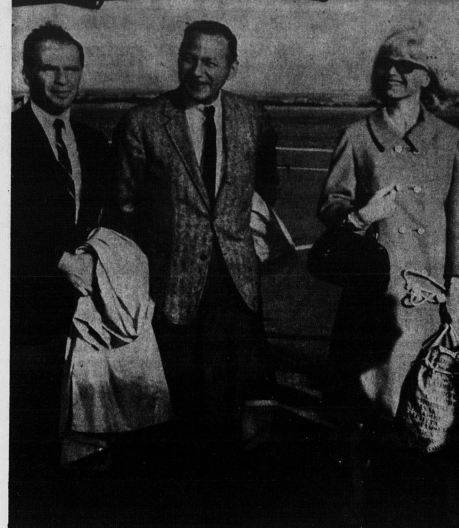
# Dioting Saigon Demand President Sympathetic Hearing Given On Feed Rates

The Canadian Federation of Agriculture received a very sympathetic hearing from Hon. Maurice Sauve in a protest lodged with the federal cabinet over the proposed Sept. 1 change in the feed grain freight assistance policy. Smith MacFarlane of Harrington said over the weekend. He returned Saturday from Ottawa where the Federation met. He said the minister of forestry Friday. The feed grain policy comes under his department.

The policy, which is scheduled to go into effect Sept. 1, will make water rates the basis, rather than rail, for assistance. Mr. MacFarlane said the policy disregards the fact that more than 40 per cent of the 12 million bushels of feed grain are milled and screenings and the only logical way to move them is by rail. "Our technical advisers tell us that in their opinion the changes could result in a lowering of assistance to the Maritime Provinces by as much as 750,000 bushels a year, a disastrous blow to our already harassed livestock industry," Mr. MacFarlane said.

know that the users of feed grain in the Maritime Provinces will be anxiously waiting for a statement from Mr. Sauve this week.

A statement presented to Mr. Sauve from the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, which represents Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces said: Resolved that the Eastern Agricultural Conference endorse the presentation of the Maritime Federation of Agriculture, noting that this presentation pinpoints certain apparent inequities that are present also in other areas and that: 1. The Eastern Conference recommends strongly that the announced interim policy for freight assistance on feed grains be not implemented until these inequities can be adjusted; 2. The Conference urges that a feed grain agency be appointed without delay; 3. The Conference submits that one of the permanent objectives of this agency should be a study leading to equalization of feed freight costs at a minimum level for livestock and poultry feeders in Canada.

## Cyprus 'Delta Force' Texes Muscles Again

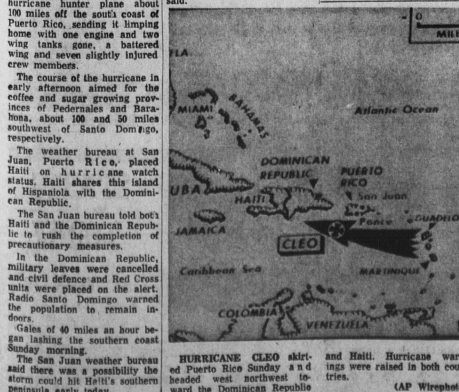
