FOR FORGING CHECKS.

Frank Murphy, of Emyvale, Arrested This Morning.

A young man named Frank Murphy, belonging to Emyvale, Lot 39, was this morning arrested at his father's house by police-sergeant Bradley, police officer Campbell and Constable William Taylor, on a charge of forgery. The officers left Charlottetown at eleven o'clock last night, and made the arrest at three this morning. They got back to the city about eight o'clock.

When sergeant Bradley made the arrest he said to Murphy, "Do you know what this is for?" Murphy's reply was "I suppose so," and upon Bradley offering to tell him if he guessed aright he said, "For Alfred McEachen."

Murphy was arraigned before police-Magistrate Hazard at ten o'clock this morning, and several witnesses were examined.

The evidence showed that on the 15th Murphy entered the shoe shop of Mr. A. E. McEachen, on Queen Street, and bought a pair of boots and a small valise. In payment he tendered a check for \$12 made payable to James Murray, and to which the signature of Benj. Beartz was affixed. Mr. McEachen did not wish to cash the check, but did so upon the assurance of Murphy that he was the James Murray to whom it was made payable and that he was employed on Mr. Beartz's farm, giving the difference between the cost of the goods and the amount of the check in cash. He subsequently discovered that the check was forged and reported the matter to the police.

It was also shown that on the 7th Murphy passed checks on Prowse Bros. and Goff Bros. To both of these checks the name of P. P. Archibald was attached, and each was made payable to James Macdonald an employe of Mr. Archibald. The check cashed by Prowse Bros. was for \$12, and he got the amount in cash. The check cashed at Goff Bros. was for \$16 and he got the amount in full, less the price of a pair of boots. Previous to going to Goff Bros. Murphy tried to have the check cashed at Weeks & Co's., but failed.

Another charge of forgery preferred against Murphy is to be investigated this day week, to which date Murphy has been remanded to jail. This is a charge of passing a check for \$17 upon W. E. Dawson, to which the name of M. P. Hogan was attached. Upon this check goods to the value of \$4 and the balance in cash was obtained.

Mr. McEachen positively identified Murphy as the man who passed the check upon him. He has also been identified as the person who passed the check at Dawson's store. Mr. L. E. Prowse said he believed him to be the one who had the check cashed in their store. Mr. Webster could not identify him as the one who cashed the check at Goff Bros.

City Marshal Cameron and Sergeant Bradley deserve credit for the detective ability exhibited in connection with the case. A few days after the first forgeries were reported to them they had their man located and preparations made for his arrest.

EMPLOYMENT BUREAU.

An employment bureau has just been opened by the Women's council, and the information office will be conducted by Miss Snellgrove, Kent Street. Following are the regulations and scale of charges:

1. Fees be paid to Miss Snellgrove.

2. Reference must be given by persons wanting employment.

Terms for persons wanting employment:

1. Initial fee for registering name, 5 cents.

2. Such name to be retained on books for the period of three months in cases of temporary employment, such as sewing girl, errand boys, laundresses, &c., without further pay.

3. In cases of employment for more lengthened periods, such as domestic servants, &c., besides the fee of 5 cents, an additional payment of 5 per cent. of first month's wage to be paid at the end of the month.

4. Every time one of the class, such as domestic servants, obtains a situation through the bureau, the fee is to be renewed.

Terms for employers:

1. Initial fee, 10 cents, in cases of obtaining persons for work by the day, such as sewing girls, &c., the name of employe is to be retained on books without further pay for a period of three months.

2. In cases of obtaining servants for more lengthened terms, such as domestic servants, 15 cents additional to be paid when help is secured.

3. For every servant of the more permanent class, the fees, both initial and additional amounting to 25 cents to be renewed.

For persons with a recommendation from one of the women of the Council can have name registered for work by the day free. It is recommended that the member of council who takes an interest in above persons pay the initial fee.

Employment registry:
All persons wanting employment, and employers of labor in want of assistance, will obtain help and situations by applying to Miss Snellgrove, Kent Street.
