Salads Need A Dressing!

A salad is like a woman—a lot depends on the dressing—so an old saying goes. Of course the original has to be good, but there is no doubt that the right dressing will bring out the best in either a beautiful leafy or a tasty salad. By adding various ingredients to basic recipes of French, mayonnaise and boiled dressings, you should find that you can make salads more appealing to the family.

Here are some suggestions covering the three main types of dressing. They are worth a try during National Salad Week, taking place now, when so many of your favorite fruits and vegetables are in good supply.

French dressing is made from delicately flavored French Salad oil and vinegar, to which salt, sugar and other seasonings may be added. This type of dressing should be used on light vegetable salads or in meat, fish or poultry salads. It may be varied by adding catsup, chili sauce, Roquefort cheese, hard-cooked eggs, chopped pickle, chopped bacon, honey, garlic, onions or meat sauces.

Plain boiled salad dressing is a type which many families prefer. This type of dressing may be used on almost any salad. You can get variety by adding whipped cream, peanut butter, hard-cooked eggs, crisp cooked bacon, cottage cheese or chives.

Mayonnaise is a combination of eggs, vinegar, seasonings and a large quantity of salad oil. It is used mainly on more substantial heavy salads such as meat, poultry or eggs. Chili sauce, finely chopped pickles, cottage cheese or cucumbers can be added for a change.

If you are sometimes stuck when it comes to selecting a dressing that will enhance the flavor of a particular type of Salad, you may find just what you want in the suggestions below—

FRUIT SALAD DRESSING

3 tablespoons sugar
3 tablespoons flour
Few grains salt
2 tablespoons cider vinegar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Grated rind of one lemon
¼ cup juice from canned fruit
1 egg
¼-½ cup mayonnaise
1-2 cups whipping cream, whipped
Mix sugar, flour and salt in top of double boiler. Add vinegar, lemon juice and rind, fruit juice and slightly beaten egg. Blend well. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly, until thickened, and continue cooking about five minutes. Chill. Just before serving, fold in mayonnaise and whipped cream. Yield: about 2-¼ cups—12 generous servings for fruit salads.

FISH SALAD DRESSING

To add a special touch to any fish salad, add one tablespoon of chopped capers or one-quarter cup of finely chopped pickles to one cup of any type of dressing.

VEGETABLE SALAD DRESSING

2 eggs
1 cup sour cream
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon dry mustard
2 tablespoons sugar
¼ cup cider vinegar
Few drops Worcestershire sauce.
Beat eggs until very light, add sour cream, salt, dry mustard, sugar, vinegar and Worcestershire sauce. Blend well. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly, until thickened, about five minutes. Yield: 1-¼ cups.

TOSSED SALAD DRESSING

3 slices bacon.
1 tablespoon finely chopped onion.
1 tablespoon flour
2 teaspoons brown sugar.
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ cup water
¼ cup cider vinegar
Cut bacon in small pieces and cook until crisp. Add onion and cook a minute or two. Blend in flour, sugar and salt. Add water and vinegar and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture is smooth and slightly thickened. While still warm pour dressing over your favorite salad greens and serve immediately. Yield: ½ cup which is sufficient for a tossed salad to serve six.

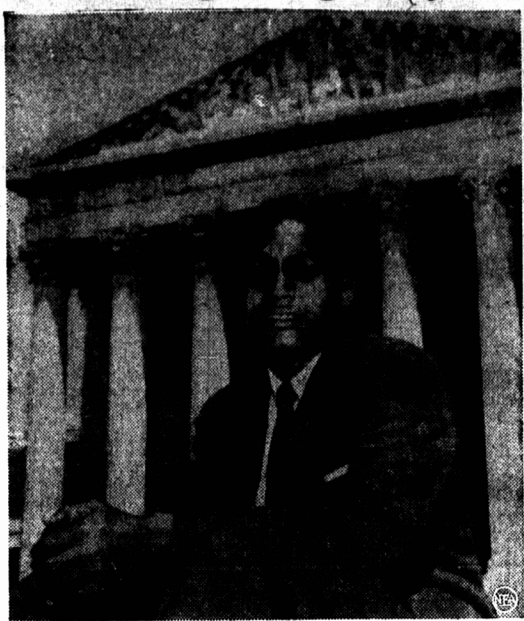

MRS. ALEXANDER CAMPBELL

There passed peacefully away at the home of her son Donald Campbell, Bloomfield, on Monday, May 17th, Mrs. Alexander Campbell at the ripe old age of ninety-eight years.

