

Beavers Edge Islanders 6 To 5 In Overtime

"Y" Scores 58-55 Win Over Schurmans In Hoop Game Here Last Evening

The Y. M. C. A., on their fourth attempt, finally broke into the win column as they came from behind to defeat Schurmans of Summerside 58-55 in a scheduled Physical Fitness Hoopla encounter at the P. W. C. court last night. The win puts the Trianglesmen in undisputed possession of third place two points behind the idle Airforce and the P. W. C. Welshmen who are in turn two markers behind the pace setting S. D. U. squad.

The game itself, though not particularly well-played, was close throughout, until, with forty-five seconds remaining and the Y down one point, George Scantlebury and Howard Glover dunked one apiece to bring home the basket to coach Tim Tyler.

The first few minutes set a precedent that remained until full time, as a fast pace prevailed without letup. The Y though not dominating the play slightly during the first half, with the Schurmanites, mainly on the shooting of Ralph Smith who flipped for 16 points in the period, keeping only slightly behind their opponents. Score at the half, Y. M. C. A. 33, Schurmans 30.

Play roughened considerably in the second period as the Schurmanites though outshot 40-29 made a real fight of it. Both teams' passing fell off during the half causing many wild scrambles as both teams played it to the hilt. The Y hit on a 33 percentage in the canto while the Western squad making a neat 40 percent.

Pick of the winners were Don MacLean with 18, Howard Glover with 12 and Red Howat, who, besides handling the ball beautifully found time to dunk another 8, George Scantlebury having 9.

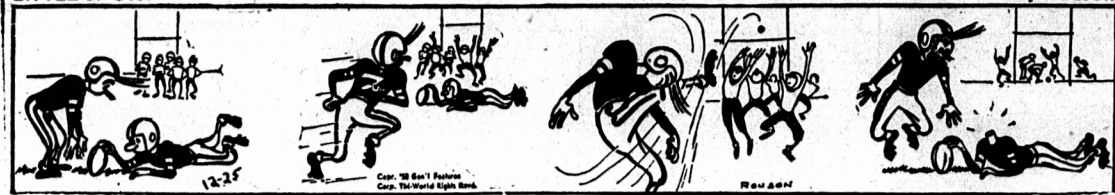
Top man for the night, however was Earl Smith who paced his team all the way with a big 23 points, the highest total recorded in league play this year. Charlie

Maple Leafs Score 4-3 Victory Over Canadiens

TORONTO, Jan. 24 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs defeated Montreal Canadiens 4-3 here tonight before 13,240 National Hockey League fans to keep Montreal winless in five games on Toronto ice this season.

In nine games between the clubs so far, Maple Leafs have won seven, tied one and lost the other.

The victory put the second-place Toronto squad within eight points of the leading Detroit Red Wings. Montreal remains in third place, now 15 points behind Toronto.

Ten penalties were handed out by referee Red Storey, including two majors, two 10-minute misconducts and a match misconduct.

The occupants of the penalty box were Leaf centre Ted Kennedy and Tommy Johnson, big rookie Montreal defenceman.

They became involved in a fist fight in the first half of the second period and both were tagged with major sentences. Their battle flared again when they arrived in the penalty box and the referee added misconducts for both.

Kennedy and Johnson were off for the remainder of the period and had barely sat down in the box at the start of the final frame when Johnson started throwing punches again. He was given a match misconduct.

Canadiens played without Maurice Richard, the league's leading goal getter, who has a severe charley horse.

Strange things are always happening in hockey, and the recent bad drawings that the second-place Halifax St. Mary's squad have taken from Saint John Beavers and Moncton Hawks in their last two starts seems to be the main topic of conversation among local hockey fans at the moment. Many are asking "what has happened to Halifax? Are the other teams showing that much superiority over them?"

The source of conversation is not due to the fact that they have lost games to Beavers and Hawks; that is bound to happen and the league-leading Islanders are not excluded. It is the fact that they have lost by such lopsided scores, and one of these at the hands of the cellar dwelling Moncton squad who have only won 13 games and tied three in 58 played this season.

If the losses were by one or two goals, nobody would give it a second thought because it is no more than can be expected—but when Saint John drub them 11-4 and two nights later Hawks down them 7-4, particularly after Islanders beat Moncton 6-1 the night previous, people naturally start wondering what it is all about. At first seeing the results of those games, one would jump to the conclusion that Saint Mary's must have been playing short handed. This was not the case however, as they had 15 men in action on both occasions.

Not being present at those games, it is pretty hard to pass judgment or answer such questions, but from the accounts of the games from those who did witness them, it appears that the Halifax defence was the big weakness, plus the fact that the opposition were definitely having one of their better nights, with their plays and passes clicking to perfection.

From what has been seen of Ed D'Aoust's performances over local ice this season, it would be hard to find fault in that department as the adept net custodian in the Halifax cage has been kicking out more than his fair share of rubber all season. And judging from accounts of the games, he is doing more than pulling his weight, despite the high scoring against him. In the 1-4 contest against Beavers, D'Aoust kicked aside 40 shots, some of which were sensational saves, according to reports. That should speak well for Ed's cause.

