OBITUARY.—We are exceedingly sorry to find the name of Mr. A. C. McKenzie in our obituary column to-day. His brief illness terminated fatally yesterday at noon. Mr. McKenzie was well known to a number of our citizens, and was a great favorite in the Medical College which he was attending. He was regarded both by his Professors and class-mates as a superior student; and gave promise of excellence in his chosen profession. He was indeed a favorite in all circles in which he moved, and his early and sudden death causes a blank that will not be easily filled. Mr. McKenzie was a native of Covenish, P. E. Island. He commenced his studies with Rev. Dr. Murray (now of Charlottetown) taught for several years, and then took a three years course at Dalhousie College. Had he lived till the spring he would have graduated in medicine, and bade fair to graduate with honors. We deeply sympathize with his bereaved parents and friends. His remains were taken to Charlottetown to-day, to be interred in the family burying ground at Covenish, P. E. I. Halifax Herald.

Irish National Land League.

The Charlottetown Branch of the League held its weekly meeting last evening in St. Patrick's Hall. The President occupied the chair. Several new members were enrolled.

The formation, on the 25th inst., of another new League was reported, namely, the "Michael Davitt Branch," County Line.

The President announced that as some of the Collecting Committees had not completed the canvass of their Ward, a full report of the several Committees would be submitted at next meeting.

Mr. James Hughes, at the request of the President, addressed the meeting in an able and spirited speech, which was replete with historical references to the great leaders of ancient times who battled for the rights and liberties of the nations oppressed in a period less civilized than ours. He showed that the true and tried leaders of Ireland's bonded children were no less deserving of the admiration bestowed on the deliverers of mankind in ancient times. Ireland's history showed her to be an enlightened nation, and her past glory entitled her to a better place than under the heel of the oppressor. He referred to the existence of a deep-rooted hatred and prejudice against the Irish race; but, notwithstanding this feeling, they were exciting the warmest sympathy of the best and truest of the human race—irrespective of creed or country. The powerful forces arrayed in opposition to us were sufficient to dismay the most courageous; but the God of Justice was on our side, and the battle was not always to the strong—and, in the signs of the times, there was nothing more certain than that Landlordism and its train of attendant evils would be swept off the face of the earth.

Robert Shaw, Esq., M. P. P., next came forward, and stated he had much pleasure in availing himself of this first opportunity, since becoming a member of the League, of expressing his sympathy for the farmers of Ireland now engaged in the greatest popular agitation of our day. Mr. Shaw said the system of Landlordism which once had existence on this Island possessed many bad features, but it afforded no comparison with those systems which grind into the dust the peoples of the Old World, and more especially in that land of oppression—Ireland. The feeling for land reform also exists in Scotland, and in all probability her patriots would, like Davitt and Parnell, be yet in the felon's cell. The doctrine that he who tills the soil is its rightful owner was becoming general; and no oligarchy, no matter how powerful, could, at this day, resist the demands of the people in the assertion of their just and established rights.

Mr. Cox read an article from the suppressed number of United Ireland, which shows by the begging appeals of the Property Defence Association that Landlordism is on its last legs.

A vote of thanks was tendered Messrs. Hughes, Shaw and Cox.
