

British Ambassador Warns West Must Stick Together

WASHINGTON (CP)—Sir Harold Caccia, new British ambassador to the United States, said Thursday that the West must stand together in the face of Russian threats in the Middle East.

"If the West does not stand together," he added, "the resulting uncertainties would play straight into Soviet hands."

In his first public speech in the United States, Sir Harold spoke before an overflow crowd of newspaper men in Washington's National Press Club and gave a vigorous defence of the Anglo-French intervention in the Middle East.

It had, he suggested, "temporarily, at least, averted a Middle East war."

RAPS "VOLUNTEER" PLAN

Sir Harold, who arrived from the United Kingdom a week ago, also made these other points:

1. Russia will be guilty of "a flagrant breach" of United Nations cease-fire resolutions if it sends so-called "volunteers" to help bolster Egypt's armed forces.

2. British forces in Egypt are "ready to move out" as soon as the proposed UN police force moves in.

3. The Egyptians have "wantonly and deliberately" blocked the Suez Canal and political considerations must not be allowed to stand in the way of efforts to reopen the vital waterway.

4. Britain and other Western European countries soon will need oil from the Western Hemisphere to keep their industries from coming to a halt because of the disruption of oil supplies from the Middle East.

AVERTED WAR

Whatever the arguments over the Anglo-French intervention in the Middle East fighting, Sir Harold said, the only forces available to step in between the Israeli and the Egyptians when the conflict started were those of the British and the French.

"We believe that the swift intervention of Britain and France temporarily, at least, averted a Middle Eastern war. In this sense

it has been successful so far. But I stress the word temporarily because if the opportunity given the United Nations is not taken, and if the West does not stand together, the resulting uncertainties would play straight into Soviet hands.

"You may be sure that it was not for nothing that during the last year the Communists have been sending arms and technicians into Egypt."

Sir Harold said Britain was ready to move out of Egypt as soon as the United Nations force moves in. But in the meanwhile there must be no vacuum "in which the forces of Communist intrigue and anarchy would have full play."

"The prevention of further hostilities is our first and immediate objective. But we must not forget the need for two basic settlements: of the Egyptian-Israeli dispute and of the Suez Canal."

"A mere return to the position before Oct. 29 would be as dangerous as it would be futile."

U. S. President Comments On Internal Political Situation

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower Wednesday sized up the election as offering "some what of a mandate" from the people to work industriously and incessantly "for a program of modern republicanism."

Yet Eisenhower conceded that an election cleavage which gave him an enormous vote of confidence while keeping Congress in Democratic hands meant that "From my viewpoint, the United States has not yet been convinced that modern republicanism is the guiding philosophy of the Republican party."

Eisenhower left it known he intends to try to put his program across in congress with persuasion rather than force.

"I am not one of the stick-pounding type that likes to stomp out his jaw and look like he is boxing the show," the president said. "I would far rather get behind and recognizing the frailties and the requirements of human nature, I would rather try to persuade a man to go along, because once I have persuaded him he

will stick.

"If I scare him, he will stay just as long as he is scared, and then he is gone."

DEFINES OUTLOOK

In an obvious but not explicit reference to the old guard of Republican conservatives in Congress, Eisenhower said that even they must be convinced that "some change in the understanding that the public has of the Republican party is necessary."

He defined modern Republicanism this way:

"It is a type of political philosophy that recognizes clearly the responsibility of the federal government to take the lead in making certain that the productivity of our great economic machine is distributed so that no one will suffer from dislocation through no fault of his own."

"Now, this covers the wide field of education and health, and so on, but we believe likewise in the free enterprise system that has brought these blessings to America. Therefore, we are going to try our best to preserve that free enterprise."

CAN MODERN EVANGELISM LEAD MEN BACK TO GOD?

The churches in Canada today are concentrating on evangelism. The Primate of the Anglican Church has issued a call for "intense evangelism," and in this he is giving expression to the decision of the general synod of his church.

In Toronto Bishop Wilkinson has echoed this call, summoning both clergy and laity to this special effort to lead men back to God.

The general council of the United Church of Canada has committed the church to "a mission to the nation" in which every congregation, led by its minister and office-bearers, will emphasize the age-old appeal of the Gospel to turn to Christ and live.

This effort is in accord with the finest traditions of the three churches which entered the Union in 1825, and nation-wide preparations are being made for the effort. Other churches are moving strongly in the same direction.