The deceased, whose maiden name was Susan MacLeod, was born at Uigg, daughter of the late Murdoch MacLeod and Margaret Gunn of Chatham, New Brunswick, and had lived in Brookfield the greater part of her long life, where she set a fine Christian example in the home and in the community as well.

Her husband predeceased her twenty-three years ago.

Her many years of activity began to draw to a close a short time prior to her death when the hand of time seemed to bear heavily upon her, and on the above mentioned date her eyes closed in death.

Mrs. Campbell had nine brothers and two sisters, all of whom predeceased her. She was a loyal member of the Brookfield Women's Missionary Society and faithfully attended for over thirty-five years. She leaves to mourn her son Donald on the homestead, and her daughter, Mrs. Alma Thompson, R.N., of Allston, Mass.; also her grand-daughter Phyllis. Her daughter Reta predeceased her in childhood, also her grandson Alexander Norman, in infancy 12 years ago.

The funeral which was held on Wednesday, May 19th from Brookfield Presbyterian Church was a largely attended. The service was conducted by her pastor Rev. Lawrence Blaikie, assisted by Rev. Donald Nicholson of Clyde River. Mr. Blaikie spoke words of comfort taking as his text, Hebrews 9th chapter, 27th verse. It is appointed unto men once to die. Blaikie's remarks on this text Mr. Blaikie pointed out that there are other verses in the New Testament which convey the same thought: (1) Here is thy pound which I have laid up in a napkin. (2) Because of the hope that is laid up for you in the Heavens. (3) There is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord the righteous Judge shall give me at that day.

The hymns sung were, "The Sands of Time Are Sinking", and "Son of My Soul", a favourite of the deceased.

The pall-bearers were Cecil Campbell, Archibald Johnson, Kenneth MacDonald, Sherman MacDuff, Sterling MacLean and James MacLean.

The floral tributes, besides letters and cards of sympathy, spoke of the high esteem in which she was held.

The remains were laid to rest in Brookfield Cemetery.

Poland's Accusations Rejected by Britain

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain will reject Poland's accusations of brutality by British police who marched aboard a Polish freighter in the Thames river last Saturday and took a refugee Antoni Klimowicz, diplomatic sources said yesterday.

They acknowledge that one policeman used his club, but only in self-defence when crew members advanced menacingly on him and one seaman had already struck him.

The police went aboard the freighter Jaroslav Dabrowski to take off the 26-year old Pole, who had allegedly stowed away to Britain seeking political asylum. After he was found half-starved by British longshoremen the freighter captain was reported to have put him in chains to return him to Poland.

Poland Tuesday handed the British ambassador in Warsaw a note vigorously protesting "police brutality" and demanding his return and compensation for injuries and damage suffered by the crew and the vessel.

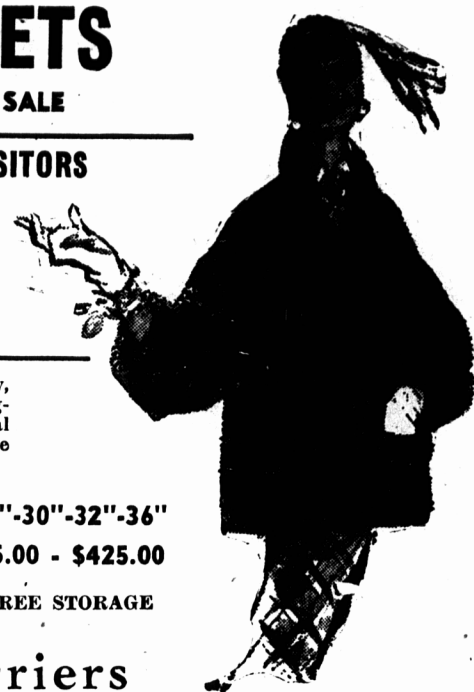
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
