**Steel Output Holds Steady**  
CLEVELAND (AP)—Most steel consumers - particularly automotive parts suppliers - will begin building inventories within the next few weeks. Steel Magazine reported Sunday. Smaller users of steel already have started an inventory buildup.

Steel production last week held steady at 74.5 per cent of 1959 rated capacity and output was about 2,109,000 net tons. Rates in nine of the dozen districts held even or were up. The biggest jumps were in Cleveland and Cincinnati, both up five points, to 86 and 87 per cent of rated capacity, respectively.

"As strike fears mount, even the more conservative buyers will start pressing for extra tonnage," Steel said. The magazine predicted consumers will add 4,000,000 tons to their stockpiled before July.

Automakers aren't expected to step up buying until the end of the first quarter, the magazine said.

A survey of product demand by the metalworking weekly indicates: January shipments of cold-rolled steel sheets will equal or slightly exceed that of last month; demand for galvanized and aluminum-coated products in many areas exceeds sales quotas; January order books for mechanical tubing are filling fast; and electric tinning lines are running close to capacity.

Steel's composite price on prime steelmaking scrap advanced 66 cents to \$40.33 a gross ton last week, its highest price since November.

**Breaks World Jump Record**  
BOSTON (AP)—John Thomas, Boston University freshman, cleared six feet, 11 inches to shatter the world indoor high jump record and steal the spotlight from Ron Delany who registered his 24th straight mile victory in the Boston Knights of Columbus Games Saturday night.

The crowd of 10,170 in Boston Garden let out a mighty cheer when Thomas, a gangling 17-year-old, went over the bar on his third try at the height just as Delany was making his bid in the mile.

Even Ron gave a quick glance at Thomas, who by this time was stretched out on the canvas. Then Delany returned to the business at hand and captured the mile in 4:08.3 in his usual fashion—coming from behind in the final laps.

Lieut. Bill Dellinger of the U.S. Air Force was second. For the record, Thomas cleared 6-11 1/2, but under the rules the height must revert to the nearest quarter inch.

Only 10 minutes earlier he had tied the recognized world indoor mark of 6-10, set in 1953 by Ken Weisner.

After he made his 6-11 job, officials raised the crossbar an inch, but he missed three tries at it.

As for Delany, this was his 30th consecutive indoor victory and no one in the field actually bothered him.

**Austrian Retains Coveted Ski Cup**  
KITZBUHEL, Austria (AP)—Austria's Anderl Molterer retained the coveted Hahnenkamm ski trophy Sunday, flashing to victory in the slalom as American ace Bud Werner and Switzerland's Roggenbäum went tumbling into the snow.

Molterer's repeat of his 1958 championship, plus the skills, provided a dramatic finish to the two-day event, but it was the same old story for Werner. The 22-year-old Olympic hopeful from Steamboat Springs, Colo., has been plagued by falls since the 1958 world championships.

Werner won the downhill event Saturday and after Sunday's first heat in the slalom appeared well on his way to becoming the first non-Austrian to win the combined title since 1934.

But Molterer, 27, came through with a spectacular run on the second heat to finish in 66.7 seconds. Werner and Staub, 22, hit gates and smashed off the course on the final run. Both were disqualified for missing gates after they picked themselves up and returned to the course.

Switzerland's Anne Marie Wasser was the women's slalom winner in 1:34.6 with runs of 46.5 and 48.1. Norway's Astrid Sandvik won the combined women's trophy, coupling a second place in the slalom with her downhill victory.

Anne Heggtveit of Ottawa, only Canadian in the women's events, was 16th in the slalom Sunday with a time of 1:42.0.

No Canadians showed in the men's results Sunday.
