LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

THE ORWELL MATTER.

Sir,—Today, on picking up the Guardian of the 13th inst. I was struck with the wild heading of a "Wild Boar signed 'Orwell'" that related to matters concerning which I happen to know the truth. The latter was to me a surprise. First, that even the Guardian would give place to a communication so false and malicious on its face, in which the champion of a fiction is allowed to slander an opponent and misrepresent the facts of a case now pending in court; and, second, that any mortal, with or without a character to lose, could have acquired such skill in writing, without the use of facts, except as things to mislead with or to be avoided.

In spite, however, of all his efforts and of all his skill, his letter does contain some grains of truth, none the less precious because so few and far between. The search would be but ill-repaid were it not that the reputation of a whole neighborhood has been placed in jeopardy, though the chief aim of the writer was, apparently, the ruin of one of its inhabitants.

First, it is true that Mr. David Ross's permission an Orange Hall was placed on part of the farm now occupied by him, and that for some months he used the lower story of the building for his own purposes—not a heavy rental given five years occupation of a valuable plot of ground. That a temperance vision has been in his mind in this hall for several years, that Mr. Ross decided to prevent further meetings from being held for the reason that he suffered much annoyance and injury from some of those who came to the hall and made of the meetings opportunities to assault and annoy him; that he grew tired of allowing a building on his premises to be used as a rallying place for certain persons, who had shown time and again by words and acts their hostility towards him, and after giving in order to carry out his purpose of putting an end to this annoyance Mr. Ross did build a fence (as he had a perfect right to do) between the Orange Hall and the Queen's Highway, and after giving ample warning that parties entering his enclosure would be treated as trespassers, he went to the hall on the evening of the assault to find out who those were who had been warning him.

When the "unpleasant affair" with an amusing side to it" took place that a warrant was issued and the trial began on the 12th inst; that during Mr. Ross' attendance thereat the hall was removed from his premises,—to the extent only that these statements may be gathered from "Orwell's" letter is true, and but for the fact that he is to be found there. In all other material things it is willfully and wickedly misleading and that with the high motive of bringing discredit upon a man, who is deservedly held in high esteem and who suffered much before determining to discontinue a favour to those whose appreciation look so queer a mode of expression. As to the merits of the case before the Court—as to whether Mr. Ross kept fully within his legal rights, the decision of the magistrate will soon determine. And those "quiet, law-abiding and christian young men of the country who gathered together and quietly moved to the hall off to the road and down to its present proud and safe position" may in due time learn whether the "quiet moving away" of property, in absence of the owner, is one of the evidences of high morality. The first effect may have been "convulsive laughter at the cleverness of the whole affair," so "Orwell" says, but we have room for hope that he speaks in this according to his intent.

Perhaps the saddest thing in "Orwell's" letter is the "amusing side to it," for "Orwell" can be funny, too—in a repulsive way—when he tries, but it is not nice to even for a clergyman, to sneer at religion and religious observances, nor is it fair for such an one to profess to speak for the respectable people of any community.

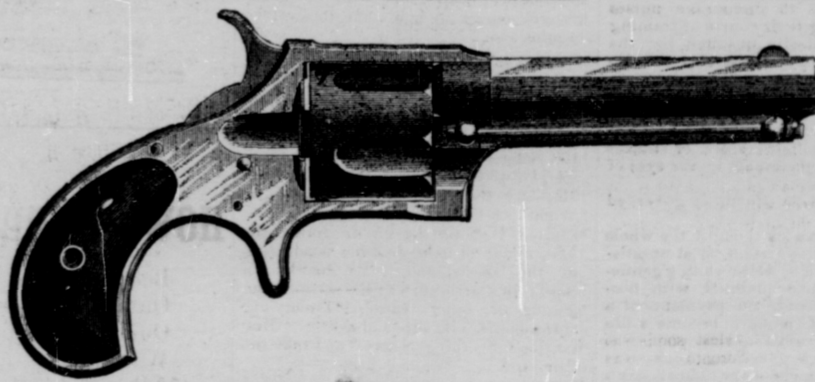
