to make hospital insurance applicable to both tuberculosis and mental health treatment.

SWITCHES FORCES

TAPEI, Formosa (AP) — A lieutenant in the Chinese Communist Air Force who defected 19 days ago with his MIG-15 jet fighter became a lieutenant in the Chinese Nationalist Air Force Tuesday and a millionaire in Formosa dollars. For delivering the plane, Liu Cheng-wei was awarded 1,000 ounces of gold, worth 1,400,000 Formosa dollars, or \$55,000. Liu also received Kang Cheng (nationalist) medal and citation.

Winter Said 'Average'

SUMMERIDE — This winter is "just about an average winter" as far as overall snowfall is concerned, this is indicated by records kept at RCAF station Summeride over the past 12 years.

The 12 year mean is 99.8 inches while up to this date the snow has had an overall snowfall of 86 inches. However there is still a period of several weeks before it can be quite certain that no more of the fluffy stuff will fall before next winter snow.

Last year 17 inches of snow fell in April and two inches in May. In the first two weeks of March a year ago the Summeride area received 21 inches while in the same period this year only 11.8 inches has covered the level.

The total snow fall for last year was slightly more than 160 inches.
