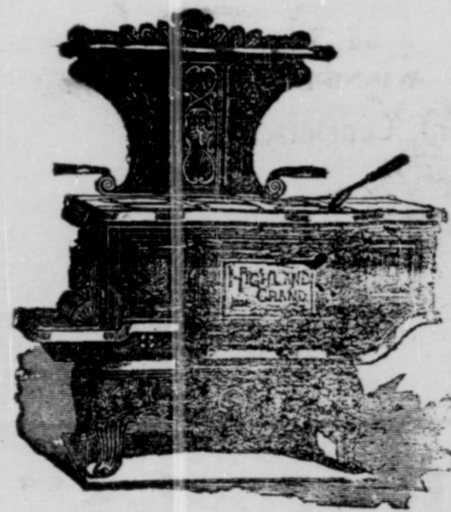

SIR CHARLES TUPPER.

The spirit displayed by Sir Charles Tupper in the hour of his defeat will intensify the admiration of his friends for his grand and patriotic work while in office and power. His farewell message is dignified in its references to himself and full of hope and confidence in its references to the Liberal-Conservative party. Everyone will, we feel sure, unite in the hope that the closing days of the grand old man will be happy and peaceful. He has ever been active in body and brain, and it is not to be supposed that he will now sink into a condition of lethargy. Without doubt he will continue to take a keen interest in the young nationality which he has done so much to build up. We hope that he will be spared to do good work for the country--outside the political arena.

A PARTY CONVENTION.

The suggestion of one of THE EXAMINER's correspondents that a convention of all those who are opposed to the Farquharson Administration should be held without delay, is one that ought to be considered instantly. No doubt the Farquharson Government ought not to spring an election upon the country at this juncture. No doubt the people should have the public accounts of the current year before them ere they are called upon to give a verdict upon the merits or demerits of the Farquharson Administration. No doubt the Government should continue in office until the end of its term seeing that there is no good reason why they should not do so. But the rights and fitness of things have little weight in the minds of the New Liberals who hold office in this Province when the intense satisfaction they feel in being able to take their opponents at a disadvantage is at the other end of the scale. Their opponents must, therefore, come to a decision promptly; and if the decision is to give battle, all must stand together. Of course, as our correspondent points out, there are many points of difference between a Dominion and a Provincial election, and it does not follow that the recent success of Sir Louis and Mr. Hughes will ensure the success of the Farquharson candidates in the same territory.

The Halifax Chronicle says: "On the evening before his departure for the Presbyterian College, Halifax, a number of friends from the section of Little Harbor and Big Harbor Island, called upon C. C. McIntosh at his home, and presented him with a purse of money accompanied by an address expressing their good will towards him and best wishes for his future welfare." Mr. McIntosh was catechist at Dundas two or three years ago, and has many friends in this province.

All speechmaking records have been broken by Mr. Roosevelt, the Republican candidate for vice president in the recent campaign across the border. He travelled 21,209 miles, visited 557 towns and cities and twenty-four states, and made 673 speeches addressing 3,000,000 people.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

An Ottawa despatch reports that Mr. Tarte has returned to his department "feeling very lucky." Of course.

It is remarked that there is a reason to believe that, among other things, Sir Richard Cartwright has changed his views as to the "shreds and patches" of the Dominion.

The Montreal Gazette: "Anything is good enough for the soldiers, and nothing is too good for the army contractors. That, at least, is what the majority of the Canadian people have voted, whether it is what they think or not."

The Montreal Star remarks that the most striking feature of the election is the contrast between the attitudes of the two great central provinces of the Dominion. While Quebec has considerably increased the Liberal majority Ontario has turned a Liberal majority of twelve into a Conservative majority of sixteen. If the whole Dominion had expressed the same disapproval of the Government as the premier province, the Laurier Administration would have suffered an overwhelming defeat.

HAS THE TIME ARRIVED?

SIR.--You express a doubt in Saturday's issue as to "whether the time has arrived at which the people can hope to be successful in striking off the shackles" of the corrupt party which now misgoverns this Province. There was certainly a co-partnership on the seventh. Any decent man who saw the fearful ogies at East Royalty on that day and on many previous days would tell you that the time has assuredly arrived. We had the machine here in full blast and it was manipulated by a master hand. Road jobs, rum and money were the agents used. Let the Conservative party rise to a man now--at once, and make a determined effort to drive from power the men who are corrupting and degrading the men--old and young--of our country. Let the party run a pure election and they will receive the support of the best men in the Province irrespective of party. The people are sick of the use of rum at elections. Is there a Dr. Roddick amongst the candidates who will set the example to all other candidates?
