The audience listened with breathless attention during the recital, and at the end applauded loudly. No doubt most present would have been better pleased if more of the children had taken part separately. But, however, it would be cruel to criticize, when we know the committee did its best, and the charge was only ten cents. The Rev. Mr. Lathern occupied the chair, and gracefully complimented some of the performers.