After all is said and done, it was probably a couple of bad nights for the Saints, although there is no doubt that both Beavers and Hawks are making stronger and more aggressive showings of late, with the former likely to be the big team to worry about come playoff time. In both instances, reports stated that Halifax played "unimpressive and loose" hockey, which is probably the big answer to current questions. Could be too that Saints tough battle with Islanders on Saturday night, which Halifax won 3-1, may have had a more serious reaction than one would expect. It was a rugged battle and was bound to have taken plenty out of both squads.

Following close on the heels of their exhibition performance at Montague on Tuesday, Leo Lamoureux will take his team to Summerside today where they will put on a similar show for fans there in aid of the "Canadian March of Dimes Campaign." They put on a show at Montague that pleased fans there no end, and realized some \$90 or more for this very worthy and needy cause.

With what little free time the boys of the team have during a long four-games-a-week schedule, they are to be congratulated for the interest they are showing in aid of the "March of Dimes" in contributing their time and talents to such a public spirited enterprise. At Montague, the boys will give fans there a real show, and it is a foregone conclusion that the keen sporting spirit that has always prevailed in Summerside will turn out in force to support their efforts and help a needy cause.

The Island Motor Transport Company, who transported the team to Montague on Tuesday, will also provide the same facilities for the Summerside trip. They have donated their services free of charge, and are thus adding their much appreciated contribution to this fine program in aid of the March of Dimes.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24 (AP)—Joe Louis, the former heavyweight boxing champion, was sued for \$100,000 today by a woman who said he beat her up in a Cleveland hotel room last July 4.

The plaintiff in the Supreme Court damage suit is Odessa Calloway, 25-year-old New York Negro golfer, who said she was attending a Cleveland golf tournament at the time.

She did not go into details of the alleged assault beyond charging that Louis "violently and in a brutal manner, assaulted, struck and beat me about the head, face, body and limbs without provocation."

Capitalize On Breaks In Wide Open Contest For Exciting Victory

Les Ramsay's Saint John Beavers squeezed out a close 6-5 victory over Charlottetown Islanders in a rip-roaring hockey contest that was forced into nine minutes and five seconds of overtime play here last night at the Forum in a regular Maritime Senior Hockey League contest that provided a thrill a minute.

A goal by Paul Platz at 9:05 of the overtime play on assists from Jack Thaler and Eddie Bolan gave them their victory, which now puts them within five points of second-place Halifax Saint Mary's who were idle last night and leaves Islanders still leading the loop by 23 points.

Taking advantage of every break over an aggressive Islanders team, Beavers jumped into a 2-0 lead at the end of the first period, only to have Islanders come roaring back in the second frame to bang home four goals by the 10:01 mark for a two-goal lead. Two more goals by Beavers and one for the Islanders in the last half of the frame saw the game stand at 4-3 for the Lamoureux coached crew.

Nothing up the equalizer at 7:24 of the third frame while Islanders battled shorthanded on four occasions, Saint John sent the game into overtime, and after weathering powerful attacks by Islanders during most of the extra frame, broke out on a smart rush led by Platz to come up with the winning goal with 55 seconds left in the game.

The big "Buck" Whitlock was the play-point-getter for the winning visitors with two goals and an assist, while Ted Watson also picked up a brace. Defenceman Ossie Carnegie and Paul Platz also garnered one each. Carnegie, making his first appearance over Charlottetown ice for the Beavers, came up with a solid performance to collect an assist as well, while Nick Nicolle, Tom Brennan, Thaler and Bolan garnered assists.

Marcel Clements led the Islanders on goals with two, while Jack Morrow, Frank Bathgate, and Bruno Favero accounted for the remainder with one each. Defenceman George McLagan picked up two assists, Bathgate, Johnny Horeck, Beaton, Travis and Beaudry also chalking up assists.

Islanders were outplayed by the visitors who came up to deadlock the count for the second time. Ted Watson fired the marker on a smart three-way attack with Whitlock and Brennan at 7:24. Going into overtime, Islanders once again forced the play deep into Beavers' territory, but again the breaks panned off for the visitors. Weathering a powerful barrage by Islanders nearly the entire extra frame, Bolan sent Platz away at his own blue line while Islanders were playing it deep. Carrying in on goal, Phil Vitale skated Platz out of behind the puck going in behind Islanders net where Thaler picked it up to centre it out in front of the net. Platz banged at it but Hal Gordon was there to block it with a nice save, only to have Platz flip in his own rebound over a prostrate Gordon.

Definitely the aggressors for two frames, Islanders outshot their opponents 32 to 23, but the Beavers made every break pay off. By periods Brodeur stopped 12, 12 and 3, while Gordon turned aside 4, 8 and 7.

Whitlock got their third while Favero was serving an interference rap in the second frame and Watson scored Beavers' first tally in the third frame while Clements was doing two minutes for tripping. All Islanders' goals were scored while both teams were at full strength.

Turning on a powerful demonstration of hockey in the early stages of the first period, Islanders stormed all around the Saint John goal, but some sensational blocking by the cage by Dennis Brodeur barred the white Beavers' efforts twice on smart breakaways while Islanders were playing every man up. At 7:46 of the frame Carnegie intercepted a pass at centre ice, carried in over the blue line to set Whitlock up in the clear with a nice pass. While Vitale was serving a penalty, Carnegie again came to the fore. Breaking up an Islanders rush, the husky defenceman broke from behind his own blue line, weaved his way up the ice right in on goal, had his first shot blocked by Hal Gordon but pushed in his own rebound.
