

More Than Third Of R.C.A.F. Flying Now Done In Jets

OTTAWA (CP)—More than one-third of RCAF flying now is in jet planes and the proportion is increasing steadily.

The air force has grown five times in the last seven years and its rate of flying has increased 10 times. Air defence command alone has increased its operational flying four-fold in the last two years.

The 50,000-man air force has planes, vehicles and electronic equipment. The RCAF consumes \$32,000,000 worth of aviation fuel every year.

MAINTENANCE PROBLEM

Air Vice-Marshal M. M. Hendrick, chief of RCAF technical services, cites these figures in pointing of the growing problem of maintenance.

Writing in the Canadian Aeronautical Journal, he says: "Our ability in the air force to maintain the devices which we require is a definite limitation on our efficiency and effectiveness as a fighting machine."

"We have all been aware of the desire to simplify maintenance and we frequently specify that new devices shall be easy to maintain."

TOO COMPLICATED?

"But I think in the last few years and months it has become increasingly apparent that more attention must be paid to this aspect of our equipments if we are not going to trip over ourselves in our own complexities."

"After all, it is better to have a midget that doesn't and we must face up to the fact that we cannot get so complicated in our devices that they cease to operate."

"Today the average complex fighting airplane which takes off for battle and lands again for refuelling will, in an appreciable per cent of the times, be unable to take off again immediately because of the unserviceabilities which developed in those airplanes a quite unreasonable number will take three hours or more to rectify."

(It requires 120 man-hours of maintenance to keep one plane in the air for an hour.)

Air Vice Marshal Hendrick says he is reserving his views on whether the coming generation of jet fighters, such as the superbersonic CF-105 for the RCAF, will be the last to carry men.

"Much will depend upon the ability of the guided missile to demonstrate that it will be able in fact to do all the things that are promised of it."

"Guided missiles are not simple devices by any means and there will be long periods of development, trial and evolution before we will know precisely with how much of the burden of our air defence they can be trusted."
