SCHOOL ACT AMENDMENTS.

The Government has brought in a little bill to amend the Public Schools Act, 1877. It is needless to say that it does not at all meet the case of the country at large. A few provisions against truancy and against a daily average attendance of less than twelve scholars, are submitted as a sort of fender for the significant section which enacts that a third inspector of schools shall be appointed at the expense of the tax-payers. There is evidently a "kicking Liberal" whom the office will suit. It is, apparently, hoped that the additional salary will be made up by cutting down the pay of first and second-class teachers of small schools to the amount paid third-class teachers.

The last section of the bill admits of the appointment of women as members of the Charlottetown and Summerside School Boards. Referring to this provision, Hon. Mr. Gordon drew upon his ample store of classic learning when he said that since the time that the Spartan lady entered the Senate with sword in hand, and expressed her regret that the men should think the women of so little account in affairs of state up to the present, women have proved their ability to take positions in the profession of law, medicine, science and arts on equality with men; and why not on the Board of Trustees? With such a recommendation from such a source, the passage of ladies to seats at the School Board is assured.

A Washington despatch reports that "all hope of reconvening the joint American Canadian Commission in August has been abandoned."

A shameful act of injustice on the part of Mr. Speaker, committed last evening, was this forenoon the theme of conversation in opposition circles. Members of the Government party may imagine that they are "smart" when they constrain the Speaker to favor them. If they were wise they would be careful to see that the Opposition obtained fair play. The men who compose the Opposition are not of the quality which submits to gross injustice; and they will be heard, sooner or later, notwithstanding the petty favoritism of the Speaker.

THE NEW GOVERNMENT STEAMER.—The new steamer being built by the department of Marine and Fisheries, in the yard between Poole & Lewis' and Peake's No. 2 wharves, will be launched about the 27th of this month. She is being built 96 feet between perpendiculars, with a 19 ft beam and 8 ft. hull. The contractor for the hull is Mr. John White, of O'Leary; and Messrs Bruce Stewart & Co., are supplying the engines and boilers. The machinery is guaranteed to give her a speed of 9 knots an hour continuously, a sea. The engines are to be about 35 nominal horse power. It is expected that the steamer will be altogether finished the first week in July when the agent of the Department here will take charge of her, to supply the lighthouse, etc., and after the needs of the Marine branch of the department are filled she will be handed over to the Fisheries branch and will be employed in the protection of lobsters in the Strait of Northumberland.

TRAINS WEST—A GRIEVANCE.

Sir,—Every reasonable man will admit that it is time the railway authorities did something to remove the hardship of travel and the intolerable delay of mails to the west. There is no good reason why we should be without our two trains all winter any more than any other section of the Intercolonial system. We have convinced everybody that a change from the summer to the winter schedule should not put us back to the vexations of travel of twenty years ago. Every person from the east, of ordinary intelligence, has pronounced the present western arrangement simply insupportable. We quite understand that the superintendent of the road, desirous as we believe him to be to follow the progressive system here that obtains on the other side, may have been unable to secure in a moment the necessary conveniences we demanded last fall, and must continue to demand until West Prince, the paying section of the road, gets a moderate share of attention from the railway authorities. But how comes it now, with the rush of spring work on, and the necessity of travel, and the prompt delivery of goods and mails apparent to all, that we are still kept to the old winter train—every single night to the disgust of everybody—an hour, an hour and a half, and two hours late at its destination? Three trains accommodate the section between Summerside and Charlottetown. The west must, this 10th day of May, put up with one slow, lumbering, belated train, while it contributes largely to the fast express, etc., which render life bearable to eastern people. Surely Mr. Sharp is able to do more fairly by us. Other years we had the through express at least every other day. Surely it is not necessary to await the change of time on the mainland—winter or summer does not interfere with the number of trains afforded, to give us the scant service of even other years.

We are glad to learn that the trans-continental C. P. R. train will reach Painesco this year nearly two hours earlier than formerly and that the maritime express passes this point in the forenoon. This will allow the mail express meeting the boat to put down its passengers at Charlottetown at a comparatively early hour, say 9:30 o'clock at the latest. It is to be hoped that, for the insignificant service its detention in town would render, the upcoming evening train will not be delayed after the manner of last year, but will be in Summerside to meet the boat also, and reach Tignish not later than 10:30. The odd agent coming west from Souris or Georgetown should not delay and inconvenience the whole country and bring the only prompt service we have ever had into contempt.

LAI D TO REST.—The funeral of the late Mrs. Malcolm McLeod took place this afternoon at half-past two, to Sherwood Cemetery by carriages. There was a large attendance of relatives and friends. The pall-bearers were: Messrs W. E. Dawson, Percy Pope, L. W. Watson, Capt. Tooker, G. A. Gane, and John Richards.

THE STEAMERS.—The City of Genet arrived here at 3 o'clock this morning with one passenger to this port. She sailed again at about 11:30 with a general cargo of hay, oats, potatoes, pork, etc.

The B. navista is expected from Montreal this afternoon. She sails tomorrow evening for St. John's, Nfld., taking a large quantity of live stock.

The Halifax leaves Boston tomorrow and will be due here on Monday, about midnight. The Grand Duchess is to make weekly trips on this route during July and August.

POLICE COURT.—John Reid, a laboring man, appeared in the Police Court this morning to answer to three separate charges. The first was for an assault upon one, Isaac Murley, for which the Magistrate fined him \$5 or thirty days imprisonment. The second was for breaking Owen Trainor's window on Queen St., for which a like fine was imposed. The third was for being drunk and disorderly, for which he was condemned to pay \$4, or twenty days imprisonment.

The hearing of the case against a young man for fighting on the streets was adjourned for eight days to procure the attendance of the other participants in the fight.

THE DREDGE "PRINCE EDWARD"—Some extensive improvements and alterations have been made to the dredge Prince Edward this spring, under the supervision of Captain Larkins. The work is being finished today, and the crew goes on tomorrow. The improvements consist of a new scoop made by Bruce Stewart & Co., a new handle for the scoop ten feet longer than the old one, three new anchor posts, ten feet longer than the old ones. She has also been thoroughly corked and re-painted and the machinery has all been repaired and refitted. The first dredging done this year will be at the Railway wharf, which will be dredged to a depth of twenty-five feet at low spring tide. This is being done to accommodate the large ocean liners. With the tug T. A. Stewart, (\$25 a day) also repaired and cleaned up, a large amount of dredging will probably be got through this season.
