Contract Bridge

NOT SO FREE

In today's deal, declarer felt that he was offered a "free" finesse at the first trick—but he was mistaken!

North dealer. North-South vulnerable

The bidding:
North East South West
1♠ Pass 2♥ Pass
3♣ Pass 3♥ Pass
4♠ Pass 4NT Pass
5♥ Pass 6♥ Pass

West opened the spade ten, and South thought he might as well "try out" dummy's jack. East covered, and South won. Four rounds drew East's trumps—dummy discarding a diamond and a spade—and South then tried to establish the clubs. However, he found West with two stoppers, and the situation became quite hopeless. (Even if South had passed his first club lead into East's hand, keeping a club for communication, East certainly would have retaliated by taking dummy's spade ace, and South would have been in the same untenable position.)

Declarer should have foreseen that it might be necessary, or at least highly advisable, to duck one round of clubs so as to insure the establishment of the suit, and, that being true, his sacrifice of the spade jack at the first trick was extremely unwise! The correct technique was to play the spade four from dummy and win with the king; then to draw trumps (discarding diamonds from dummy) and pass a club into East's hand! With the ace-jack of spades remaining in dummy, East could not profitably return that suit, and so would have to lead a diamond. Declarer would win this with the ace, discarding dummy's spade jack, lead his remaining club to the king, cash the club ace and ruff a club, thus establishing the suit with the spade ace for sure entry.