"How is it," he asked, "that Paul could speak of the love of Christ constraining him while my heart is so cold?"

While stating this difficulty to a friend, he suddenly burst out with the exclamation, "I have found it," and returned to his room to pour out his heart in thanksgiving to God for revealing the secret.

He says, "What I did receive was a direct, immediate and open vision of the glory and love of Christ, an inward beholding utterly impossible but upon one condition: that the spirit take of the things of Christ and show them unto us."

"In the depth of my inner being I felt an instantaneous enlargement, expansion and invigoration of my receptive capacities. When there opened to my mind a direct apprehension, an open vision of the love and glory of Christ, a love and glory which filled and occupied the entire compass of my being, and warmed, quickened and vitalized all the powers and activities of my mental nature."

UNBROKEN JOY

The result was a life of unbroken joy in God.

The grace of God was sufficient for every need of his later life. He was able to guide those who accepted the Saviour into the fullness of spiritual power as Peter and John did with Philip's converts in Samaria.

This is an ascent to the Mountains of Grace which makes possible a view of the broad expanse of Christian attainment.

The source of all true revival is found in God, and God works through chosen spirits in whom he abides and who abide in Him. The only way in which there can be a widespread revival of the souls of the people lies through those who have been saved by His grace pressing on to the higher Christian life.

St. Paul taught his Ephesian converts to pray that they might be filled with all the fulness of God, and the pressing of this plea until God responds is the most urgent necessity of today.

TWO U. S. JETS CRASH IN TWO GERMAN TOWNS

KAISERSLAUTERN, West Germany (Reuters)—Two United States Air Force jets Wednesday smashed into buildings in the main streets of two German towns.

The pilots of the F-86D Sabre jets and at least two civilians were killed.

One jet rammed into a large building used by French authorities at Kaiserslautern. An hour later, the other plane crashed into a three-story house at Shopp, near Permasens. The two cities are about 25 miles apart near the Saar region.

Fires were started in both cities. The Kaiserslautern main street was closed for traffic as fire fighters extinguished the blaze.

At Shopp, the plane went through an apartment house and a barn and then exploded in the town's main street.

At Kaiserslautern, rocket ammunition carried by the plane exploded and German police said at least two others besides the pilot were killed.

Resolution On U. N. Force Splits Churches' Council

KITCHENER (CP)—A resolution commending Canada for leadership in creation of a Middle East police force split the Canadian Council of Churches into two-hour debate Wednesday before it was passed in milder terms.

The resolution was proposed by professor George Brown of the University of Toronto to commend Canada for advocating the creation of a United Nations force for the Suez area.

Delegates objected to both the terms "commend" and "force," finally dropped the word commend and replaced it with "give humble thanks to God" for Canada's leadership.

Further discussion resulted in an amendment to make the resolution read "police force" for "force."

Delegates said the motion contained no recognition of man's shortcomings in creating tensions and that in praising Canada's action, the council might appear to endorse Anglo-French intervention in the Middle East.

Bishop George Luxton of the Anglican diocese of Huron said he is a strong supporter of British action in the Middle East and said the original resolution should be acceptable to all if some public recognition of sin was included.

Fred Haslam of Toronto, representing the Society of Friends (Quakers), objected to the word force, saying he doubted if whether force was ever the answer to those seeking peace.

Rev. Norman Kennedy of Regina, former moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, said the Presbyterian Church believes in the use of force for causes on behalf of constituted authority.

The resolution was passed with the inclusion of a sentence acknowledging in "humble penitence the part our sins and shortcomings have played in creating the tensions of the world."

Police Dog Tracks Down Jailbreaker

MONCTON (CP)—The RCMP dog Ronger and his handler, Corporal H. W. Burkholder of the Moncton detachment, chalked up another arrest Thursday for the apprehension of jailbreaker Raul J. O'Brien, 23, of St. Quentin, N.B.

An RCMP spokesman here said the arrest was made at noon in a wooded section near Northern Up saquich, about 25 miles from Campbellton.

The dog tracked O'Brien from near a rail line where residents spotted him earlier.

O'Brien had been free since Sunday when he escaped from the Dalhousie jail using a key made of abortive. He was awaiting jury trial on a jailbreaking charge and five counts of breaking, entering and theft.

A magistrate had earlier sentenced him to two years in Dorchester penitentiary after he pleaded guilty to assaulting a police officer.

He is due to appear for trial Dec. 4.
