The Late Mrs. McMahon.

The funeral of the late Mrs Eleanor Maria McMahon took place yesterday (Wednesday) afternoon. A number of beautiful wreaths of flowers, in suitable designs—the gifts of loving friends—were placed on the coffin.

The deceased lady was literally a daughter of the British Army, her father, both grandfathers, and her husband all being army officers.

She was eldest daughter of Major Edward Sutherland, of the 7th Regiment of Foot, whose wife was daughter of Major McPherson, of the famous Black Watch Regiment.

When subsequently stationed at Fredericton, New Brunswick, he was called upon to perform services of great importance in 1862. In consequence of difficulties arising between England and the United States over the Trent affair, it was deemed necessary to despatch a large body of troops, in the depth of winter, from Halifax to Quebec.

Commissioner-General McMahon shortly afterwards returned from the active service and removed with his family to this Island. He took up his residence at Falconwood, the present site of the asylum.

In the summer of 1872 he decided to return to the old country, and sailed accompanied by his wife and a family from Charlottetown. When on the passage, one day after dinner he was seized with severe illness; he died the same evening and was buried at sea.

Civic Affairs.

The adjourned regular monthly meeting of the City Council was not held last evening, for the want of a quorum.

Last evening Councillors Taylor, Hughes and Hooper drew up a requisition asking Mayor Haviland to call an emergency meeting of the Council this (Thursday) evening, at half-past seven o'clock, for the purpose of accepting the resignation of Policeman Warren and appointing his successor; also to appoint a sanitary officer.

To His Worship Mayor Haviland: We, the undersigned, City Councillors of the City of Charlottetown, request you to call an emergency meeting of the City Council for to-morrow (Thursday) night, June 15, at 7.30 o'clock, for the purpose of accepting the resignation of policeman Warren and appointing his successor, also to appoint a sanitary officer.

I hereby decline to call an emergency meeting of the City Council for to-morrow night (Thursday) the 15th June, instant, at 7.30 o'clock, for the purpose of accepting the resignation of policeman Warren and appointing his successor, also to appoint a sanitary officer, as I do not consider that the purposes mentioned in the above requisition come within the spirit of an emergency meeting of the City Council.

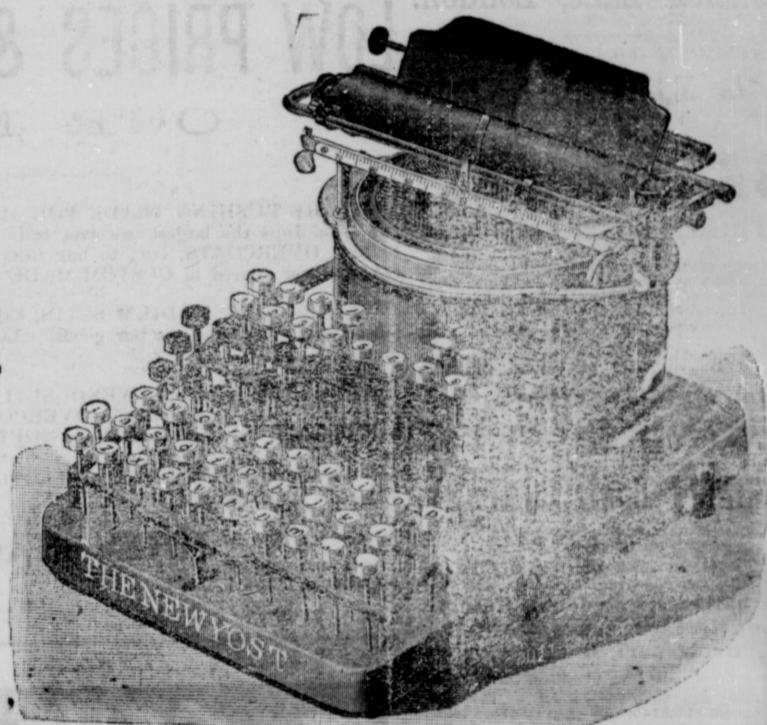
