The first shipment of Irish Moss from the province was made by Myrick and MacIntosh in the year 1941, and has since proved to be a boon to both farmers and fishermen.

ressed the meeting on the importance of communities working together to help solve the many problems that arise. He endorsed the work carried on under the ARDA programs, and the West Prince Board of Trade and urged everyone to become part of both organizations.

## Progress is Reported On New Tignish Rink

TIGNISH — The board of directors of the Tignish Sports Recreation Association and the newly appointed officers on constructing and financing a Centennial indoor rink for the Tignish area held a special meeting in the Dalton School on Friday evening with the president John Gavin presiding.

Some encouraging news was heard on the erecting of an indoor rink, lumber on order since March 2, has been arriving in quantity during the past few days. Blue prints were presented to the meeting on the steel truss to be used for the frame work of the building.

The committees set up, have a major undertaking before them, and the full cooperation of every individual will be needed to erect such a structure.

It was reported that a drive for members is now on, \$10 for honorary membership, \$50 for life membership payable over a period of three years. Membership will be extended to all organizations and business firms, and money derived from such memberships will be used to construct the rink building. A special rink building fund was set up chaired by Aubin J. Gallant.

### SUCCESS DOUBTFUL

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian officials expressed doubt Saturday on a Norwegian expedition which succeeded in an unprecedented crossing of the North Pole on foot. Reports received here from the joint Canadian-American weather station at Alert on the northern tip of Ellesmere Island say that the expedition headed by Bjorn Stab has encountered severe weather conditions and now is far behind schedule. It still has some miles to go but the season for travelling on foot over the ice of the Arctic Ocean soon would start to draw to a close.

## Dave Boswell Is Honored

C.A. Troester Jr., secretary-general of the International Council for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, announced recently that David M. Boswell, is among 11 Canadian members to be appointed an associate fellow in the American College of Sports Medicine.
