Approximately 73 athletes from Maritime centres plus two or three men from outside the Maritimes will be competing in the championship track and field meet here next Monday afternoon. It was stated last night by Brigadier W. W. Reid, Director of the Physical Fitness Department.

The bulk of the 73 athletes will be representing the Charlottetown Abegweits, Antigonish Highland Society, Navy and the Halifax Wanderers. Representatives will also be on hand from Bridgetown, N. S.; Sydney, Minton, N. B. and West Saint John.

And "Tink" Kyte, famed athlete from Antigonish, who holds four records on Memorial Field plus one Maritime record will be on hand to lead the Antigonish Highland Society. Brigadier Reid has recently received a letter confirming Kyte's entry.

But Paul Collins, the Olympic middle distance runner will not be present. For a time it was hoped that Collins would be able to make the trip but the Wolfville, N. S. man in a wire yesterday stated he could not be on hand. Collins, who represented Canada in the Olympics would have been entered in the six mile run.

In addition to the track and field events there will be a mile and half mile bicycle races.

Competition is expected to be keen for top honors in the Antigonish, who won the championship last year, will field a very strong team while the Wanderers with men like Johnny Martin, Bill Haley, Warner, Keith Fancy and Stewart MacMillan will be tough to beat.

The Navy team from Halifax and vicinity will have the largest number of entrants.

## Last Canadian Eliminated From Golf Tourney

WEST VANCOUVER, Aug. 28 (CP)—Canada's last two hopes in the Canadian amateur golf championship were derailed today, leaving four Americans in tomorrow's two 36-hole semi-final matches.

Jackie Reynolds of Vancouver struggled to the 18th green with gigantic Larry Bouchee of Inglewood, Calif., before he was finally subdued 1 up in the quarter-finals.

The other Canadian in the quarters, Bob Gray of Winnipeg, was crushed 4 and 3 by cool, methodical Sam Urzetta of Rochester, N. Y., U. S. 1950 champion.

Urzetta will meet U. S. Walker Cup player Billy Campbell in one semi-final. Campbell thrashed Gord Haskell of Seattle 6 and 5.

Bouchee will go against Ed Meister of Cleveland, who knocked out Robert Rose of San Francisco 5 and 3. The 36-hole final will be played Saturday.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28 (CP)—John Swann of Vancouver and Gerald Parchute, 17, of Hamtramck, Mich., tonight won the Canadian Junior men's doubles tennis title. They defeated John MacLean of Buffalo and Joe Jacinto of East Rockaway, N. Y., 3-6, 3-6, 5-1, 7-5, 6-1 in the concluding match of the Canadian Junior tennis championships.

## N. Y. Yankees Outbid Rivals For Blackwell

NEW YORK, Aug. 28 (CP)—New York Yankees today purchased pitcher Ewell Blackwell from Cincinnati Reds, marking the fourth straight year they have reached into the rival circuit to pluck a big name player to aid in their pennant drive.

The Yankees gave up four players including pitcher Johnny Schmitz and cash for the big righthander. The other three are minor leaguers.

The Yankees refused to say how much cash they shelled out for Blackwell but it must have been in the neighborhood of \$50,000 since they had to outbid Cleveland and Chicago White Sox for his services. Blackwell follows the August route taken by Johnny Mize Johnny Hopp and Johnny Sain, all former national League players who made their way to Yankees and the pot of pennant gold.

The Yankees purchased Mize from New York Giants in 1949 and he helped them win the flag that year.

They bought Hopp from Pittsburgh in 1950 and went on to capture the flag. Last year the Yankees obtained Sain from Boston Braves and marched to their third straight world championship.

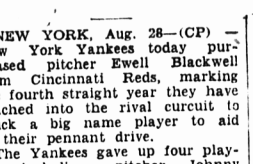
Blackwell is in the midst of his poorest season in the big leagues. He has won only three games this year against a dozen reversals. In addition, he currently is plagued by a sore arm and hasn't pitched since August 7.

The sore arm angle probably is the reason why all National League clubs waived on the once-great pitcher. The waiver price is \$10,000. Because the deal was completed before Sept. 1 Blackwell will be eligible for the World Series if the Yankees win the pennant.

It is no secret that Blackwell was unhappy in Cincinnati where he toiled brilliantly at times through six seasons. He won 22 games for the second division Reds, including 16 straight in 1947.

Removal of a kidney in the winter of 1948 almost ended his career. After two sub-par seasons, he came back to register 17 triumphs in 1950 and 16 last year.

Bob bowed out of the competition in the quarter-finals yesterday when he lost to Sam Urzetta of New York four and three. Urzetta won the United States championship in 1950 and is a very highly-rated golfer.

On Wednesday Bob came through with one of the major upsets in the tournament by defeating Jerry Kesinger of Kitchener, Ontario three and two. In winning this match Gray fired six birdies.

Actually Bob's showing this week is the climax to one of his best seasons in golf. Earlier in the year he competed in the Canadian Open and the Manitoba Open and made a good showing each time.

# Dodgers In 9-6 Victory Over Chicago Cubs To Protect League Lead

(By The Associated Press)  
 Rubber-armed Jo Black came to the rescue again Thursday as the Brooklyn Dodgers defeated Chicago Cubs 9-6 to protect their 9 1/2-game National League lead over New York Giants.

Black, making his 44th appearance of the season, took over from Clem Labine in the fifth and restricted the Cubs to one run the rest of the way to bag his 11th victory compared to two setbacks.

The Giants meanwhile coasted to a 14-7 triumph over Pittsburgh Pirates while Cincinnati Reds edged Boston Braves 5-4 in 11 innings in the National's remaining day game.

In the lone American League day game, Philadelphia Athletics defeated Boston Red Sox 6-3 in the first game of a doubleheader. The second game was postponed because of rain.

Brooklyn jumped Bob Kelly for a 5-1 lead in two innings but the Cubs pecked away and finally tied the score at 5-5 in the fifth.

Leonard's error enabled Jackie Robinson to score with the first run. Gil Hodges accounted for two more with a double and Black squeezed home the final marker.

The Giants clobbered five Pittsburgh pitchers for 16 hits with Al Dark nad Bob Thomson leading the way with three blows each. Whitey Lockman chipped with a homer while Ralph Kiner belted his 29th for Pittsburgh off Dave Koslo who cruised to his ninth contest.

Roy McMillan singled home Hank Edwards from second base with the Reds' winning run against the Braves. Frank Smith gained credit for his tenth victory while Sheldon Jones was charged with his fourth loss.

Cass Michaels' three-run double climaxed a four-run eighth inning rally that enabled the A's to beat the Red Sox. The victory moved the A's to within 3 1/2 games of the third place Red Sox. Al Benton, veteran relief artist, was tagged with the loss while strong armed Harry Byrd picked up his 12th triumph.

Manager Jimmy Dykes and shortstop Eddie Joost of the A's were tossed from the game for arguing and Billy Hitchcock of the Athletics and catcher Sam White of the Red Sox were ejected for fighting in the eighth inning.
