Commander Of The Canadian Spitfire Wing Pens Biography

THE BOOK CORNER By THE CANADIAN PRESS Group Capt. J. E. (Johnnie) Johnson has added a personal and engrossing chapter to the history of Canada's airman in Wing Leader (Clarke, Irwin), his story of the exploits that made him the Allies top-scoring fighter pilot of the Second World War.

A civil engineer who learned to fly at weekends, Johnson began his Royal Air Force career as a sergeant-pilot in 1939. When the war ended six years later he was a group captain, had been credited officially with 38 German planes destroyed and held the DSO and two bars, the DFC and bar.

Wing Leader is the story of that brilliant wartime career and because Johnson—now deputy director of tactical operations at the British Air Ministry—flew with Canadians from 1941 until shortly before VE-Day it is a story with wide interest for Canadian readers.

FIRST MEETING His first close association with Canadians came in 1941 when Douglas Bader, the legless ace of the RAF, became his wing commander and brought with him to his new post some of the men who had served under him in the Battle of Britain in the RAF's famous all-Canadian squadron.

Johnson was flying on the same operations as Bader when the latter was shot down and taken prisoner in August, 1941, and writes feelingly of the qualities of leadership of "the greatest tactician of them all," the man who "taught us the true meaning of courage, spirit, determination, guts—call it what you will."

The modest Bader, incidentally may have been squirming under this tribute when, in a foreword to Wing Leader, he wrote: "Dear Johnnie, I did not know you could read and write! In spite of what you say about me I think this is a splendid book."

Johnson was commanding his own squadron by the time of the Dieppe raid in August, 1942, and engaged in bitter fighting over the English Channel and French coast that day.

DIEFPE CRITICISM His summary of the raid was that while it was "a story of great gallantry and heavy loss of life" it was a record of poor security of faulty intelligence, of inadequate communications between air and ground, of a confused and bloody ground situation over which central control could not be exercised.

In 1943, Johnson was given command of a Canadian Spitfire wing and from then until just before the war ended led RCAF wings with only occasional breaks—in some of their greatest battles. They provided air cover for the Normandy invasion, and never met a German plane, were the first wing based in Normandy, and scored impressive victories, in the air and against transport.
