THE RELIEF OF MAFEKING

FLYING COLUMN WITHIN A FEW DAYS' MARCH.

Lord Roberts Eight Miles South of Kroonstadt.

Boers Evacuate Their First Line of Entrenchments—Brabant's Cavalry Seize a Drift—Broadwood's Brigade Capture Prisoners and Wagons—Mobility of the Boers—Chamberlain Discusses the War.

RELIEF OF MAFEKING.
LONDON, May 12.—Mafeking's relief seems to be almost at hand.

News reached London last night that a strong flying column said to be composed of 30,000 cavalry and infantry with a battery of six guns passed hot foot through Vryburg on Wednesday.

The column, which is said to be travelling at forced speed day and night, is probably this morning within two days' march of Mafeking.

TURNED UP—ALL RIGHT.

OTTAWA, May 12.—The militia department has received a cable stating that Privates Allan, Moorhouse, Nilant and Delisle (the Canadians who were reported missing since April 30) have all turned up.

MR. CHAMBERLAIN SPEAKS.

BIRMINGHAM, May 12.—Mr. Chamberlain presided last night at a meeting of the grand committee of the Liberal Unionists of Birmingham.

Discussing the war, Mr. Chamberlain said: "I would not be ashamed to take the whole responsibility for the war; but if there was any special responsibility it rests with those who visited Kruger and who encouraged him to resist demands whose moderation had been acknowledged. If England has erred she has erred in being too lenient."

Turning to the question of South African settlement and the fate of the republics, Mr. Chamberlain said: "While the government do not wish to be vindictive, they are determined that never again shall the South African republics be the nursery of conspiracy and they will see that justice is done to those who are determined to be loyal."

The government are not prepared to recognize the independence of the Boer republics, (cheers.) We are determined that the republics shall be finally incorporated under British institutions. For an interval they must be crown colonies. But we hope that South Africa will eventually become a great self-governing colony like Canada and Australia.

ROBERTS' RAPID RATE.

LONDON, May 12.—Lord Roberts telegraphed under date of May 11: "My headquarters are with General Pole-Carew's division; marched twenty miles today, and am now at Geneva Siding, where the Boers are holding entrenched positions.

General Gordon's brigade is in touch with them.

Broadwood's brigade overtook part of the enemy's convoy yesterday and captured several wagons and some prisoners.

General Hutton's Mounted Infantry is some distance due north of this place.

We have taken nearly a hundred prisoners during the last two days.

RECONNOITERING KROONSTADT.

LONDON, May 12.—The War Office is

in receipt of the following from Lord Roberts:

BOSRAND, May 12.—I am eight miles south of Kroonstadt. The enemy evacuated their first line of entrenchments during the night.

We are now reconnoitering towards Kroonstadt.

General Brabant's cavalry seized a drift over the Vaal river at 4.30 last evening,—just in time to prevent the passage being opposed by the enemy.

MOBILE BOERS.

EDEN, May 11.—The Boers retired somewhat today, but it is impossible to say where they may turn up next owing to their great mobility.

THE TROUBLE IN ASHANTI.

Rebellious Tribes Said to Have 50,000 Men.

Corn for the Starving.

NEW YORK, May 11.—The famine relief steamer Quito sailed today for Bombay, India, with 200,000 bushels of corn for the famine districts. This, the largest cargo ever carried by any vessel on a similar errand, comes from people of all denominations in every part of the United States. The Kansas India famine relief committee is represented by 20,000 bushels, and the Mennonites committee by 8,000 bushels. It is expected that the voyage will be made in 40 days.

—In the House of Commons a few days ago Sir Henry Joly declared that since the new duty of ten cents a pound was imposed on foreign grown tobacco the quantity of Canadian-grown plant dealt with by the Inland Revenue officers had quadrupled. In 1897 the quantity was 690,000 pounds. In 1898, the first year of the increased customs tax, it was 1,949,000 pounds, and in 1899, 2,500,000 pounds. For the six months of the present year the Canadian-grown tobacco passing through the factories was 1,900,000 pounds, while for January alone, it was 250,000 pounds. Sir Henri called this a remarkable showing, and attributed it to the stimulus of the increased rates of customs duty, and to the improved methods of growing and curing that have been adopted, themselves a result of the first cause. Another proof of the practical value of the protective policy in a new country!

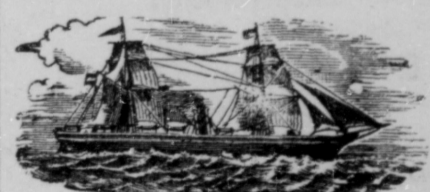
